Red Sox Boosted Nearer Top Of American League

The Williams' blaring bat and the friendly confines of Fenway park have boosted the Boston Red Sox to within a hair's breadth of first place.

Joe McCarthy's men today were 42 percentage points behind the American league leading Detroit club. In games won and lost, however, they topped the Tigers by half a length.

The Red Sox' double triumph over the St. Louis Browns yesterday, 8-6 and 6-2, gave them a 137 record as compared with Detroit's 84 mark. The Tigers bowed to the Yankees in New York, 6-3.

Williams, whose bat has been a destructive weapon since his return following a siege of the flu, won the opener for Boston. He hammered his seventh home run of the season and scored twice to provide the margin of victory. He drove in a run and scored once in the second game. His fifth inning single snapped a 2-2 tie.

In the nine games since his return, Ted has walked seven home runs and has driven in 16 runs. He has hit safely in every game and has scored in all but one. The Red Sox have won eight of the nine.

Schwarz Winner
Charlie Schwarz, in relief of starter Maurice McDermott, was credited with his first victory in the opener. He allowed three hits in four and a fraction innings after McDermott had walked himself out of the game with 10 bases on balls in less than four innings. Al Papi was victorious over his former Brownie mates in the second game.

The Yanks' Tommy Byrne, an old Tiger killer, found the going rough in the early innings but settled down for his ninth triumph over the Tigers in four seasons.

Not only did Byrne tame the Tigers with nine hits but he sparked a three-run winning rally in the eighth. His single off relief pitcher Paul Calvert drove in two mates.

Gil Coan's bases-loaded homer, his second grand slam in five days, enabled the Washington Senators to come from behind and defeat the Cleveland Indians, 10-5. Mickey Harris, who allowed one hit in the last five innings after replacing starter Conrado Marrero, was the winner.

White Sox, A's Divide
Chicago and Philadelphia divided a doubleheader. The White Sox pounded Lou Brissie for 10 hits, half or extra bases, to win the first game 7-3. Carmen Guerra's three-run homer and Bob Hooper's seventh pitching won the second game for Philadelphia, 4-2.

Every club but Brooklyn and Boston switched positions in the National league following yesterday's results. The Dodgers retained their hold on first place, edging out the Pirates in Pittsburgh, 3-2. Jackie Robinson drove in all Brooklyn's runs with a single, double and home run off Murray Dickson. Rex Barney, with a brilliant one-hit, five and two-thirds inning relief effort, gained credit for his first victory. The defeat dropped the Pirates into a fourth place tie with St. Louis.

Cards Go Up
The Cardinals jumped two notches by humiliating the Boston Braves, 15-0. The Braves were held to four singles by Howie Pollet. Enos Slaughter led a 21-hit attack against Johnny Sain and three relievers with four hits in five times at bat.

The Philadelphia Phillies moved into second place by dumping the Reds twice in Cincinnati, 6-0 and 6-4. Ken Heintzelman hurled a three-hitter in the first game. Ewell Blackwell was charged with the second game loss, Cincinnati's sixth in succession.

The New York Giants moved out of last place as Cincinnati moved in by sweeping both ends of a doubleheader from the Cubs in Chicago, 4-3 and 5-2. They shelved Bob Rush off the mound in the first inning of the opener and did the same to John Klippel, in the first inning of the nightcap.

Myrtle Creek Townies Win

The Myrtle Creek town baseball team defeated Oakland 9-3 in a practice game on the Myrtle Creek diamond Sunday.

The Myrtle Creek nine took a three-run lead in the first inning and was never seriously threatened throughout the remainder of the contest. Myrtle Creek's big inning came in the eighth when four local players crossed the plate.

Highlight of the game came in the sixth inning when Oakland's Earl Plueard hit a three-sacker.

Jack O'Reilly, Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion, successfully defended his title against flashy Eddie Williams Saturday night at the armory.

A freak accident won the final fall for O'Reilly, as Williams looked as though he was on his way to a win. After a little of O'Reilly's dirty work, Williams seemed to get a little peeved and threw a few elbows O'Reilly's way, but he swung one too many. On the last swing, O'Reilly ducked and grabbed Williams' feet. Williams landed square on his head with a bump that could be heard all over the auditorium. Williams was almost out cold, and O'Reilly grabbed him and applied his much-used hammerlock and arm stomps to take the fall and the match.

Williams won the first fall almost before the fans could get settled in their chairs. After a hard and fast flurry of blows, Williams grabbed O'Reilly's feet and spun him around and around the ring, then let him down on his face and pressed him for the fall. Time: 1 minute, 4 seconds. O'Reilly won the second fall with his hammerlock and arm stomps in 23:10.

One of the best scientific matches seen in the Roseburg ring for a long time was featured in the opener. Roseburg defeated Lido, 6-2; Strickland, Bell won the first fall with his spectacular rolling jack-knife in 17 minutes. Strickland came back to win the second with a skin-the-cat in 6:03. State Title Entries Are Qualified

In the District 5 tennis tournament held here Saturday Al Hoffman's undefeated Roseburg high tennis squad qualified five out of six entries for the state tournament to be held later in the year. The Indian team placed two doubles teams and one singles player in the state meet. Roseburg's first doubles team, Roy Van Horn and Gordon Conley, both juniors in school, automatically won their first match by default when Howe and Laird of Coquille were unable to attend the meet, and won their second match over Bauer and Chambers of Marshfield, 6-2, 6-4.

The Indian second doubles team, Ron Strickling and Norm Queen, both seniors, easily won their first match over Webber and Cunningham of Myrtle Point, 6-0, 6-0, and then defeated Gouley and Gomes of North Bend, 6-1, 6-4.

The two teams met in the final, two seniors against two juniors, to decide which team would have the honor of their names on the district trophy, and the juniors won, 6-2, 6-2, in a hard and fast match. The champion and runner-up of each district is entitled to go to state, so both Roseburg's doubles teams will attend.

Jacobson Goes to Finals
Dick Jacobson, Roseburg's first man and singles entry, won his opening match with Fish of Coquille, 6-0, 6-0, and then walloped Marshfield's Jim Slover in the second round, 6-2, 6-0, for the third time this year. But in the finals, he lost to Ron Robins, Marshfield's star athlete, 6-3, 6-2. Robins gained the finals by defeating Larry Henninger of Roseburg, 6-3, 6-2.

Of the six men sent to the state tourney by this district, Roseburg will send five, the sixth being Robins.

Repeated showers in the morning bothered the schedule of the tourney somewhat, and the final match was not played until 6:10 p.m. The courts had to be swept five times by members of the Roseburg tennis squad in order to resume play. The only other disappointment of the tourney was that Coquille's doubles teams and Myrtle Point's singles players were unable to attend.

Double Foul Gives Ashland Track Victory

A double foul in the final and deciding event gave Ashland a 20-13 to 56-2-3 win over Roseburg in a high school dual meet on Finlay field Saturday.

Going into the final and deciding event, the 880-yard relay, the Indians needed four points to win the meet by 1-3 of a point. The Indians automatically became winners half way through the final race when Davis of Ashland fouled Sconce by cutting in too soon, without a sufficient lead. However, an over-eager baton exchange between Sconce and Stroup cost Roseburg the meet when the two failed to pass the stick within the prescribed 20 yard limit.

No Points For Final
As a result, no points were given on the final event and Ashland walked off with meet honors.

The field events opened the meet activity with the Indian thinclads plagued by the same old difficulty—no consistent point winners in the field competition. Ashland took all the first place honors in the field competition. However, Summer of Roseburg did share up a four-way tie for first in the high jump, preventing Ashland from making a clean sweep of all the field competition.

Ashland's big Jerry Langer turned in two remarkable performances in the discus throw and shot put. Langer heaved the discus 138 feet 1 inch, which, by high school standards, should win any meet. Langer put the shot 48 feet 6 inches to take first place honors in that event.

Langer took the individual scoring honors by virtue of his two first place wins, giving him a total of 10 points.

In the running events, the Indians finished in the money. Roseburg took five first place honors in the eight running events.

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Glide Wins B Track Meet

Oakland Youth Sets 3 New Records; Yoncalla Second

Records fell like the rain which plagued contestants in the second annual Douglas county B league track meet on Finlay field Saturday afternoon, as six old marks were shattered and top times were posted in two new events. Glide high school won the meet with a score of 41-1/2 points.

Three of the six new records were set by Oakland's "one man track team," Don Robertson. He broad jumped 19 feet 1 1/2 inches, high jumped 5 feet 8 inches, and ran the 200 yard low hurdles in 23.2 seconds, to establish new records in these events.

Others listed:
The other record-breaking performances were in the discus throw, with Rust of Yoncalla heaving the pancake 107 feet 3 inches; Wheeler of Canyonville running the 880 yard run in two minutes 18.5 seconds; Shrum of Glide doing the mile in five minutes 43 seconds; Davis of Riddle clearing the pole vault at 9 feet 6 inches; and Wise of Yoncalla turning in a 19.2 seconds time in the high hurdle event. Both hurdle events were run for the first time this year and are therefore new records.

Robertson, by virtue of his three record-breaking performances, won the individual scoring honors with 15 points, the total points collected by the Oakland team.

Yoncalla Second
Yoncalla placed second in the six-way meet with 30 points. Canyonville third with 30 points, Riddle fourth with 25 1/2 points, Oakland fifth with 15 points, and Drain took the cellar spot with 6 points.

Coach Les Wright's Glide thinclads took only one first place in the winning the meet, as the Wildcats collected most of their points from second and third place winnings.
