Your Host Will Get Another Racing Chance

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 8.—(AP)—Your Host, the Hollywood hope of movie maker William Goetz, will get another chance to earn his oscar.

The souped-up comet from the Pacific Coast didn't convince his handlers in the Kentucky Derby that he can't carry his great speed more than a mile. He will have to show them in the Preakness May 20.

Although an 8-5 favorite, Your Host lagged in a badly beaten ninth in Saturday's Derby.

Trainer Harry Daniels said five different horses challenged Your Host's place in the rose classic.

"It's tough enough beating one horse," he said, "but when they keep coming at you, one at a time, only a super horse can stand up under it."

Proof Coming Up
So Daniels said he would take his horse to Baltimore for proof positive. If he shows he can't go the route, he'll be dropped back to sprints. The Preakness covers a mile and three-sixteenths, one sixteenth shorter than the Derby.

The great Derby champ Middleground was taking it easy, meanwhile.

He's among at least seven Derby horses that will go after the second gem of American racing's triple crown. The others are Hill Prince, second in the Derby; Mr. Trouble, third and the also-rans Sunglow, Oil Capital, Hawley and Your Host.

Backers Confident
Despite the close three-horse finish in the Derby, a lot of Middleground's followers argue the other horses are wasting their time challenging him in the Preakness. They point out that the King Ranch campaigner from Texas emphasized his superiority by winning from the worst post position. He broke from the extreme outside and thus had farther to run than the rest of the field.

That argument couldn't find willing listeners around the Hill Prince and Mr. Trouble camps. There horses were as strong as Middleground at the finish, they hold forth.

Neutral opinion-holders rate all three horses as potentially great and think they will be beating each other all year in stakes for three-year-olds.

Knifed GI Saved After 5 'Deaths'

TOKYO, May 8.—(AP)—Pfc. Daniel N. Stoeker, 19, "died" five times last week but is still alive. His life to a combination of luck and surgical skill.

The Phillips, Wis., soldier owes his life to a combination of luck and surgical skill. He was admitted Saturday to Tokyo General hospital with a knife wound in his heart. Doctors could find no pulse and no blood pressure.

Col. N. W. Anderson, chief surgeon, began to operate. Anderson said he discovered an inch long wound in the right auricle, the chamber that receives blood from the veins. Several quarts of the blood had drained into the chest cavity.

Eachtime he took a stitch to close the wound, Anderson said, Stoeker's heart stopped beating. Each time the doctor gently massaged the heart five minutes until it resumed beating. That happened four times.

"When the stitching was all done," Anderson said, "the boy's heart stopped again. It only resumed normal pulsations after 15 minutes of massage."

Four quarts of blood plasma were given.

Hospital authorities said Stoeker's condition today was "very good." He still was in an oxygen tent but showed good appetite and healthy color.

Details of the stabbing were not reported.

TRUMAN TALK ADDED

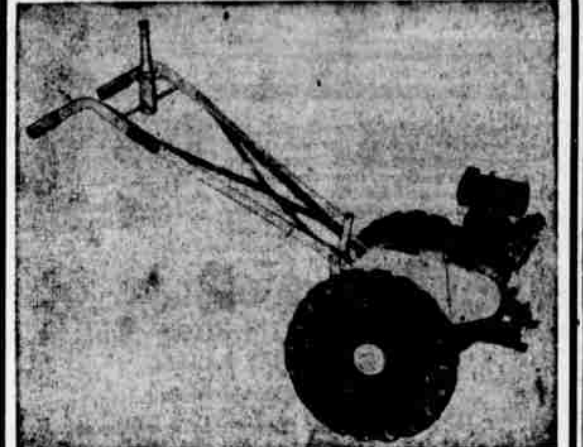
WASHINGTON.—(AP)—President Truman has added a ninth formal speech to the itinerary for his western tour.
