

Masons Will Present Degrees At Grants Pass

4-H Club Hog Projects Have Big Increase

Oregon's 4-H club swine projects have witnessed a 112 percent increase in three years, Cal G. Monroe, state 4-H club agent, has announced.

Last year, he said, there were 642 different club members enrolled in swine projects and a total of 2,478 hogs were included in projects. Just 302 club members carried swine projects in 1946. Because the cost of a weaner pig is not excessive, Monroe recommends market swine projects for beginning livestock 4-H club members. To carry the project to completion, a club member must own one or more pigs, feed and care for them, keep a record book, attend club meetings and exhibit the project at a fair.

Buy at Weaning Time
Best time to buy, the state agent suggests, is at weaning time when young pigs will weigh 35 to 40 pounds. March and early April farrowed pigs usually work out best, Monroe believes.

As special incentives for swine project club members, companies and individuals offer cash awards as well as animals to competing 4-H members. The Portland Union Stockyard company, through W. E. Williams, president, conducts an annual pig feeding contest which is judged at Pacific International. The contest is based on an exhibit of four market hogs. Cash awards totalling \$800 are provided by the company.

At the Oregon State fair, the Valley Packing company, Salem, sponsors a similar contest.
