

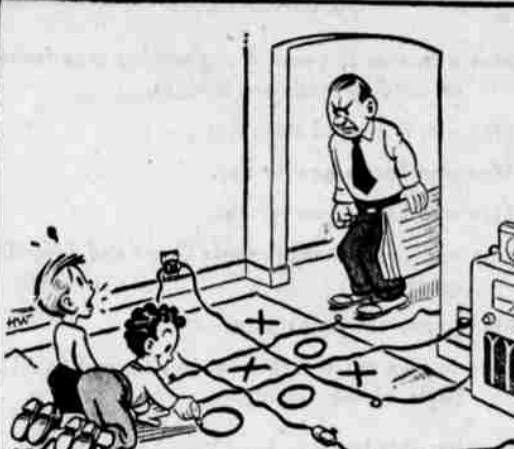

Dillard Church History Recalled

The quaint old Dillard church rests on the bank beside the winding South Umpqua river in the heart of Dillard. Framed in the background is fir-covered Mt. Bethe, which seems to tower protectively over this modest church. It was here in this picturesque setting that the early settlers moved their church after they purchased it.

This rural church was originally built around 1885 by the late Sam Miller, well known in Dillard history. It was used for many years by other denominations until about 1919 when the Methodist congregation bought it. Mrs. Carol Hercher fixes the date of the moving of the church by an important event in her life. She says that her husband, Lawrence Hercher, came home from the Navy in August, 1919. That autumn the church was purchased and moved to its present location. Services were being held by March 1920.

Those assisting with the moving of the church were Harry Davis, Luther Royer, Lawrence Hercher, his father R. A. Hercher, John Lewis, John Campbell and Mrs. Hercher's father, S. A. Roser, and others. The first services were conducted by the Rev. R. S. Bishop, followed by the Rev. Carlton Jones. Throughout the years the Dillard church has been the center of spiritual and social life of the people in the community. The Rev. Walter W. Appleyard has been pastor since November, 1946. He and his wife, Imogene, and her mother, Mrs. Myrtle Burtch, have grown into the hearts of the people. During his pastorate the attendance has so increased that it has been necessary to build an annex, which now is inadequate for the needs of the Sunday school.

Dying Witness Is Subject Of Ruling

SALEM, May 10 — (AP) — The state supreme court ruled Tuesday that if a witness dies on the witness stand before being cross-examined, his entire testimony should be disregarded by the jury.

The high court made this ruling in a Polk county case in which Mary R. Best was awarded \$5,500 damages for injuries received in an auto accident. The verdict was against Marie S. Tavenner.

During the trial, Dr. Gussie A. Niles, Salem, a witness for Mrs. Best, died while giving her direct testimony. Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker ordered the jury to disregard everything Dr. Niles said. He said it would be unfair to consider her testimony because the defendant had no chance to cross-examine her.

The supreme court decision, by Justice George Rossman, upheld Judge Walker.

The accident occurred Jan. 14, 1946, when cars driven by the two parties to the suit collided.
