

Eugene Defeats Willows, 12-6, In West League

Pittsburg and Medford were nipping at Klamath Falls' Far West league lead today, tied at second place with eight wins and five defeats, a half game behind the gems.

The Pittsburg Diamonds cut a full game off Klamath Falls' margin in walloping the Gems 6 to 1 last night. Meanwhile, the Medford Rogues tumbled Marysville from second to fourth place in edging the Braves 6-5.

Redding nipped Reno 3 to 2 and Eugene defeated Willows 12 to 6 in other league games.

Gene Valentine was credited with his fourth straight victory of the season in Pittsburg's win. He held the Gems to seven scattered hits, fanned 19 and walked four. Manager Vince DiMaggio got his sixth homer of the year for the Diamonds, a one-run clout in the third inning.

Third baseman Al Bolen's single, coupled with a Marysville error, was good for two runs and provided Medford's margin in the top of the ninth inning.

An eighth-inning homer by manager Ray Perry gave Redding its win over Reno.

A seven-run second inning was all Eugene needed to tumble Willows. The big frame was rolled up on four walks, two men hit by the pitcher and a homer by Wally Erickson with the bases loaded.

Willows scored five runs on homers—a two-run blow in the eighth by shortstop Bill Holt and a three-run clout in the ninth by catcher Jake Heimuth.

The teams complete their current series tonight.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 11—Beaver sports fans will get their first look at new men who will play leading roles on Oregon State's football and basketball teams next school year here Saturday when the athletic department presents "All Sports Day," a triple-header of major sport attractions.

Events included on the program are the annual dual track meet between Oregon State and undefeated Oregon on Bell field at 1 p.m.; and the final spring football intra-squad battle on Bell field at 3:30 p.m.; and the final spring basketball contest between next winter's prospective varsity and the alumni all-stars led by Red Rocha, 6-8 all-America Beaver center in 1947, in Gill coliseum at 8 p.m.

Coach Kip Taylor will divide his football squad and staff into two evenly matched teams for the regulation length grid contest. Pacific Coast conference officials will work the game and kickoffs, punts and all the other trimmings will be included.

Promising sophomores and transfers who will show their wares in public for the first time include Jim Cordial, Bill Storey and Don Bradley ends; Doug Hogland, tackle; Chuck Oettinger and Darrell Everett, guards; Gene Taft, Bob Cornelison, Bob Redkey and Lowell Trask, halfbacks; and Bud Woodward, Sam Baker and Dick Colborn, fullbacks.

In the basketball game, two prize transfers will be making their initial appearance on State's varsity. They are Danny Johnston, speedy guard from Compton, Cal.; and Jim Sugrue, forward or center from Placer, Cal. JC Dan Torrey, senior guard, will lead the 1950-51 Orange quintet.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 11—Darrell Robinson, an outstanding member of the Oregon football team from 1946 through 1949, has been named ticket manager and field representative for the Oregon athletic department, it was announced this week by Leo Harris, director of athletics.

Robinson, who set a new Pacific Coast conference record for pass receiving last season when he snagged 31 before being forced out for the season with injuries, played end for the Duck varsity for the first time in 1946 and concluded his career last fall.

The former Oregon star was graduated from the university last winter with a degree in Business. Before entering Oregon he was a member of the powerful Eugene high school football teams.

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Two Webfoot Teams Remain Undefeated

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 11—Two Oregon spring sports teams will be trying for undefeated seasons this weekend as the 1950 campaign reaches its final stage. Coach Bill Bowerman's track squad, already assured of at least a tie for the dual meet title, invades Corvallis for the annual meet with Oregon State. Coach Sid Milligan's golf squad, northern Division dual champions, tries for a clean sweep in 1950 when it meets Oregon State at the Eugene Country Club.

Both teams will be heavily favored. The track squad, which has lost only one dual meet since Coach Bowerman came to Oregon, has already scored decisive wins over Idaho, Washington State and Washington, Washington State and Idaho in conference matches.

In other action this weekend the annual Oregon-Oregon State baseball series opens Friday with a game at Corvallis. The two teams return to Eugene on Saturday for the second game, scheduled for Howe field at 2 p.m. It will be the first action for both teams since returning from the long trip through the northern part of the league.

The Duck tennis squad will be away for its final action before the Northern Division tournament. On Friday the Webfoots under Coach Robeson Bailey meet College of Puget Sound at Tacoma and on Saturday tackle the defending champions from Washington at Seattle.

In freshman competition, the Duckling track team meets Oregon State's Rooks at Hayward field on Friday and the Duckling baseballers tackle the OSC Rooks on Howe field. The baby Webfoots already hold one win over the Rooks in track and the baseball competition will be the first of the 1950 season, which has been nearly washed out by the constant bad weather.

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
