Gambling Victim Sues; Pastor To Be Funds Custodian

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 13.—(AP)—A 52-year-old widow with "an irresistible impulse to gamble" has asked a minister to handle the \$72,099 she hopes to recover from bingo operators.

Mrs. Mary Young, 52, last January filed suit for that sum. In court Friday approval was given for the Rev. Vincent Stageberg of Washougal to enter the suit as a plaintiff because she signed over to him, as trustee, any money she might recover.

He is to dole it out to her in monthly sums as needed because, the document said, she is fearful "she will be unable to resist the temptation to gamble" it away.

She signed the agreement last month but it came to light only Friday as the minister was allowed to join the suit against Hollywood Quizo and its operators, Sonney Heath and John McGilivray. The Rev. Mr. Stageberg would get an annual trustee fee of 1 per cent of the first \$10,000 and 1/2 of 1 per cent of the remainder of the amount recovered.

Mrs. Young's complaint says that at the Hollywood Quizo house, a bingo operation licensed by the city, she was "victimized and reduced from a prosperous condition to absolute poverty," and was dependent on public welfare for support.

Her complaint says that in the seven years preceding last August she lost \$72,099 at bingo, "a gambling game," with the biggest one-month loss \$4,980.

She wants it back. And "to guard against her weakness" wants the minister to handle it.

KLAMATH FALLS, May 13.—(AP)—A county road foreman, Samuel V. Godard, dropped dead Friday in a fight with a truck driver he had just discharged.

District attorney D. E. Van Vactor said death was attributed to a heart attack.

Godard, 55, became embroiled in an argument with the driver, John Holloway, and picked up a shovel to defend himself. Van Vactor said he apparently struck Holloway on the head with the shovel, then dropped to the ground.

Holloway is in a local hospital with a severe head wound.

The fight took place at a road work site in the south suburban area four miles outside Klamath Falls.
