U. S. Mother On East Tour

NEW YORK — (AP) — Mrs. Henry Roe Cloud of Oregon is off on a round of activities honoring her selection as American Mother of 1950.

She arrived from her West Linn, Ore., home Friday with words of hope for the future.

"Every generation seems to think that the children are going to the bow-wow, but I think they are more alert to the times in which they live," she said.

"This generation may be responsible for a more marvelous civilization than we have ever dreamed of," the 59-year-old woman added.

She was accompanied here by one of her four daughters, Mrs. Lillian Freed of Portland. Another, Mrs. Raleigh Butterfield, 27, of Brooklyn, met her here.

The mother of the year, who is part Indian, said, "it is up to mothers the world over to bring about peace, instead of sitting back and saying, 'we're going to have war and there's nothing we can do about it.'"

She said she considered mothers more important to the cause of peace than Congressmen and statesmen. She warned that their efforts, though, must be more than merely saying, "we won't send our sons to war." They must "know what we're talking about" in efforts for peace, she said.

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Maryhill Museum Receives Famous Rumanian Paintings

MARYHILL, Wash. — (AP) — The long road from Bucharest, Rumania, to security behind thick concrete and steel walls of the museum that Samuel Hill built atop a bluff on the Columbia river has been made safely by 45 old master paintings.

Their arrival was announced by C. R. Dolph, curator, who said they went on display May 15 for "at least the rest of the summer."

They are war refugee paintings and a part of the collection of Dr. O. K. Cosla, for 20 years professor of medicine at the University of Bucharest. When war came to Rumania in 1938 he and his wife fled, removing the Cosla collection of 200 old masters the day before the enemy arrived. Except for a showing at Sacramento the paintings have not been displayed elsewhere in this country. Dr. Cosla has the rest of the collection in his New York and San Francisco homes. He is now in charge of experiment stations for medical plants.

Many Masters Featured
Dutch, Venetian, Flemish, French, Spanish and English old masters are included in the pictures on wood panels, canvas, linen or copper. Dolph said they mark a new

high in art for the Pacific Northwest where the only previous introduction of centuries-old works was a brief showing of the Berlin paintings at Portland.

"The three graces" by Petrus Paulus Rubens (1577-1640) is one of the pictures. There are two by Jan Breughel, the elder; three by Frans Hals, Anton Van Dyck, Hobbema and Murillo are among the 37 artists. A Rembrandt may be sent later.

The collection was founded in 1760 when Ann De Clerici brought a select group of Italian and Spanish paintings as part of her dowry when she married William K. Cosla. Their son added French and Belgian paintings and Joseph Cosla the doctor's father, continued the tradition. When Dr. Cosla inherited it in 1920 he continued to buy other works of art.

Dr. Cosla married a San Francisco woman in 1926. That marriage eventually played a part in the removing of the paintings from Bucharest a day before the enemy arrived. So hurriedly was this necessary that many were brought without their frames.

Intended Residence
Hill, a prominent northwest builder, started construction of the Maryhill museum in 1911, intending it for a residence. The war inter-

rupted the work. Queen Marie of Rumania dedicated the unfinished project in 1926 after Hill decided to convert it into a museum. He endowed it as a permanent exhibition place for art treasures. The building was completed at a cost of approximately half a million dollars and was opened 10 years ago. That figure, art experts say, is approximately the value of the part of the Cosla collection now at Maryhill.

Gifts from personal possessions of King Albert of Belgium the old French royalty, Queen Victoria and members of her family, art works of the western world, Indian material from the Columbia river basin, gifts by the late Pope Pius XI from the Vatican collection and \$90,000 worth of rare books and manuscripts are included in the permanent displays. The museum opens each April and continues until October, showing a changing display of visiting exhibits.

Outstanding Contribution
Dolph announced that the loan of the paintings is an outstanding contribution to northwest art and a fitting event for the 10th anniversary of the Maryhill Museum of Fine Arts.

The museum is four miles west of Stonehege, another Samuel Hill dedication. It was built in memory of the Klickitat county men who gave their lives during World War I. It is an exact replica as to design, size and position in reference to the sun of the stonehege on Salisbury plain, Wiltshire, England.

Hill's ashlar is an unpretentious concrete vault, built close by Stonehege on the side of the bluff overlooking the Columbia. Few visitors to the museum or Stonehege see the vault.

"The Cosla collection equals the fondest dreams of the museum's founder," Dolph said.

Man Falls To Death

PORTLAND, May 13 — (AP) — Frank Lundmark, 54, Longview, tumbled out of his third-floor hotel window today to death on the sidewalk below.

Police said they thought the fall was accidental. Evidence indicated that Lundmark had been chewing tobacco, leaped out the window to spit, and lost his balance.

A passerby, Charles W. Seaver, found the man's body at 2:30 a.m. today.

Lundmark apparently had been preparing to go to bed when he fell. His bed covers were turned neatly back, and his outer clothing was folded on a chair.

POLIO VICTIM DIES

PORTLAND, May 13 — (AP) — The first cases of poliomyelitis in Oregon since April 1, were reported Wednesday by the state board of health. Two are in Clackamas county and one in Lane county. One of the Clackamas victims — a 12-year-old boy — died.
