

Flattops Would Launch Atom War Offensive, American Admirals Say

NORFOLK NAVAL BASE, Va.—(NEA)—The navy may have shushed its open criticism of the air force B-36 super-bomber. But the admirals are sticking tight to their belief that the aircraft carrier task force is still the most effective weapon to use against a potential enemy.

Time and time again, this idea was drummed into a group of 80 businessmen, educators and newspaper men invited to attend Navy Secretary Francis P. Matthews' civilian orientation course at Norfolk naval base. The week-long course included a score of lectures by the navy's top broad, reflecting their current thinking on national defense and naval policy. This was followed by two days' demonstrations at sea aboard aircraft carriers and submarines.

"We are still on the edge of a shooting war," said Undersecretary of the Navy Dan A. Kimball, key-noting the course.

"Naval strategy has remained unchanged from the days of the rowed galley," declared Prof. E. B. Potter of the Annapolis faculty. "World war II produced a new instrument of naval warfare in the carrier," he continued. "New instruments demand a change in tactics, but the changes should not be made too fast."

As an example, Prof. Potter cited that the Civil war was fought with wooden ships, in spite of the fact that the ironclad Monitor and Merrimack had been called the "ultimate instruments of war."

"Trouble Any Day"

Then Vice Admiral Felix B. Stump, commander of the U. S. Atlantic fleet air force gave the carrier the business. "The international situation is now so acute we may have trouble any day," he said. He analyzed the U. S. problem as first to keep war away from American shores, second to keep Communism off western Europe.

England can't exist without food imports, said the admiral. That means there must be full control of the seas. And with seven-ninths of the earth's surface water, the navy is still a factor.

Admiral Stump advances these arguments in developing the navy's theory that the carrier is the best weapon.

The carrier task "group" as used at the end of World War II consisted of three to five carriers, maneu-

vering in a five-mile area. If the carriers are kept at least a mile and a half apart, the group is safe against atomic attack, since only one could be knocked out by an A-bomb dropped in this area.

Even this would require penetration of the carrier defense forces. Surrounding the carriers are rings of cruisers and destroyers. A 37-ship task force is capable of delivering over 800,000 rounds, or 155 tons of anti-aircraft fire a minute, at ranges varying from 3000 to 42,000 feet.

Advantages Cited

Main attribute of the carrier is that it is a mobile airfield, capable of moving 2000 miles within 48 hours. In any defense of Europe, Admiral Stump believes carrier forces would be able to move into the Mediterranean and the Arctic.

While operation in close quarters involves obvious risks, one of the frequently overlooked carrier advantages is that as a target, it sucks in enemy planes and destroys them. In the last war, the navy claims that the record of enemy planes shot down by carrier aircraft was 18 to one U. S. plane lost. The ratio for land-based planes was seven enemy planes shot down for one Allied plane lost.

For operations in Asian waters, Admiral Stump believes that carrier task forces would be able to move into the Arabian sea, the Persian gulf, Bay of Bengal, China sea and Bering sea. In the last war, carrier task forces remained at sea for six months at a time, being supplied by sea.

WASHINGTON, May 12 — (AP) — after they entered the country by joining an organization — the Communist party — which advocated forcible overthrow of the government.

The two were named as Samson Milgram, 44, national executive secretary of the IWO, and Andrew Dmytryshyn, described by Justice department officials as "a prominent national officer" of IWO. The same officials described Milgram as "an important figure" in the Communist movement. The government tried unsuccessfully to deport him in 1932.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11. — (AP) — Gov. Earl Warren and James Roosevelt hunted votes in the same neighborhoods here yesterday but with different techniques.

Warren contented himself with moving quietly, meeting campaign workers, talking informally here

and there and doing some hand-shaking.

Roosevelt attracted crowds with sirens and music, delivered speeches from the platform of his trailer-truck at various spots, answering questions and outlining his election promise.

Warren, a Republican, and Roosevelt, a Democrat, each is seeking the gubernatorial nomination of both parties under California's cross-filing system.

The two made oblique attacks on one another without mentioning the other's name. They were at times within sight of one another, but to all intents and purposes, failed to take notice of the fact.

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Doctor Sander Supports Family By Tilling Soil

CANDIA, N. H., — (AP) — Dr. Hermann N. Sander has turned to tilling the soil for his neighbors at \$4 an hour to support his wife and three young daughters.

George Woodbury, a close friend said the Candia physician has been working from sunup to sunset since shortly after the state board of registration in medicine revoked his license to practice.

Neighbors of Dr. Sander said his rate of pay for plowing and cultivating farmlands of the area is \$4 an hour.

Dr. Sander's right to continue his general practice was taken from him shortly after his acquittal on a first degree murder charge in the death of a hopelessly ill cancer patient.

But the state medical board left the door open for him to apply for reinstatement on June 19.

Woodbury, who headed a committee to accept contributions to help defray cost of the trial that gained world wide attention, said \$21,000 had been collected but that most of it was spent on legal fees.

"The fund was never intended to be used for anything but immediate post-trial expenses," Woodbury said, adding:

"As a result the Sander family has tightened its belt, so to speak, and operating on the theory that if you can't earn it — don't spend it."

Woodbury said that many of Dr. Sander's fellow physicians in the Manchester, N. H., area have hired him to till their soil.

Dr. Sander supplies his own machine for plowing and cultivating the soil.

This he moves about from job to job on a trailer attached to his automobile.

Traffic Deaths Decrease In Douglas During 1949

Only two Oregon counties, Curry and Wheeler, went through 1949 without a traffic fatality, but sizable death reductions in major counties enabled the state to mark up its overall 15 percent decrease for the year, Secretary of State Newberry reports.

Ten counties posted increases of 50 percent or more over 1948 while eight enjoyed similar decreases. Reductions in Multnomah, Marion, Linn, and Lane counties contributed most to the life-saving campaign, Newberry said. Douglas county recorded 15 deaths for the year against 26 in 1948.

Although no cities over 10,000 population came through the year without a traffic death, urban areas as a whole reduced fatalities 21 percent while rural areas posted a 13 percent reduction.

Three-fourths of Oregon's traffic deaths occur in rural areas.
