Doukhobors Wreck Rail Bridge In 'Reprisal'

GRAND FORKS, B. C., May 16.—(CP)—A Canadian Pacific railway bridge was blasted Sunday night in what provincial police said was a "reprisal raid" by Sons of Freedom Doukhobors.

Bombing of the 157-foot steel bridge on the CPR's Kettle Valley line followed the arrest Sunday of 40 "Sons" on arson and nude parading.

The bridge, 2 1/2 miles east of this east Kootenay settlement, was badly damaged but a railway spokesman said traffic on the line will be resumed tomorrow night.

The arrests brought the number of Doukhobors arrested in recent uprisings to more than 200. The chain of fire raids began April 14 at Krestog, Sons of Freedom stronghold near Nelson, B. C. Authorities have warned that more arrests can be expected here.

Gasoline Price Cut, Distribution On Common Basis For All Demanded In Federal Suit Against Oil Companies

LOS ANGELES, May 16.—(P)—The government moved Friday to reduce gasoline prices and end voluntary oil conservation—which it contends operates to hold down the supply and keep prices up.

It also wants to force major oil companies to make their products available to independents on the same basis as to other majors.

"It is the hope of the government that by freeing retail and wholesale outlets of restraints, effective competition can be restored to the industry and result in lower prices," a spokesman said.

The companies contend that conservation by establishing production quotas at the wells—saves an important natural resource.

Seven major companies and the conservation committee of California's oil producers are named in a suit filed in federal court by Herbert A. Bergson, assistant U. S. attorney general in charge of the department of justice's anti-trust division.

Four Demands Listed

The action demands among other things:

1. Dissolution of the conservative committee and an injunction preventing establishment of other voluntary conservation practices not authorized by state law. (California is the only big oil producing state where conservation is practiced voluntarily by the companies; in other states it is under state government regulation).
2. Divorcement of retail service stations and wholesale outlets of any refined petroleum products, except at refineries and marine terminals.
3. Requirement that oil trunk pipelines and feeding pipelines, owned or operated by any defendant company, be made available for use by any independent producer or refiner, on the same conditions as made available to any co-defendant.
4. Outlawing stabilization of prices through one company posting a price list as an alleged guide to other companies.

Named in the action are Standard Oil of California, The Texas Company, Shell Oil of New York, Tidewater Association, Richfield Oil, General Petroleum and Union Oil.
