

Citation Ready For Comeback

ALBANY, Calif., May 17.—(AP)—Citation, starting another comeback, is scheduled for a six-fur-long tussle today, in a race Golden Gate fields tailored for him especially.

Citation, aspiring to a million dollars, gets into the \$4,000 allowance with 120 pounds. That's 12 less than he carried to second place in the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap June 24 at 14 miles.

But he'll have to wait until he reaches Chicago to attain his \$1,000,000. With total earnings of \$909,200, he can't quite pick up the \$91,800 difference here.

'Kid' Matthews Out-Slugs Jones

SEATTLE, May 17.—(AP)—The flailing fists of Harry (Kid) Matthews tightened the Seattle batter's bid for the world's light heavyweight boxing championship last night.

Matthews and Reuben Jones, ranked No. 7 in the light heavy field, were mauling head-to-head in the third round when the hometown prince laced out with a long left that caught the New Yorker flush on the jaw. As Jones' knees sagged, Matthews pinned him with a sharp right.

That was it although Jones made an effort to rise at the count of seven, tumbled forward and regained his feet for a split second after the count ended. He had to be held back by his handlers as he sought to keep on with the fray. Matthews weighed 172, two pounds less than his opponent.

The semi-windup also ended in a knockout, Lou Joseph, 150, dropping Buford Ransom, 147, in the sixth round of their scheduled eight-rounder. Both are from Seattle.

Rocky Graziano Looks At LaMotta

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 17.—(AP)—Rocky Graziano today was virtually certain of a shot at the middleweight crown he says he "just loaned" to Jake LaMotta "for a little while."

Graziano knocked out Buffalo's Henry Brimm last night at 2:14 of the fourth round in what was widely viewed as a tuneup for a title match with LaMotta in New York's Madison Square Garden June 14.

The scheduled 10-rounder drew 11,989 fans, only five short of the Memorial auditorium record, set in 1948, when Brimm fought Ray Robinson.

Graziano weighed 159 pounds and Brimm, 157.
Rocky told newsmen after the bout: "This fight is just what I needed. I've really got the confidence I need."

PORTLAND, Ore., May 17.—(AP)—Don Rogers, 135, scored a four-round T.K.O. over a fellow Portlander, Frisco Baracac, 134, last night to win the mythical Oregon lightweight title.

Baracac won the first two rounds but was staggered in the third as Rogers opened up. In the final heat Baracac went down three times before the bout was halted. It had been billed for 12 rounds.

Both Stojack and Atlas are hoping for a shot at Bulldog Bob Cummings and his newly-won coast Junior heavyweight championship.
