Populace Gives Volunteer Aid To Rebuild Factory

LEWISTON, Mich., May 16.—(AP)—Ever hear the expression—"A heart as big as the whole north woods?"

It might well have originated in this tiny woodland village (pop. 300).

Last Thursday a fire swept the hamlet's main industry—a factory which made custom-built leg calms.

The factory, employing 30 persons, was totally destroyed. Loss was estimated between \$50,000 and \$70,000.

Owners John Walter and Paul Heine didn't know when or if they could get back in production.

But the ashes were hardly cool before the townspeople pitched in to help.

At night cars pulled up nearby and the men worked by car headlights.

By Saturday a foundation was completed. Men and women came from the surrounding towns to help.

Some firms sent trucks and others provided men. Buzz Cogins, a grocery owner, supplied milk and coffee. Al Lawe, a baker, held a bake sale, proceeds going to the factory.

The new quonset-type main building probably will be finished by Wednesday.

"I've never seen anything like it," said Heine. "I guess they're just good people—that's all."

Special Issues Facing Benton County Voters

CORVALLIS, (AP)—Two county issues will be voted upon here at a special Benton county election to be held in conjunction with the regular May primary. One measure would levy a \$25,000 tax for 10 years to enable the county to purchase a bookmobile to be operated in connection with the Corvallis city library and carry supplies of books to various rural sections. The other would levy a tax of not to exceed one half mill to combat the wild garlic and tansy ragwort weeds. It would place the entire county in a weed control district. The district is sought to control the weeds to preserve the purity of seed crops grown in this area.

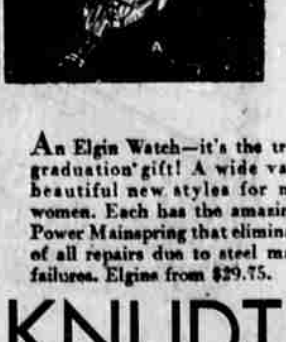
