

Pulp And Paper Workers Given Wage Increases

PORTLAND, — (AP) — Pay increases of 3 percent and added holiday and vacation benefits for 15,000 AFL workers in Pacific coast pulp and paper manufacturing plants were reported here.

A management statement, at the close of eight days of negotiating for the workers in 35 Washington, Oregon and California plants, said the combined gains were the equivalent of about 7 cents an hour pay increase.

The 3 percent pay boost put the base rate at \$1.47 an hour for men and \$1.20 for women, the statement said.

Three additional paid holidays—New Year's, Memorial day and Thanksgiving—were added and a third week of paid vacation after 15 years' service was approved. The agreement calls for continuation of joint state safety conferences.

Time To Store Winter Clothes

It's time to store winter woollens where they will be safe from clothes moth damage during the warm summer months, reminds an OSC extension clothing and textiles specialist.

Although fairly active the year round, clothes moths are particularly bothersome to woolen materials during the warmer spring and summer period, Miss Lucy Lane states. It's the moth young or larvae, the specialist adds, which do the actual damage; not the adult moths themselves.

Before storing, woolen materials are either dry-cleaned or washed in a strong soap solution. Either cleaning method will effectively destroy moth eggs which may be hidden in the woolen fibers. If soiled woollens contain moth eggs are stored—tho' an open invitation for moth eggs to hatch and make themselves at home.

Miss Lane recommends packing the clean woollens in containers such as paper bags which may be sealed. When there is doubt as to the moth proofness of the container, add paradichlorobenzene crystals, she suggests.

Sun-drying and airing woolen materials is also effective against moths if the outdoor treatment is accompanied by brisk brushing. Be sure to get in around cuffs, pockets, and similar places in order to dislodge the moth eggs.

Closets used for woolen storage are best when cracks are filled and when equipped with a door gasket. If paradichlorobenzene crystals are used—one pound will do for a small closet—tie them in a cloth sack and hang them high in the closet. Fumes from the crystals are heavier than air and will drift toward the closet bottom.

Before storing woollens, it is a good idea to spray the container with a 5 percent DDT solution. The material, if it is non-staining may also be sprayed directly on woollens.

Here is a moth proofing solution recommended by Miss Lane: use the moth proof solutions containing fluoride compounds and dilute with nine parts of water to make a rinse. Woolen articles may be rinsed in the solution and dried in the normal way. They will be moth repellent until the articles are re-washed.

Wildlife conservationists recommend that farmers and foresters leave a few hollow trees for raccoons, squirrels and other animals and birds.

Jap Prisoners' Kin To Besiege Soviet Embassy

TOKYO, — (AP) — The families of 10,000 Japanese war prisoners still missing in Russia have decided to camp on the doorsteps of the Soviet embassy until they find out what happened to the prisoners.

The sitdown demonstration is scheduled for June 12 after a meeting by relatives of the estimated 37,000 Japanese prisoners of war still unaccounted for by the Russians.

A vacant lot next to the embassy will be utilized by the sitdowners. Zenichi Kamijima said the Japanese all have letters or other evidence indicating their relatives are still alive. He said they were bitter about the Russian attitude and "now demand that Russian deceit" must be exposed.

The Russians say all Japanese prisoners of war have been repatriated.

Spy Charge Hits Korean Aide Of U. S. Embassy

SEOUL, May 18 — (AP) — A Korean translator employed in the U. S. embassy here has been arrested on a charge of espionage.

Police Chief Kim Tai Sun said the translator is Kim Woo Sik, 28. He had been employed in the embassy since 1947 as a clerk in the consulate and since the winter of last year as reporter and interpreter for the political section of the embassy.

The chief said the translator told him his life had been threatened by Communist North Koreans unless he obtained information for them. The chief said Kim had supplied data for about 10 months but had never informed police.

The arrest of Kim followed apprehension of another Korean several days ago. The police chief said the first Korean confessed and implicated Kim and a third person not yet arrested.

Rita Hayworth Severing Ties With Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Rita Hayworth is cutting her ties with Hollywood.

Charles T. Spencer, representative of the actress and her husband, Aly Khan, says she is selling her home and furniture here and that this indicates she is not planning "to return here in the near future."

The 11-room ranch style house in the Brentwood park area is being sold to a Beverly Hills physician for "about \$50,000," said Spencer, declining to give the name of the buyer.

Spencer said that in his talk with the couple they told him they are very happy and that any rumors to the contrary are without foundation.

Miss Hayworth purchased the home in 1946. She and her former husband, Orson Welles, lived there briefly.

Street Cars Halt To Be Tribute To Dead Unionist

CHICAGO, May 18 — (AP) — All of Chicago's street cars, elevated trains and buses under operation of the Chicago transit authority will be halted for one minute at 2 p.m. today in a tribute to a dead labor leader.

The one-minute cessation will coincide with the beginning of funeral services for Joseph J. Kehoe, president of division 241 of the Street Car Men's union, and nationally known AFL leader.

Kehoe, 68, died last Monday.

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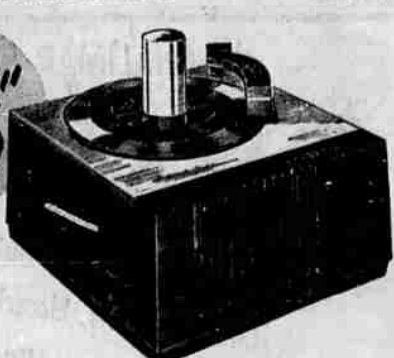
