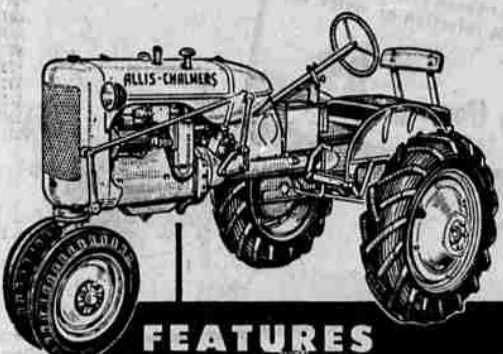

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Roseburg Seniors Win Three-Way Interclass Track Meet At Finlay

The senior class athletes of the Roseburg high school won the annual interclass track meet on Finlay field Wednesday afternoon.

The seniors won the three-way meet with a total of 85 points. The junior class trackmen amassed a total of 41 2/3 points for second place and the sophomore class was runner-up with 24 1/3 points.

Runs Longer

For the first time this year, the running events were approximately three quarters the distance of the regular track events.

Sophomore Ed Stritzke, winning first place honors in the three quarter mile run and 660 yard run, looked like definite varsity mile material for Frank Purdy's thin-clad squad next year.

Dale Bonebrake, a senior, won the individual scoring honors with 16 1/2 points by taking first place honors in the 150 yard low hurdles, 75 yard high hurdles, the javelin throw and ran on the winning 880 yard relay team.

No New Records in Runs

Since the three quarter distances were run for the first time this year, no new records in the running events were posted. The only new record to go into the books was in the javelin throw. Dale Bonebrake heaved the javelin 125 feet 3 inches to top Orval Jennings old record, set in 1940, of 91 feet 5 inches.

Norm West, Indian baseball coach, served as chief timer for the meet. Jack Newby, basketball coach, was the official starter and the Roseburg varsity track team officiated the meet.

Citation Is Defeated In Golden Gate Race

ALBANY, Calif., May 18.—(AP)—Surprise allowance purse — that's how they billed yesterday's feature at Golden Gate fields after the mighty Citation became an unexpected entry.

And, brother, it was. But what a surprise! The Calumet Comet, second greatest money-winning thoroughbred, was beaten in the six furlong spring by a comparatively obscure Arizona-bred horse named Roman. In. Blue Border was third, two lengths back.

Roman, in wasn't roamin'. He came fireballing in three-quarters of a length ahead of Citation. The time equalled the world record of 1:08 2/5 set by Fair Trickle on the same track in 1947.

Francis Russell, who commented, "He ran a good race. He was beaten by a good horse and you can't complain about the time."

Clinic, Football Game Set At Webfoot Campus

EUGENE, May 18.—More than 100 coaches are expected to be at Hayward field Friday and Saturday for the fourth annual spring football clinic conducted by Coach Jim Aiken. Invitations were sent to all high school coaches this week and final plans for the clinic will be announced by Aiken in the near future.

In addition to the clinic, the feature of the final weekend of spring football will be the annual regulation game between the Greens and the Whites. Each season the spring squad is divided into two teams for the game which decides the supremacy of the spring season.

In the three previous games the Whites have won two and the Greens one. Last season, led by Earl Stelle, the Greens staged a 30 to 26 upset before more than 8,000 fans. The White team is made up of the first and fourth teams and the Greens are composed of the second and third teams. The same nominal price for tickets will prevail at the game again this spring, 60 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

FAMED COACH DIES

SEATTLE, May 18.—(AP)—The University of Washington's first football and rowing coach, William B. Goodwin, died yesterday at Hot Springs, Va. He was 86.

He came from Yale and coached the Huskies in 1892-93. He later coached at Stanford.
