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DELICIOUS MADE WITH MISSION LONG SPAGHETTI

And here's the Recipe:

2 lbs. veal steak	8 oz. pkg. Mission Long Spaghetti
1 cup olive oil	1 cup, fat
1 cup, salt	1 cup, cream
Pepper as desired	1 cup, paprika
1 cup hot water	

Cut steak in individual servings. Rub skillet with garlic, melt fat and brown meat thoroughly. Add salt, pepper, paprika, and cup hot water. Cover, simmer 1 1/2 hrs. Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender. Drain well. Place on warm platter, arrange meat around spaghetti. Into gravy left in pan, blend flour, then cream, stir until smooth and thickened. Pour over spaghetti, sprinkle paprika over top, garnish with toasted almonds and parsley. Serves 6 to 8
