

Training Dates Set For Oregon National Guardsmen

SALEM.—(P)—Oregon National Guardsmen will train June 19 to 24 at five different places, and they will get \$430,823 for doing it.

Major General Thomas E. Rilea, adjutant general, announced the summer training program this week.

The largest group, which includes the guardsmen of the 41st infantry division, will train at Fort Lewis, Wash. About 4,300 Oregon men will attend this camp.

More than 1,400 anti-aircraft guardsmen from Oregon and Washington will train at Camp Clatsop, Ore.

The 87 officers and men of Oregon National guard headquarters in Portland will train at the Portland armory.

Oregon's air national guard will

train at two places. The 142d aircraft control and warning squadron will go to Paine field, near Everett, Wash. The rest of the airmen will train at Walla Walla, Wash., with units from Washington, Idaho and Montana.

There are about 900 air national guardsmen in Oregon.

General Rilea said all of the army units will go to camp by train or motor convoy, while the airmen will use planes.

The federal government pays all the cost.

Red Cross Aids Victims Of Astoria Housing Slide

ASTORIA.—(P)—The Red Cross says it has committed \$67,812 to aid the families whose houses were moved from skidding Coxcomb hill, and expects to spend an eventual \$70,000.

The money went to moving costs, grading new sites, reinforcing a bridge over which the houses are moved, and moving telephone and light poles.

Mrs. Wendell Willkie May Be Offered N. Y. Candidacy

NEW YORK, May 19.—(P)—Mrs. Wendell Willkie may have the backing of both Democrats and Republicans in a coalition effort to defeat leftwing Rep. Vito Marcantonio (ALP-N.Y.), who has represented the 18th district in Congress for 16 years.

The Republicans seem all set to name Mrs. Willkie, the widow of the unsuccessful 1940 GOP presidential candidate.

In Albany, Rep. William L. Pfeiffer, New York state Republican chairman, said he had not talked with Mrs. Willkie.

Earlier Mrs. Willkie had been endorsed by Thomas J. Curran,

New York (Manhattan) county Republican chairman.

Mrs. Willkie declined to talk with newsmen but sent word from her home that she had not been approached officially on the subject.

Carmine C. DeSapio, head of Tammany hall, the Manhattan Democratic organization, expressed willingness to discuss the matter with Mrs. Willkie and Republican leaders.

There has been a great deal of talk about a Republican-Democratic-Liberal coalition to defeat the American Labor party's lone congressman.
