

Bosox Oust Tigers From Top Spot Tie

Cardinals Blow 8-0 Lead When Brooklyn Wins In Ninth On Three Errors

The Boston Red Sox knocked Detroit out of a first place tie with the New York Yankees in the American league pennant race yesterday by outslugging the Tigers, 13-12, in a wild game at Detroit. The Yanks and St. Louis Browns had an open date.

The Red Sox piled up an 11-1 lead, thanks to a seven-run barrage in the fourth inning, but the Tigers came back with six in their half of the fourth and nearly pulled the game out in the ninth.

Detroit had runners on first and third, two runs in and only one out in the last inning but Joe Dobson buckled down. He got George Kell to left a short fly to right and then picked up a Vic Wertz smash off first baseman Walt Dropo's glove and threw him out to end the game. Kell drove in five runs for Detroit.

The Cleveland Indians shaded the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3, winning in the ninth when Lou Briskie walked Bob Kennedy with the bases loaded.

Ray Scarborough turned in his fourth pitching victory as Washington downed Chicago, 7-3. He aid-

Seattle Blanks Sacramento, Quits Cellar

Tenth Inning Single Gives Padres 6-5 Win Over Portland Beavers

There is great rejoicing in Seattle and environs today. Reason: the Rainiers are out of the Pacific Coast league cellar for the first time since April 15.

This was the most noteworthy phase of a slight rearrangement in the standings as the result of last night's contests. Los Angeles is out of third place; Oakland is in. And San Diego now leads the pack by four full games.

For Manager Paul Richards and his Rainiers, the ascent from the tomb was tedious. At one point, Seattle had the unenviable record of nine victories and 26 defeats. Today, the count stands at 17 and 31; not exactly enviable, either, but it's an improvement.

How long this situation will prevail depends, of course, on the vulnerability of the Sacramento Solons and Mr. Richards' pitchers. Seattle shut out Sacramento for the second straight time last night, 3 to 0.

Vern Kindsfater accomplished the feat with a seven-hitter. Home runs by Frank Colman and Bill Schuster, and Schuster's double, accounted for Seattle's runs and made Sacramento the new cellar tenant.

Beavers Beaten In 10th
Oakland ran its winning streak to six straight by trimming second place Hollywood, 5 to 3. The A's scored it up in the last of the eighth with two runs on doubles by George Metkovich and Ray Noble and Earl Rapp's single.

At San Diego, Harvey Storey's 10th inning single sent Max West across with the run that gave the Padres a 6-to-5 triumph over the Portland Beavers. In losing its third game to San Diego, Portland scored three times in the ninth inning, only to have its 5-to-2 lead wiped out in the bottom half.

Los Angeles dropped down a notch by bowing to San Francisco in a fantastic, free swinging affair which finally ended, 18 to 14. There were 38 hits in the game, including seven home runs. Just about everybody fattened his batting average.

Angel Frankie Baumholtz stretched his hitting streak to 23 consecutive games with three doubles and a single. Brooks holder poled two round trippers for the Seals and batted in four runs.

GRACIE DeMOSS LEADS

Williams-Gray Match To Warm Mat Saturday

Eddie Williams, the Scotsman from Springfield, Mo., one of the hottest wrestlers now appearing in the Northwest, will meet Karl Gray, the Milwaukee matman, in a one-hour preliminary that is capable of "stealing the show" away from the headliner — The Great Atlas vs. Frankie Stojack.

The two-star mat program, scheduled at the Roseburg armory Saturday at 8:45 p.m., promises to attract a large crowd.

Williams, who defeated Ted Bell here last week, has lost only one match since his northwest invasion about a month ago — a close decision to Jack O'Reilly in a coast 147-lb-heavyweight championship bout. The match was so close that the Scotsman has grounds for demanding a return engagement. But in the meantime, he meets a formidable foe in Gray. The Wisconsin grappler will match his surfboard hold against Williams' effective giant swings.

The Atlas-Stojack "rubber" match has all of the cauliflower earmarks of one of the hottest skirmishes of the season, with the former WSC football and collegiate wrestling star matching his sensational airplane spin against the full-nelson employed by the former Mi. America.

The winner of the main event is certain to get a title match against Bulldog Bob Cummings coast junior heavyweight champion. Should Atlas win, he will have a chance to demonstrate whether or not northwest mat competition is inferior—as he claims. Stojack predicts that Atlas is due for a surprise. He whipped Atlas in their last meeting here, but isn't satisfied with the technical decision he won — particularly since Atlas won the first meeting with a clear-cut victory.

Elton Owen will be on hand to referee both bouts.

Italy's Top Middleweight To Battle Dick Wagner

NEW YORK, May 19—(AP)—Tiberio Mitri, Italy's undefeated European middleweight champion, makes his first bid for American acclaim in Madison Square garden tonight.

The fleet, fast-punching Italian meets Dick Wagner, strong, game light heavyweight from Toppenish, Wash.

Although this is his first showing here, the blue-eyed Italian has been established a 1-to-3 favorite on the strength of his impressive European record.

The 24-year-old invader has won 48 bouts and drawn in three others.

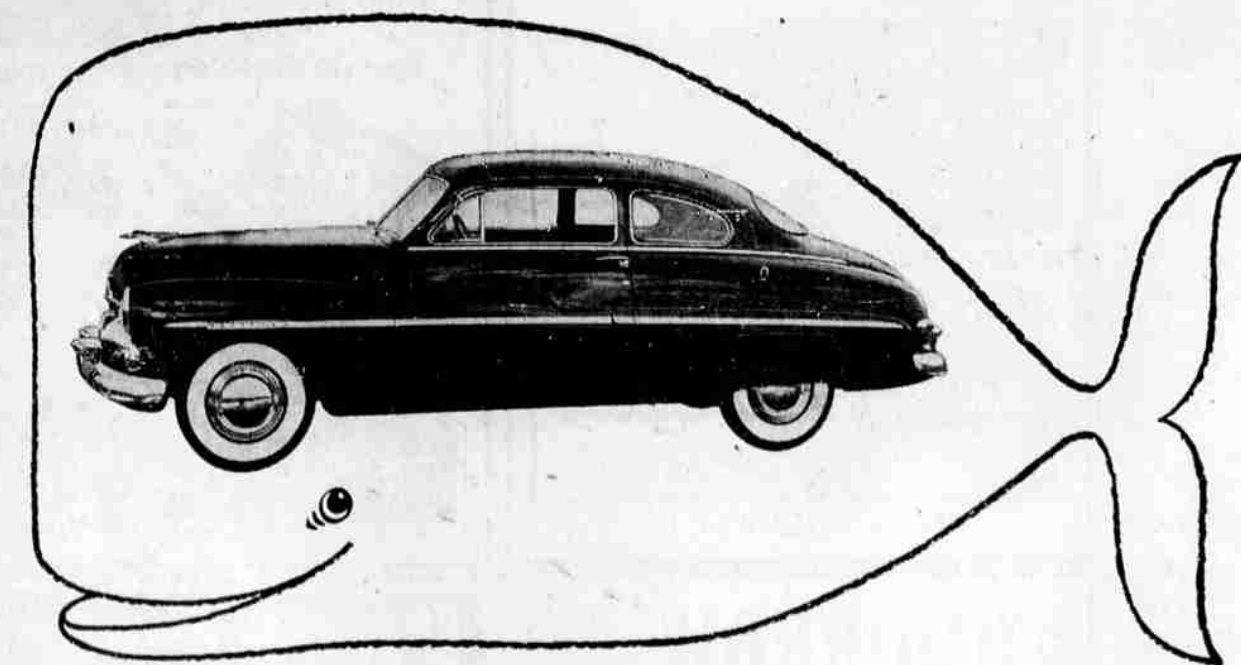
