Coming in regal splendor was Queen Marita Lewis of Longview, Wash., attired in a white formal and the traditional golf leaf tunic. She carried a dozen salmon colored roses, a gift of the last year's queen, Arcie Stump, Springfield, Mo., a tradition of the May festival.

Miss Lewis was borne to the throne in a sedan chair carried by four Nubian slaves, Ira Pratt, Wayne Tomlinson, Dean Shaeger and Harold Jensen.
