

Highway Aid Fund Voted By House

WASHINGTON, May 20.—(AP)—The House Friday overwhelmingly approved a bill authorizing \$1,140,000,000 in federal highway aid to states over a two-year period. The vote was 346 to 34.

All attempts to reduce the size of the authorization were batted down. The actual money must be appropriated later.

For each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1952, and June 30, 1953, the bill authorizes these federal expenditures:

\$225,000,000 for projects on the federal-aid primary highway system; \$150,000,000 for secondary highways; \$125,000,000 for urban areas; and \$70,000,000 for a national system of interstate highways.

This is the first time Congress has specifically earmarked funds for interstate highways.

The bill provides for allotment of the funds to states, to match their own funds, on a population basis.

The measure also continues authorizations for work in national forests, national parks and monuments, parkways, and roads in Indian reservations. These projects bring the two-year total to \$1,273,000,000.

Drain To Take Second Try At Passing Budget

Drain voters will take another try at passing a city budget.

Members of the budget committee and the Drain city council decided Tuesday to submit a new city budget for approval of the voters. The first budget, voted upon May 5, was turned down by three votes.

City Recorder Vern Thomas reported the revised budget was shaved by about \$5,000 after the initial try at exceeding the six percent limitation was defeated.

Date for the re-balling was not announced.
