Dr. Le Roy Carlson of Los Angeles will act as adjudicator for the National Piano Teachers Guild in hearing auditions of thirty-two piano students of Mrs. C. S. Heinline in Roseburg next Thursday and Friday, May 25-26. A few of the students will be given auditions for local certificates, a number will be trying for their state certificates and several will try for national certificates, which will make them eligible to participate in auditions with scholarship awards.

Dr. Carlson will arrive in Roseburg Wednesday and that evening at eight o'clock at the Methodist church, Mrs. Heinline will entertain in his honor and will have as guests, students, their parents, invited friends and members of the Music Teachers association.

Dr. Carlson is an American musician to whom one unquestionably applies the term artist. From a very early age he had the advantage of Conservatory training, which later was broadened by advanced studies at Augustana college, Northwestern university and University of Michigan. At Augustana college he received his Bachelor of Music degree and from University of Michigan, his degree of Master of Music. His teachers have included such artists as Harry R. Detweiler, Sidney Silber, Maysaye Boguslawski, J. Frank Fieger, Donald Ferguson, Joseph Brinkman and Ernest Hutcheson. He has been affiliated with state schools, colleges and universities for many years. He has served as director of music in several schools; charter member, adjudicator and organizer for the National Guild of Piano Teachers; faculty member of the American College of Musicians; organist and choirmaster for numerous prominent churches; accompanist with the Tri-City Symphony orchestra; recital and radio accompanist to many of the artists of opera, oratorio and concert field. Before going to California, he was associate professor in piano at Louisiana State university and director of music at the University Methodist church.
