The Roseburg Junior chamber of commerce voted to enter a candidate in the Sutherlin Timber Days queen contest at its regular meeting at the Hotel Umpqua Monday evening.

The candidate will be selected from contestants in the Roseburg area. A special committee headed by Glen Scott has been appointed to handle arrangements.

Scott pointed out the queen of the Sutherlin Timber Days celebration will be determined by the number of buttons each candidate sells during the next few weeks. The button sales will begin June 10.

Irv Pugh reported on the plans for the July 4 fireworks display that the Jaycees will hold at the county fairgrounds. Present plans call for the Roseburg fire department to conduct a fire prevention demonstration as part of the program.

The Jaycees are continuing to work on plans for guided tours through sawmills in the Roseburg area during the summer tourist season. A special committee is working on arrangements for the tours.

The Jaycee organization has decided to hold an informal dance at the Country club on June 3.

'Best Waitress' Award Goes To No-Tip Worker

CHICAGO, May 23.—(AP)—A Chicago waitress who works in a restaurant where no tipping is allowed has been named the nation's best waitress of 1950 in a vote sponsored by a restaurant publication. She is Betty Jacobic, 26-year-old attractive brunette who has worked at the same restaurant here for eight years. Tips left by customers who disregard "no tipping" signs are turned in by Betty and other waitresses to a charity and gift fund.

Betty today was to be awarded a gold medal and \$300 for winning the contest held by restaurant management. The award will be made by publisher Don Nichols at the convention of the national restaurant association.

Susan Greiner of Los Angeles won second place, and Janet Agger of Los Angeles and Eve Jennings of Concord, N. H., were tied for third.

Boy Kills Himself At 'Russian Roulette'

WESTMINSTER, Md., May 23.—(AP)—George William Martin, 17, found a pistol in a drawer at Carol Miller's home last night. So he was showing his date how "Russian Roulette" was played.

Carol wanted him to put the gun down and stop "showing off."

"I thought he would stop that foolishness if I walked out of the room," the 15-year-old girl told State Police Cpl. James Simmons later.

As she went out the door, she heard a report.

Martin died on the way to a Baltimore hospital, a bullet wound in his temple.

Police listed it as suicide. "Russian Roulette" is played by inserting one cartridge into an empty revolver, spinning the chamber, and pulling the trigger with the gun pointed at your head, taking a chance the hammer will strike an empty chamber.

NEW YORK, May 23.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace's Progressive party announced yesterday it will stage a marathon demonstration outside the U. S. Senate office building for a Fair Employment Practices commission.

The demonstration—called a "people's vigil for FEPC"—will start tomorrow, the party's executive committee said.

It will continue "until the Senate has acted to break the filibuster and pass the FEPC bill," the statement added.

The Progressives urged members of church, labor, civic and professional groups, "regardless of political affiliations," to join the demonstration.

The advisory board to the Salvation Army will meet Wednesday noon, May 24, at the Umpqua hotel, Judge D. N. Busenbark, chairman, said today.

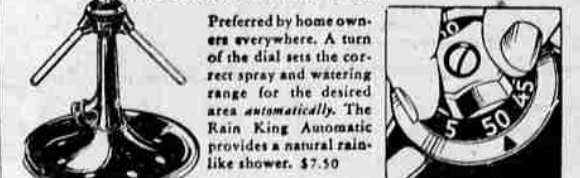
He urged all board members to be present to aid in discussion of aid and decision on several important matters.
