Standing Roast An Old Favorite

A rib-roast with pan-roasted potatoes and rich brown gravy is the stuff that makes Sunday dreams come true. And "blood gravy" in a little cup is as much a part of American childhood as baseball and the circus.

Nothing smaller than a 2-rib roast will do. Select one with top government grade or buy by the brand, if you have a favorite packer. Examine the meat as carefully as you would a diamond. It must be flawless.

Look for those nerve-like lines of fat running through the meat. The more marbling the more tender. The meat should be a rich deep red and the surrounding fat both firm and white.

If you inherit money or win on a quiz program, get a first cut. An 8-rib roast is usually divided into "first cut," "second or middle cut" and "third cut." The first three ribs immediately adjoining the one left on the hindquarters are the "first cut." There are the so-called prime ribs of beef.

The next two ribs are the "second or middle cut." Some butchers prefer them despite the extra fat, explaining that this cut produces a juicier roast.

The remaining three ribs are the "third cut." The price varies according to the cut. However, John Paparteys, head butcher and friend of beef eaters at Safeway's Store No. 142, New York City, uses a 7-rib roast. He calls the first five ribs "choice" and the remaining two "blade." The "blade" costs a few cents less a pound.

John trims his standing roast so that it is only seven inches from tip of rounded end to end of the ribs. "That leaves mostly heart of the meat—only the tender part. He trims off the chine bone (back) and the short ribs before weighing. The result is a short standing roast that's very easy to carve and has no waste."

Allow about one-half pound of meat per serving. Place it in a shallow pan, fat side up. Do not add water and do not cover. Roast in a pre-heated oven at slow (325 degrees F.). How long? Well, how rare? Cook a six pound roast

Flood Peril, Money Needs Top Multnomah Worries

PORTLAND, May 23.—(AP)—Multnomah county commissioners failed to take up their financial crisis Monday. Instead they had to make preliminary plans guarding against a Columbia river flood.

The financial crisis was brought by failure of a \$2,443,000 tax levy at the polls last Friday. Commissioners indicated Saturday they would ask a special session of the state legislature to take up Multnomah county's plight.

The commissioners then said the county did not have enough money to continue services, and blamed the legislature for imposing what they said were too-heavy welfare costs.

They authorized Sheriff Terry Schunk to proceed with flood plans that call for a survey of the potential flood area and to arrange evacuation, policing and relief plans.
