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No Special Session To Aid Multnomah, McKay Says

SALEM, May 22.—(P)—Governor Douglas McKay isn't going to call a special session of the state legislature to solve Multnomah county's welfare problems.
After voters in that county rejected a special levy to finance the county's share of welfare costs, Multnomah county commissioners said they would ask the governor for a special session to give state money to the county.
"Special sessions are very expensive," Governor McKay said today. "After all, the next regular session of the legislature is only seven months away, and Multnomah county has enough money to last until then."

Russians Not Reds At Heart, Ex-Attache Declares

SEATTLE, May 24.—(P)—Vice Admiral J. H. Duncan, retired, of Tacoma said that during his 20 months as a naval attache in Moscow "I never met anyone who was a Communist at heart."
Admiral Duncan, while describing the populace as "in a condition of slavery," added:
"I never lived with so delightful a people. I never lived with any people I like better. They have the same ideals, the same hopes as you and I."
But he added: "The Russian leaders are a gang, like the gang of Al Capone. They themselves have no loyalty to the idea of Communism."
"I had Russians say to me: 'After this war is over, will the United States do anything to get us out of this terrible slavery?'"
The retired officer said "I don't think war with Russia is imminent, at least a shooting war. They have a plan and they are going ahead with it... they fear our industrial strength and will not take us on as long as we have the industrial strength we have today."

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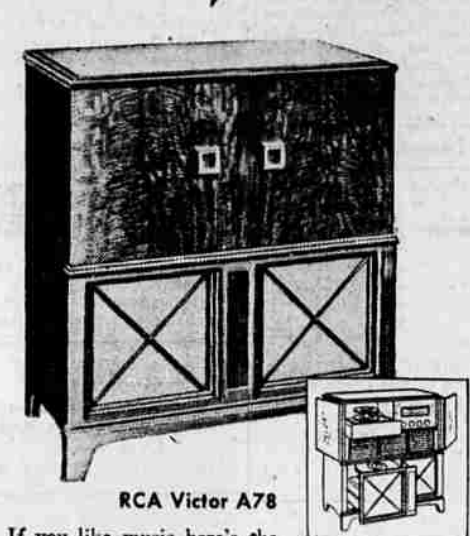

Judge Scores Claim Of Agreement With Dist. Atty.

PORTLAND, May 24.—(P)—Federal Judge James A. Fee said Tuesday an attorney's statement that he had a "gentleman's agreement" with the district attorney was "atrocious." He held the attorney in contempt.
His comment from the bench followed a statement by Jean Hickson, attorney for St. Johns Motor Express company, Inc., that he and Floyd Hamilton, deputy district attorney, had reached agreement. Under it, he said, his client would accept a \$50 fine on each of 12 charges of Interstate Commerce commission rules violation. "This is the most atrocious statement I have heard here since bootlegging days," Judge Fee said. Then he held Hickson in contempt and returned the case to Judge Gus Solomon.

Cattlemen Praised For Spurning 'Handouts'

OMAK, — (P)—Cattlemen as a group were praised here by Governor Langlie for "always refusing handouts."
The governor spoke at a meeting of the State Cattlemen's association. "The cattlemen stand for long-range results rather than short-sighted money grabbing," the governor said. "People can only understand benefits and special privileges when they have to pay for them. The cattlemen realize they can't get something for nothing," he said.
Loren Bamert, president of the American livestock association, attacked the Brannan plan on the grounds that "cattlemen don't want to dip in the taxpayers' pocket-book." But he said "cattlemen are big taxpayers and should be entitled to the same tariff protection accorded other business men."

Duck Survey Slated

PORTLAND, May 23.—(P)—A June-July survey of Canadian nesting grounds will determine next fall's duck hunting seasons for the northwest states, Dr. Clarence Cottam, assistant director of the federal Fish and Wildlife service, said yesterday.
A favorable survey probably would result in acceptance of the 60-day continuous season recommended by game commissions of Oregon, Idaho and Washington, he said.
There is little likelihood, however, that the bag limit will be increased or the season lengthened because of a 20-25 percent winter kill of fowl since the end of last season, Cottam explained.

OLD STUFF FOR FLEGEL

PORTLAND — (P)—State Sen. Austin Flegel, who won the Democratic gubernatorial nomination by a small margin, is used to close races.
When he ran for state senator in 1934 he tied with Dellmore Lessard at exactly 9,847 votes. The two had to draw names out of a hat to decide the victor.
Flegel lost. Lessard's name was drawn.

WASHINGTON, May 24 — (P)—Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) of the Senate Judiciary committee announced it will hold a hearing here June 5 on the nomination of Gus J. Solomon of Portland, Ore., to be district judge for Oregon.
