

Rookie Pitches Shutout In Major Debut

Young Bill Macdonald, rookie bonus right-hander, fits right into the Pittsburgh pitching tradition. When the 21-year-old native of Alameda, Calif., first bonus player in the pirate organization, hurled a shutout last night in his first major league starting assignment, he followed a Pittsburgh pattern set by Nick Maddox 43 years ago. It was on Sept. 13, 1907 that Maddox became the first National leaguer since 1900 to pitch a shutout in his big league debut. He banked the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-0, striking out 11.

Macdonald became the 19th National leaguer to turn the trick — and the sixth to wear a Pittsburgh uniform. He joins such Pirate notables as Babe Adams (April 4, 1909), Wilbur Cooper (Sept. 9, 1912), Carmen Hill (Sept. 17, 1915) and Otis Swigart (Sept. 21, 1939).

Newcombe First
The last National league pitcher to turn in a scoreless game in his big league bow was Don Newcombe. The Brooklyn right-hander did it May 22, 1949. A total of 27 American league pitchers have accomplished the feat.

Macdonald, who won 13 and lost 11 at New Orleans in the Southern association last year, limited Philadelphia to three singles as the Pirates defeated the Phils, 6-0. A home run by Wally Westlake with the bases loaded in the eighth inning broke up a scoreless pitching duel between Macdonald and the Phils' Russ Meyer. Macdonald

walked only one and fanned seven. Held Phils.

The defeat prevented the second-place Phils from gaining ground on the league-leading Dodgers, who dropped a 5-4 decision to the Chicago Cubs. Johnny Schmitz' fine clutch pitching and a pair of sixth inning homers by Andy Pafko and Roy Smalley won for the Cubs. Losing Pitcher Ralph Branca was the victim of the four-baggers.

The seldom-winning Cincinnati Reds celebrated the 15th anniversary of the first night game in the major league by beating the Boston Braves, 6-2, behind the effective twirling of Willie Ramsdell, former Brooklyn right-hander.

Senators Win
The Washington Senators, shut out with four hits through eight innings, broke loose with an eight-run barrage in the ninth to whip the Detroit Tigers, 8-2.

Home runs by Bill Coan and Eddie Yost, the latter's coming with two on, featured the attack against Fred Hutchinson and two would-be rescuers. Sid Hudson went all the way for the Nats.

The St. Louis Browns gained their third home triumph of the season, defeating the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-1. Al Widmar, who joined the Browns after the season started because of salary differences, won his first game with a neat four-hit effort.

Rain washed out the scheduled night game between the Cards and Giants in New York. The other clubs were not scheduled.

Manners Stressed
In the opening session, Hoffman emphasized tennis manners to the youngsters. He also demonstrated proper grip of the racket for serves, forehand and backhand strokes.

A lesson in how to score a tennis match was also presented. After Hoffman made his demonstra-

tions, the varsity players from the Indians undefeated tennis squad worked with the students to perfect his teachings.

Continues Today
Today, the boys attending the clinic will receive further instruction and the affair is to be topped by a tennis movie at the end of the practical instruction period.

Hoffman reported that his nine man varsity squad has signed up to participate in the YMCA summer tennis program. He stated it will give the boys additional experience and prepare them for 1951 competition. He also hopes to get as many of the varsity men as possible to compete in the Center tournament sponsored by the U.S. Lawn Tennis association which will be held in Eugene this summer.

World Champ Golf Tourney Portland Hope

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24.—(AP)—The first world championship in golf, may take place next year in Portland, Ore.

Robert A. (Bob) Hudson Sr., Portland business tycoon and sportsman, has been toying with the idea several years. There is a reasonable chance it may be realized in 1951. This information comes from the Hudson headquarters.

Such a golfing extravaganza would be the logical goal of Hudson, a dynamic personality who would try to roller skate up a mountain if the fancy seized him. Once tied up in a golfing enterprise, he will see it through and with success.

No Surprise
The report that Hudson may stage a world championship will come as no surprise to leading American professionals. Neither will it be greeted with skepticism by the top pros of the British Isles.

They will recall that he revived the Ryder cup series after a 10-

year lapse. In 1947, he brought the Ryder cup teams from Britain and the U.S. to Portland at a cost of approximately \$35,000.

The English golfers had the time of their lives, thick steaks, eggs, butter, in abundance. Rationing over there was much tighter in 1947.

The American entries didn't do so badly either. Every single expense was paid for both sides. Hudson footed the bills. Prior to that, he had brought the national P.G.A. championship tournament to his home city. And before that he sponsored a number of \$10,000 and \$15,000 open events.

No 1 Promoter
The professionals consider Hudson the No. 1 golf promoter in this country. Aside from his generous dealings with them, he doesn't require they wear identification numbers.

Plans for the possible 1951 premier of world championship golf are to bring the open champions of a dozen or more countries together in a 72-hole medal play competition.

These would include the titleholders from the U.S., England, Ireland, Scotland, France, Germany, Canada, Argentina, Australia, South Africa, the Philippines, Mexico and possibly Japan.

Although the arrangements are in the nebulous stage, Hudson and his chief assistants have laid enough framework to plan the use of language students from the University of Portland and other nearby colleges as caddies. The non-English speaking participants would thus be made to feel right at home.
