### Job Counseling Offered Persons Looking For Work

(Ed. Note: This is another in a series of articles on the Oregon State Employment service designed to inform the public of its facilities for offering service to the community, employer and the worker.)

Are you having trouble finding your proper niche in this changing economic world? So are thousands—even millions—of others. And that's the reason for the growing importance of job counseling in the local employment office.

Defined as "reviewing potential qualifications of an applicant who has not made a satisfactory vocational choice," employment counseling usually involves the reading of workers to the immediate job outlook. "Immediate" refers to both time and location.

After recognition of the need for assistance and guidance in a new vocational plan, three main steps are followed by the Roseburg local office:

- (1) Survey of the applicant's training, abilities and work-history in discovering possible new occupational directions.
- (2) Outlining of a new plan for training or vocational development that will result in effective placement in appropriate employment.
- (3) Check-up on new work to determine suitability of job and adjustment of worker to new occupational and working conditions.

Trained employment counselors in local offices are familiar with the variety of vocational training available in most Oregon communities. As most of these occupational adjustments are made at a fairly early age, youth programs are especially important.

Accurate knowledge of the community's economy also is necessary. Are the main work opportunities in agriculture, lumber or food processing? Are they seasonal or year-round in nature? What chance for advancement? Answers to these and thousands of other pertinent questions may be found at your nearest employment offices.

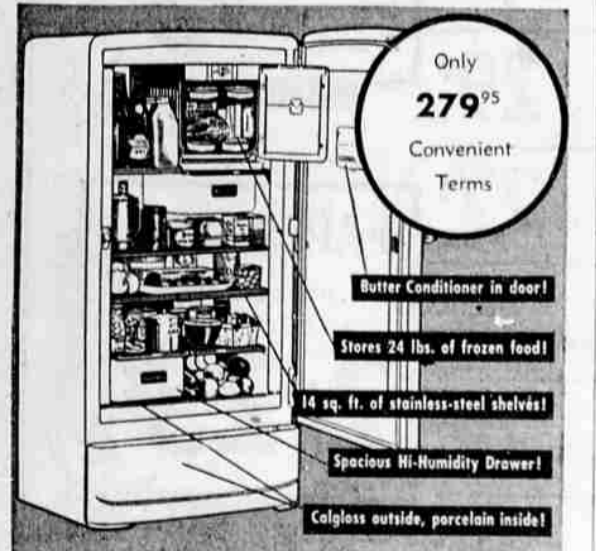
