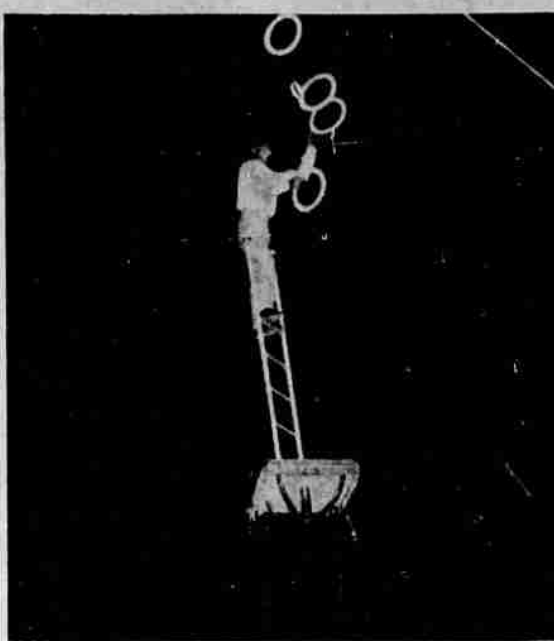

Thriller With Clyde Beatty Circus



A pre-eminent star of the Clyde Beatty Circus—and that's saying something, isn't it?

Well, that's what Borge Barton, the world's equilibristic wonder, certainly is, and you'll agree when the huge Clyde Beatty Circus comes to Roseburg for afternoon and night performances June 5, for he is the man who walks on his forefinger, and performs incredible, breath-taking feats atop a thirty-foot pole.

Known around the world as "The Great Barton," the Up-side-Down Gravity Defying artist he is without question, one of the world's most recklessly daring performers. His ability to balance his entire weight on one finger, together with other gravity-defying achievements on his lofty pedestal astounds the audience to the point where they actually shout out to him.

North Roseburg Sewer System Plans Explained

The North Roseburg Sanitary district sewer system project, for which bids have been advertised, has been divided into three schedules.

One schedule calls for the trunk sewer, another for the plant and adjacent pumping plants and the third for the sewer mains and laterals. The work will be awarded separately for each schedule or to one contractor, whichever is in the best interest of the district.

Bids are to be received at the Riverside school, Walnut St., and Garden Valley road, until 6:30 p.m. PST June 8. The plans were prepared by consulting engineers Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, Corvallis.

The complete treatment plant will serve 5,000 persons and will discharge into the Umpqua river. It will consist of two-stage high rate filters and two circular clarifiers, providing primary and final treatment. The digester will be insulated with brick, and the control house will be of brick construction. There will be open sludge, drying beds and sewage will be chlorinated.

Two variable speed type raw sewage pumps will be built as part of the plant, as the sewage will flow to the plant by gravity. This work is included under one contract.

A total of 56,000 lineal feet of sewer in sizes ranging from eight to 18 inches will be required. About 30,000 feet of this will be installed at a depth of six feet, 20,000 feet at depths of six to eight feet and the remainder at depths up to 18 feet. About 100 feet of the line will range from 18 to 18 feet in depth. There will be three mainline crossings of the Southern Pacific railroad and four spur crossings. There will be no slough crossings.

Specifications state the pipe may be either clay or concrete, with alternates provided in the invitation for the two types. Approximately 47,500 feet of eight-inch and 1,000 feet of 10-inch, 3,000 feet of 12-inch, 500 feet of 15-inch and 3,500 feet of 18-inch pipe will be required.

The schedule calling for construction of the trunk sewer to the plant will involve furnishing and installing the 15-inch and 18-inch pipe. The remainder of the work will be for installation of the sewerage system throughout the district and will be invited under the third schedule.

The trips to these far-flung fishing and hunting grounds will be made aboard the sky cruiser, "The Fishing and Hunting Club of the Air," specially set aside for these junkies by Colonial Airlines. The scheduling of these "on location" broadcasts is in line with the program's aim of bringing the flavor of the outdoors to the sportsmen in their living rooms. The actual proceedings, as members of the program go about casting their lines and hauling in the big ones, will be aired during each of the Thursday evening broadcasts. Tonight's guest on "Sports for All" is syndicated fishing and hunting columnist Nelson Benedict, replacing Gail Borden.

MDL commentator Cecil Brown, who took his portable tape-recorder with him on his recent fact-finding trip to Formosa, will present an unusual radio story of Chinese Nationalist women's determination to carry on to the end during his broadcast of Friday, May 26 (10:15-10:30 a. m.). Brown's listeners will hear Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, Mme. K. C. Wu, wife of the governor of Formosa, and others in a sewing room preparing surgical supplies for Nationalist troops.

Medical Society Sued On Monopoly Charge

SEATTLE, May 25. — (AP) — An alleged "monopolistic practice" medical suit opened in superior court here today.

It is a \$75,000 damage action by the Group Health cooperative of Puget Sound against the King County Medical society.

The cooperative alleges physicians on its staff have been refused membership in the King county society although they are graduates of accredited medical schools. The complaint says some of them belonged to the American Medical association before affiliating with Group Health.

The cooperative also alleges the society and its medical service bureau, through which pre-paid medical service is carried on, have conspired to prevent Group Health doctors from using hospital facilities. The co-op contends it is entitled to damages because it has had to provide hospital facilities of its own.
