The San Diego-Hollywood battle for first place evened up as the former won, 2-1, on George Zuverink's nifty three-hitter. San Diego then went three games in front, again.

Zuverink, rangy righthander, posted his fifth win against as many defeats, and smashed home the deciding run with a seventh

inning fly scoring Johnny Berardino, who had singled and moved to third on Mike Tresh's double. Pinky Woods, the loser, gave up only five safeties.

Baumholtz Hits More

Frankie Baumholtz, the circuit's only 400 batsman, extended his hitting streak to 29 games with two doubles and a single as Los Angeles smashed Portland, 5-2. Les Layton and Stan Spence slugged their seventh homers to saddle Bob Drilling with the loss. Bob Muncie checked the Beavers, with four hits and fanned eight for his sixth win.

Back into the basement—look, it's an escalator!—went Sacramento. The Solons bowed to a five-run Oakland rally in the 11th. 8-3, with Harry Gumbert the victim, Clyde Shoun the victor. Defending champion batter Artie Wilson, who is starting to make his move, paced the Oaks with four singles in six trips.

That's the way the father of young Rodney Hague speaks of his 12-year-old son, who, last weekend won one event in the Roseburg Rod and Gun club's registered PITA shoot and the week before, shot a 98 x 100 score in the state finals of the Oregon Journal telegraphic meet.

Sunday, he followed up with a 91 x 100 in the 16-yard event, dropped to an 86 x 100 in the handicap and took second in the doubles with a 43 x 50 score.

His fellow competitors think he'll be a pretty fair shot by the time he grows up.
