No Watching For Baked Steak

Fork-tender, delicious, perfect with baked potatoes cooked along with it, this baked steak requires no oven-watching.

Baked Steak (4-6 Servings)

One and one-half pounds chuck steak, 1½ inches thick, 1½ teaspoons kitchen bouquet, 1 tablespoon fat, 1 cup thinly sliced onion, 8-ounce can tomato sauce, (1 cup), ½ cup catsup, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, ¼ teaspoon pepper, ¼ teaspoon allspice, 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish, optional.

Wipe steak with a damp cloth. Brush on all sides with kitchen bouquet. Melt fat in large frying pan. Brown meat on both sides over moderate heat. Place meat in large casserole or baking pan only slightly larger than piece of meat. Sprinkle onions over top of meat. Combine remaining ingredients in frying pan and bring to boil. Pour over onion. Cover pan tightly, using aluminum foil if the pan has no fitting cover.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until meat is tender, about 2 hours. After 1 hour, remove meat from oven and baste well with pan juices. If desired bake potatoes, to serve with the meat, during the last hour.

Served with a tossed salad of lettuce, escarole and watercress, this chicken custard pie makes a party lunch. Add a vegetable and it makes a complete dinner.

Mushroom and Chicken Custard Pie (4-6 Servings)

Nine-inch unbaked pastry shell, 2 cups diced cooked chicken, 3-ounce can chopped broiled mushrooms, 3 eggs, ¼ cup milk, 2½ cup chicken broth, about 1 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1 tablespoon grated onion, ¼ teaspoon catsup.

Line 9-inch pie plate with pastry, building rim around edge. Arrange chicken over bottom of plate. Drain mushrooms, reserving broth. Sprinkle mushrooms over chicken. Place eggs in a bowl. Add milk. Add chicken broth to mushroom broth to make one cup and add to eggs. Add remaining ingredients. Beat slightly with rotary egg beater until smooth but not frothy. Carefully pour over chicken and mushrooms. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) until the point of a sharp knife comes out clean when inserted in the

Americans seem to be eating the hole right out of the donut. During 1941 we ate only 400 million dozen. But in 1949, we gobbled more than 500 million, 85 percent of them sugared, glazed or frosted.

How come this increase? Teen-agers seem to be the answer. Biggest upswing in donut sales during postwar years is reported by luncheonette, soda fountains and restaurants located near high schools.

Owners of these campus eateries report mid-morning, afternoon and late evenings as the "donut hours." Here are some teen-age favorites—slightly dizzy, but the campus choice.

Chiquita Donut

Teen-agers are notorious for their capacity for gobs of whipped cream. Here's a suggestion for combining it with donuts and bananas.

Mash ripe bananas, add milk and whip thoroughly. Line bottom of dish with banana whip, add whole donut; fill donut center and cover top with more banana whip. Then, for that young touch, sprinkle chocolate shavings over the top.

Donut Charlotte Russe

Four donuts, ½ pint of heavy cream whipped, ¼ cup currant jelly.

Top each donut with whipped cream. With back of spoon make a hollow in whipped cream; fill with currant jelly.

Donut Ice Cream Man

Sure is "kid stuff" but the 13-18-year-old appreciates its laugh value.

Place a big ball of vanilla ice cream on top of a plain or nutt

Bits Donuts Sandwich

A two-in-one idea, elaborate enough for the most imaginative teen-ager, but quick and easy to prepare.

Reserving 2 dozen whole chocolate bits, melt remaining contents of package over hot water. Add 1½ cup evaporated milk and stir until glossy. Stir in 8 marshmallows which have been cut in eighths. Split 8 sugared donuts. Spread bits and marshmallow mixture on one-half of each donut and place halves together to form a sandwich. Place donuts on waxed paper until chocolate has set. Serve with milk.

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
