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U. S. Golf Trio Reaches British Title Finals

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 26.—(P.)—Three of America's finest amateur golfers—Frank Stranahan, Jim McHale and Dick Chapman—were in the semi-finals of the British championship today along with Cyril Tolley, 54-year-old veteran who won the title 30 years ago.

Prospects for an all-American final tomorrow were more than bright as Stranahan, the '45 champion, teed off against the bulky Tolley in the afternoon round. Chapman, former U. S. amateur king, clashed with McHale, the Walker cup star from Philadelphia.

Roseburg Lions Honor Members Of Track Team

Honoring of Roseburg senior high school track stars, and a brief talk by Al Stanley, Sutherlin Lions secretary, was the important feature of Thursday night's Lions club meeting in the Hotel Umpqua.

Coach Frank Purdy was present with three members of his track team. Bill Van Horn, Irvin Stritzke and Bill Sumner. Other members were in Albany with the baseball team. Al Helfman, tennis coach, was present, but members of his championship team were also in Albany.

Purdy gave a brief resume of the track season, saying that ten points in the three principal meets made the difference between Roseburg's team being "great" and just "very good." He said one thing that marked the team was the fact it improved with each event.

Van Horn, who tied the school 100-yard dash record at 10.2, piled up a total of 93 1/2 points during the season, and ran third place, just behind the first and second place winners in the state meet. He also took part in 220, broad jump, and relay events.

He introduced Stritzke as the miler, and Sumners as an all-around man, who showed great improvement, but who will graduate.

Hoffman's tennis team won 15 matches, losing none, until entering the state finals, losing then only to Grant of Portland in ten events, and Dick Jacobson, who lost out in the singles to a state champion from Central Catholic. He urged the club to sponsor a movement to secure additional tennis courts in the city.

Church Unity To Fight Reds Urged By Bishop Oxnam

BOSTON, May 26.—(P.)—A Methodist leader sounded a call today for Protestant-Catholic cooperation to meet the challenge of Communism.

Methodist Bishop G. Bromley told the Northern Baptist convention that "Communism is an ideology that cannot be bombed out of the heads of men."

"It must be met by an ideology equally dynamic," he said. "Christianity is such an ideology."

The bishop said he hoped the Catholic hierarchy in the United States would soon confer with Protestant brethren on the world situation.

"I am certain," he said, "that the major Protestant denominations would gladly appoint representatives to sit with such leaders as Cardinal Mooney (of Detroit), Cardinal Spellman (of New York), Archbishop Cushing (of Boston) and others."

"Such cooperation," he added, "would electrify the world."

He said, however, that before such a conference "Protestants believe the Pope should enunciate a new doctrine of religious liberty."

"In a word," he said, "let the Holy Father declare that in all matters involving religious liberty the Roman Catholic church will do unto others as it would have others do unto the Roman Catholic church."

Bishop Oxnam is co-president of the World Council of Churches, representing all major Protestant denominations and the Greek orthodox church.

Born April 26, 1886, in Cincinnati, Ohio, he came to Myrtle Creek about two years ago from California. He was retired and formerly was employed as a baggage dispatcher for a taxi company in Denver.

His son survives. The body has been removed to the Long and Orr mortuary and services will be announced later.

Wakefield Sold By Yankees To Oakland Club

OAKLAND, Calif., May 26.—(P.) C. L. "Buck" Laws, president of the Oakland baseball club, announced Thursday the purchase of the contract of outfielder Dick Wakefield from the New York Yankees.

(Only Wednesday Wakefield was quoted as saying he wouldn't play with a minor league club.)

Wakefield broke into the headlines by his refusal to report to the Chicago White Sox after being traded to that club. He was suspended for failure to report. Wakefield had demanded that the White Sox restore a \$5,000 salary slash he had taken following his sale to the Yankees by Detroit at the end of last season.

The deal was concluded with Joe Devine, western representative of the Yankees, and George Weiss, general manager of the New York organization. Weiss telegraphed President Laws "Wakefield is being furnished transportation and has been instructed to report immediately."

Wakefield was signed by Detroit early in 1940 for a bonus of \$52,000 after he had starred at the University of Michigan. He failed to reach the heights expected of him. His sale to the Pacific Coast league club is part of the deal whereby the Yankees owe Oakland players for the purchase of rookies Jackie Jensen and Billy Martin.

BEAT THE BUDGET

There's no getting around the fact that, periodically, furniture replacements are an absolute necessity. Frequently the purchase of one new piece inspires a completely new decorative theme. This need not be a costly procedure. In fact, if the replacement is one of the basics such as a sofa, it is wise economy to put the bulk of the expenditure into a well constructed, wear-worthy piece and rely on your originality and inventiveness to supply the new decorative touches.

In the room sketched above the addition of the new turquoise circular sofa inspired the change from conventional to a sophisticated mood. The walls were painted a soft dove grey (a one-coat job). Pale yellow cotton shantung draperies, which were inexpensive and simple to make, give importance to the window end of the room.

New slip covers on the two Lawson-type chairs are turquoise linen with grey and yellow modern geometric pattern. The strong tangerine tones in the modern canvas above the sofa balance the color scheme.

Here freshness and gaiety have been inexpensively achieved with paint and a few yards of fabric.

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
