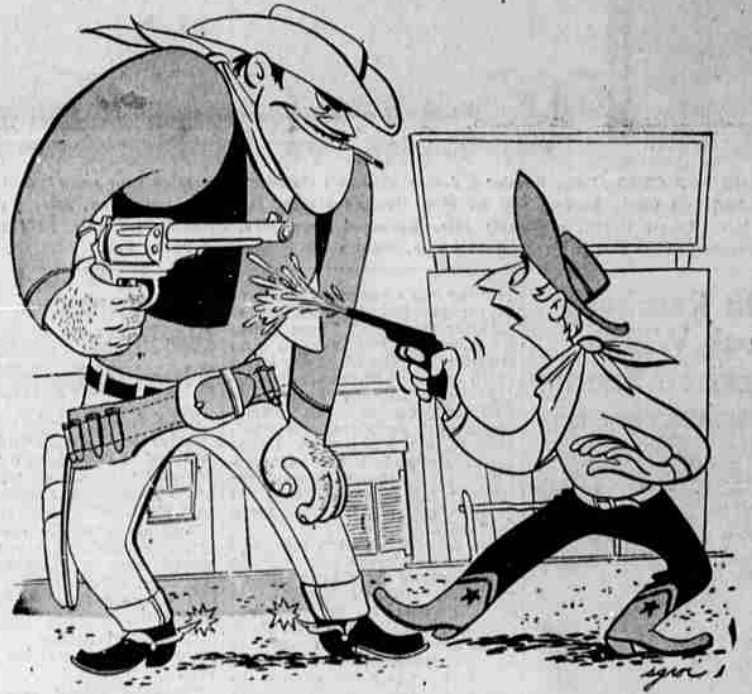
At the business meeting to follow, discussion was held on the national convention scheduled for Pasadena in July. It was hoped that some local members would be in attendance.
