North Roseburg Church Will Be Organized Sunday



The Rev. Charles Fogg of Eugene will be the guest speaker at the special organizational service at the North Roseburg church this Sunday at 3 p.m. Since beginning services last September, the North Roseburg church has functioned as a missions charge under the Oregon-Washington conference of the Evangelical United Brethren church. This Sunday, observed as Pentecost Sunday throughout Christendom, was chosen for the organizational service because of its significance.

Following the formalities of or-

ganizing into a congregation, some 35 persons will be received as "charter members." Those joining the church on this occasion have attended a membership class which convened on the six Wednesday nights between Easter and Pentecost, covering the history, government, doctrines, and standards of the Evangelical United Brethren church. It has been provided that anyone joining the church within the next 30 days will be received as a "charter member" also.

The service has been scheduled at the 3:00 o'clock hour for the convenience of out of town visitors, and local residents belonging to other churches, for the service is open to the public. The Rev. E. A. Fogg, president of the Conference Board of Missions, will officiate at the service which will change the status of the North Roseburg church from that of a mission to a fully organized church. The Rev. Charles Fogg, the guest speaker and son of E. A. Fogg, is pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren church in Eugene, which was largely responsible for the financial aid and material assistance given in order to begin work in the North Roseburg church. The Rev. Willis Erickson, local Lutheran pastor and president of the Roseburg Ministerial association, will convey official greetings from the churches of Roseburg, and will also serve as guest soloist for the service.

The North Roseburg church, which meets in a temporary chapel in the basement, is located at 2043 Vine street, North of the Garden Valley Road junction, between Cloverdale Park and Highway 99.

Party Labels Lose Their Meaning As Major Issues Begin Cropping Up

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—There is one major issue in the 1950 political campaign which is now hard pressing upon the voters. There is no precise name for it. The old labels don't quite fit. It is more a state of mind, a sixth sense or a political "feel" which voters are being asked to decide upon and express.

For lack of better words, this issue might be defined as conservatism versus liberalism, reactionism versus progressivism or just plain Taftism versus Trumanism. It is in no sense a conflict between Republicans and Democrats, though these names still appear on the headquarters doors. The main issue is at stake within both the two major parties.

It was at stake in the Republican primary in Pennsylvania. The fight there was whether the old conservative G.O.P. machine under Joseph R. Grundy should remain in power. It was kicked out by a new progressive movement led by Gov. James H. Duff.

It was at stake in the Alabama primary. The fight there was over control of the State Democratic committee. The reactionary Dixiecrats lost.

Conservatism versus liberalism is the issue in California. Rep. Helen Gahagan Douglas, seeking the Democratic senatorial nomination, is an all-out liberal. Manchester Boddy, publisher of the Los Angeles News, who is opposing her, has advocated many progressive policies, but is trying to rally the conservative strength of the Democratic party behind him. Whoever wins in this primary race will face Rep. Richard M. Nixon, Republican conservative.

It is the main issue in North Carolina, where liberal Democratic Senator Frank M. Graham is fighting to retain his seat against divided opposition. Willis Smith is a lawyer who is considered conservative, while ex-Senator Robert Reynolds is ultra-conservative.

This struggle for a political philosophy becomes apparent not only from trying to digest the 150 speeches made by President Truman on his swing through the northwest. It is also obvious from the bulletins put out by the Republican National Committee from day to day, during the President's tour, and from the formal counter-blast made by Ohio Senator Robert A.

Some Flies Are Tough—Wallow In DDT Poison

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Some tough flies can survive around 10,000 times as much poison as other flies.

The government has discovered this working with flies it is raising in captivity at Orlando, Fla.

"Actually, this 10,000 figure is only an estimate, because these flies virtually are wallowing in DDT and don't seem to mind it," Dr. A. W. Lindquist, government fly expert, said in an interview.

"An infinitesimal amount of this poison is sufficient to kill most flies. The Orlando flies seem at least around 10,000 times tougher. (Fly immunity to DDT has been reported before but not to such a great extent.)

This colony of flies was started in 1944 and was subjected to increased amounts of DDT insecticide. Survivors were permitted to breed new generations of flies. Each generation could take more DDT and survive.

"The colony now is in its 80th generation," Dr. Lindquist says. "Some live in cages so heavily sprinkled with DDT you scarcely can see through the screens.

"If you place 500 of these flies in such a cage, perhaps 300 will die. But there always seems to be some survivors."

Dr. Lindquist was assigned to the Orlando laboratory of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine at the time it was developing DDT as a war-time insecticide for the Army. His work on the flies is part of a study, in which processes of nature are hurried up, to find an insecticide or combination of insecticides too much for even the toughest pests to resist.

Are these Orlando flies so tough they can survive anything?

"Not quite," says Dr. Lindquist. "You can kill them with a fly swatter."
