Federal Reserve Board Post Filled By Truman

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—President Truman today nominated Edward Lee Norton of Birmingham, Ala., to be a member of the Federal Reserve board.

Norton is an investment banker and radio station owner. The nomination is for a 14-year term. Federal Reserve board aides said Norton, when approved by the Senate, will take the board post now held by Ernest G. Draper who wants to retire.

Norton's appointment had been anticipated. The decision to pick him was reported to have been influenced by the work done in behalf of the Truman administration by Democratic Senators Hill and Sparkman of Alabama.
