SEATTLE, May 29.—(AP)—Another coach had his foot in the door today as a contender for the University of Washington head basketball coaching berth. It's William Henry Herrison Dye, better known as Tippy, coach of Ohio State's 1949-50 big ten basketball titlist. Dye said in St. Louis last night that he was flying to Seattle and would talk with university officials today.

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Well Balanced, Fast Lineup In Speedway Trials

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29.—(AP)—Nobody is likely to run away from the field—as Jules Goux did in 1913—in tomorrow's 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway. The cars are too much alike.

Time trials that ended yesterday produced the best-balanced, fastest lineup of the 34 Memorial day sweepstakes. The 33 cars averaged 131.045 miles an hour, compared with last year's previous record of 128.361.

The field matches 17 veteran speedway drivers against 10 first-time starters and six who were initiated to the grind last year.

The dean of the lineup is Mauri Rose of South Bend, Ind., starting for the 14th time and hoping to become the first four-time winner.

The youngest is Jerry Hoyt, of Indianapolis, 21 years old and dreaming of becoming another beardless sensation like Louie Meyer in 1928, Jimmy Murphy in 1922 or Frank Lockhart in 1926.

Mechanically, the contest will send 32 four-cylinder cars against a lone six-cylinder diesel to be driven by Jimmy Jackson of Desert Hot Springs, Calif. All will be conventional rear-drive racers except Rose's Howard Keck special and the blue crown specials to be driven by Bill Holland of Reading, Pa., the 1949 winner, and Tony Bettenhausen of Tinley Park, Ill.

The out-numbered newcomers yielded nothing to the old times in three weekends of time trials. Walt Faulkner of North Long Beach, Calif., set a 10-mile qualification record of 134.343 miles an hour in the Grants piston ring special.

Cecil Green of Houston, Texas, had the second fastest time trial of 132.910 miles an hour in the John Zink special.

Washington Wins Slow Crew Race

SEATTLE, May 29.—(AP)—They had to look in the rule book to decide who won the Washington-Wisconsin varsity crew race Saturday after coaches of both schools called the race off after the first mile. The winner: Washington.

Wisconsin coach Norm Sonju halted his crew when the struggling oarsmen were so badly swamped by rough water that they couldn't clear the water with their backstroke.

Washington, five lengths out in front, was slowed to a deliberate 28-stroke when the Badgers quit and finished the two-mile race in the slow time of 12 minutes 36 seconds. Wisconsin was about three minutes back.

Both Sonju and Washington Coach Al Ulbricks considered the race "no contest" for more than an hour. But referee Ed Taylor ruled that Washington was the winner. He cited the rules of collegiate rowing which state that if a crew goes through the first 30 seconds of a race without signaling for a stop, the race is to be carried on to a finish and the first boat over the line is the winner.

Letter Offers Likely Clue In Buggy Siegel Slaying

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., May 29.—(AP)—A three-year-old letter has popped up as a possible clue to the 1947 gangland slaying of Benjamin (Bugsy) Siegel.

Police Chief Clinton H. Anderson said the letter, uncovered by Archie Wells, chief of police in Las Vegas, Nev., apparently was written 43 days after Siegel was killed in the home of wealthy Virginia Hill on June 20, 1947. Anderson said the letter mentioned Miss Hill, a man and another woman. He declined to give their names.

In Las Vegas, chief Wells also declined to give names or details, but quoted a portion of it: "When we had a meeting out there (Las Vegas), I knew the fireworks were going to happen." Chief Wells said he found the letter in a police file during an investigation he is undertaking. Siegel was co-owner of the Flamingo club and prominent in Las Vegas gambling circles, as well as here.

The clubs will spend Monday traveling. Four doubleheaders are scheduled for Memorial day, with Sacramento at Hollywood, San Diego at Oakland, San Francisco at Portland, Los Angeles at Seattle.
