More Arrests In Atomic Spy Case Predicted

LONDON, May 29.—(AP)—Two London newspapers claim further arrests, including some Americans, will result from current questioning of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, convicted British atomic spy.

The predictions, made by the Sunday Reynolds News and the Sunday Empire News, were not confirmed officially. The Empire News said that for the past 10 days Fuchs had been "identifying suspect after suspect from films of thousands of people flown secretly and under close guard from America."

Fuchs is serving a 14-year sentence for funneling atomic secrets to Russia. Two FBI men have been questioning him for the past week.

Former Lutheran Bishop In Hungary Freed From Prison

BUDAPEST, Hungary, May 31.—(AP)—Former Lutheran Bishop Lajos Ordass has been released from prison after serving almost 20 months of a two-year sentence, an official communique disclosed last night.

Remission of the rest of his sentence followed his removal from office on April 2 by a special court of Hungary's Lutheran church. He had been convicted in a workers' court Sept. 28, 1948, of neglecting to report to the government that his church had received \$500,000 from American Lutherans.

(The bishop's removal from office was protested formally on April 18 by the Lutheran World federation, of which Ordass was a vice president.)

The communique said the Lutheran church had asked clemency for Bishop Ordass. The bishop had pleaded innocent to the charge against him at his trial.

Following Bishop Ordass' arrest on Sept. 10, 1948, the Lutheran World federation in a statement said American Lutherans had sent the Hungarian church only \$200,000. All of this, the statement said, was transmitted through the Hungarian national bank and became a matter of public record.

Later Bishop Elvin Berggrav, primate of the Lutheran church of Norway, charged that Bishop Ordass was imprisoned because he opposed the "misuse of police power" in Communist-dominated Hungary.

Scores Jailed In Korea On Eve Of National Voting

SEOUL, May 29.—(AP)—The little republic of Korea, born of the turmoil of World War II, and a hot spot in the Asian cold war since, today wound up a quiet (for Korea) campaign for tomorrow's national elections.

Six deaths, three kidnappings, four cases of arson and about 500 arrests have been reported. Among those clamped in jail were 42 candidates and 178 electioneers. The main charge was violation of election laws in sympathy with Communism.

This calm compared to the bloody elections of two years ago. Then some 800 were killed or wounded in the campaign. Another 100 casualties were added election day.

The 1948 trouble was blamed on North Korean Communists—down from the Russian-sponsored state in the north of the peninsula—to disrupt formation of the republic—a United Nations-sponsored state south of the 38th parallel.

For half a century all of Korea was a part of imperial Japan. On the block tomorrow are the 210 seats in the national assembly south by 2,156 candidates. Actually, the power of President Syngman Rhee also is at stake.

The term of the 75-year-old executive, once in exile in America, has two more years to run. But if the assembly goes anti-Rhee there will be efforts to curb his constitutional authority.

Two-thirds of the candidates are registered as independents. Many of these are believed to be party members who failed to win endorsement and entered on their own. Administration leaders suspect the communists of having 122 candidates running as independents.

Ten political parties are in the race.

Tampering With Free Assembly Subject To Suit

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—(AP)—The U. S. circuit court of appeals has ruled that individuals can be sued in federal court for tampering with the right of freedom of assembly.

The opinion opened the way for trial of a civil damage suit against five persons who allegedly broke up a La Cresenta public meeting at which a resolution against the Marshall plan was to be considered.

The 2-1 decision reversed the Los Angeles federal district court, which had ruled that individuals interfering with constitutional freedoms could not be sued unless they acted for the state or under state authority.

The suit was brought by members of the Cresenta-Canada Democratic club against Orville Collins, H. D. Burkheimer, Stanley Lord, James E. Doggett and Ralph Baker.

The complaint charged the defendants with conspiring to break up a 1947 public meeting and preventing adoption of a resolution against the Marshall plan.

Noting the possibility of a "flood of federal court action pitting individuals against other individuals," as a result of the ruling, Judge William Orr and Thomas McAllister suggested it would be up to Congress to take some action, if the load becomes "burdensome."

Judge William Healy dissented, said work would start within 10 days on a 13-acre campus at the southeast edge of the city.

Dousing Of Noisy Envoy Draws No Punishment

NEW DELHI, India, May 31.—(AP)—John Edwards, the Englishman who doused Argentina's ambassador with water, in a nightclub squabble, was acquitted today of assault charges.

A crowded courtroom applauded the acquittal verdict. The district magistrate in his verdict said Edwards had had provocation in his action May 5 in a New Delhi hotel because ambassador Tascheret's party persisted in blowing whistles and stopping the floor show.

Edwards had testified he asked the ambassador to behave and Tascheret laughed at him. After he poured water on the envoy "to cool him off," he said the Argentinian threw a drink in his face. The Englishman was arrested on the complaint of embassy staff members.

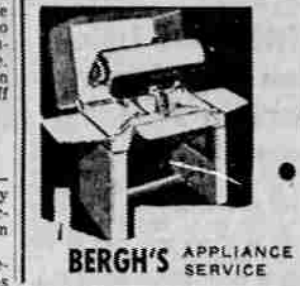

was previously introduced in the Senate by Senator Guy Cordon.

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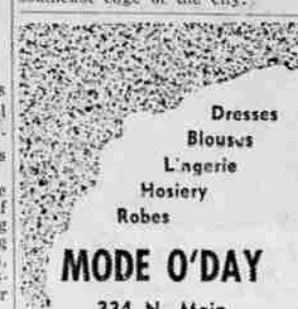
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Crook County School Building Contracts Let
