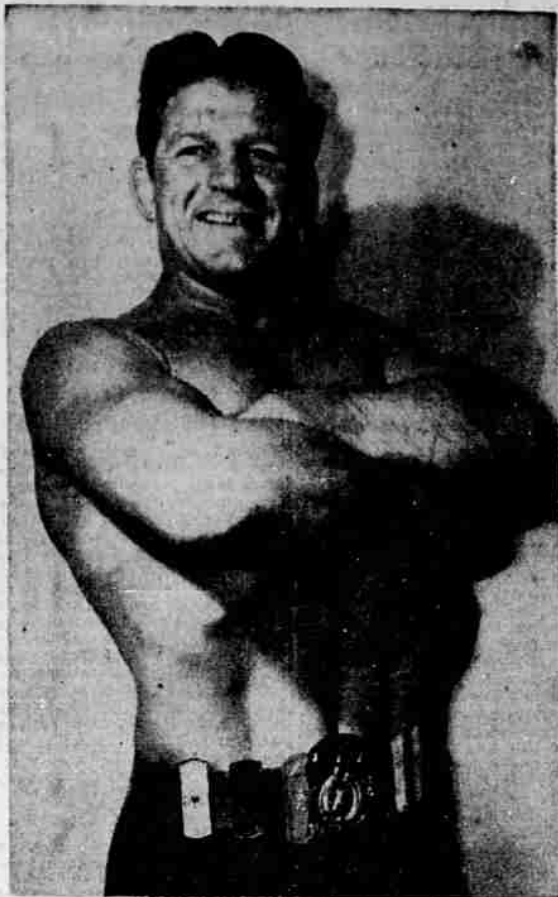

Ortiz Loses Crown To South African

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, June 1. — (AP) — Manuel Ortiz, the gritty little California Mexican, faced an uncertain future today while the ring world acclaimed a new bantamweight champion — South Africa's Vic Towel.

Towel, a 23-year-old former wood carver, wrestled the crown from Ortiz with an undisputed 15-round decision last night in Johannesburg's Wembley stadium.

The finish presented a paradoxical picture. Towel, the victor, was bleeding from over one eye and his nose. Ortiz, the vanquished, was unmarked.

But even Ortiz, a battle-weary ex-champion at 35, conceded he was a licked man.

"Towel's a great fighter but his punch was not hard enough to hurt me," said the pride of El Centro, Calif.

Ortiz' manager, Ray Luna, said there was "no doubt about the decision" and added:

"Towel's a bit green but he was too good for Manny tonight. I have no plans yet about Manny's future."

A bid to recapture the crown appeared unlikely. The little California warrior showed definite effects of his advancing age and his 12 years in the professional ring. Ortiz, weighing 116 pounds and 12 ounces to his foe's 117 pounds and one ounce, showed only flashes of his old punching prowess.

Taxicab Driver Fights Mad Dog To Save Pupils

ATLANTA, June 1. — (AP) — A taxicab driver, father of five children, wrestled with an apparent mad dog yesterday to save a group of 82 terrified kindergarten pupils.

"Any man with kids of his own would have done exactly what I did," said 28-year-old Rick Parker, shrugging off his act of bravery.

Parker spotted the dog, running wildly and foaming at the mouth, as he drove past the school. Classes were changing and the youngsters were on the grounds.

The alert cab driver threw his car in reverse and put it between the mongrel dog and the children. He shouted at a patrolling policeman to get the children inside.

Then the dog darted around the cab and Parker flung himself upon it. As the children watched from windows, he wrestled the dog down the street. A youth in the neighborhood finally killed the dog with a rifle. Parker was bitten on one hand and was given an anti-rabies shot.

The dog's head was taken to a laboratory for a rabies test.

To the school kids, the air forces veteran was a personal hero. "Better than in the comic books," said one.

Oregon Taverns Must Observe Standard Time

PORTLAND, June 1. — (AP) — All taverns and licensed clubs must close on standard time starting June 12.

The liquor control commission issued that order because some cities are on daylight time while their counties are on standard. The result has been to allow establishments outside city limits to remain open an hour longer than those in the city.

The closing hours, standard time, are midnight for taverns and 1:30 a.m. for licensed clubs.

Lane-Douglas Baseball Clubs To Start Play

Five, and possibly six, Lane-Douglas league baseball teams will commence activities in quest of a league championship this weekend as H. L. Floyd's Yoncalla team travels to Drain for a contest with the strong squad coached by David R. Dixon.

The Junction City and Drain entries in the league are expected to battle it out for the league's top position, according to league publicity man Frank Cuthrell of Eugene. He also says the Hills Creek club is a serious threat for the league pennant. The Hills Creek team, defending champion from the 1949 league race, will invade Marcola, a new team in the league, for a Sunday afternoon encounter.

The sixth possibility for league membership is Westfir which earlier this season had to withdraw from the league because it could not acquire playing facilities. The possibility of a field on which to play home games may make possible their return to the fold. If Westfir enters the league, they will play host to Junction City in an opening round game. All games will start at 3:30 p.m.

Cuthrell claims that the Lane-Douglas league is traditionally one of the strongest semi-pro leagues in the state and this year it should be even stronger. He says the caliber of players had been stepped up, with playing facilities and spectators accommodations greatly improved.

Citation To Run In 'Big' Money

ALBANY, Calif., June 1. — (AP) — Mighty Citation goes after the biggest stake in horse racing history Saturday at Golden Gate fields.

The pride of Calumet farm has a chance to become the greatest money winner of all time. Styline now holds this exalted position. He retired with earnings of \$918,475. "Big Cy" has won \$910,000 to date. The Golden Gate mile will be the fixture which may project Citation into the golden spot of the turf.

Nation's Best Ready For NCAA Track Contests

NEW YORK, June 1. — (AP) — At least six runners are pushing one another for the honor of breaking Lou Zamperini's 12-year-old mile record of 4:08.3 in the NCAA track championships June 16-17 at Minneapolis.

Still heading the list, and a favorite to win the race, is a third straight year, is tireless Don Gehrman of Wisconsin. It's Don's last crack at the mark held by the Southern California runner. Gehrman ends his collegiate career this month.

The next candidate is Yale's George Wade, of Seattle, who broke Zamperini's 1044 record with a 4:10.3 clocking last Saturday. The tall Eli senior seems capable of pushing Gehrman to a record-breaking performance.

Still dangerous is the man Wade drubbed in the 1c4A, Bill Mack of Michigan State. Then there's Bob Karnes of Kansas, Len Truex of Ohio State and Bill McGuire of Missouri.

Their clockings this season indicate a fast NCAA race. Wade's 4:10.3 is the best yet, followed by McGuire's 4:10.7, Karnes' 4:10.9, Gehrman's 4:11.8, Mack's 4:12.1 and Truex' 4:12.8.

Gehrman won the NCAA in 4:09.6 last June.

Eight of the 14 NCAA records will be in danger as Southern California defends its team title.

Jim Fuchs of Yale, holder of the unofficial world record of 58 feet 5 1/2 inches, will try to better his own NCAA mark of 56 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Hurdler Dick Atlessey of Southern Cal. is capable of better than the 13.9-second 120-yard high hurdles mark. The 6-foot 4-inch Trojan ran a 13.5 hurdles race a few weeks ago. That's one-tenth better than the old mark.
