Julia Retta Bridges, 89, lifelong resident of Douglas county, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Pauline Paul of New York City, on May 30 after a long illness.

She was born at Tangent, Ore., Jan. 13, 1871. She was the wife of William O. Bridges, who died in February, 1929. She was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving are two sons and two daughters, Boyd Bridges of Nevada and Lloyd Bridges, Leona; Mrs. Belle Kester and Mrs. Paul, both of New York. Three grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive.

Services will be held in the Methodist church at Yoncalla Monday at 2 p.m., with Rev. William N. Byars officiating. Vault interment will take place at the Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns mortuary in Oakland.

KLAMATH FALLS, June 2.—(P)—The planing mill of the Spangler Lumber company at Bly burned to the ground early last night. Bill Hayden, plant manager, said the blaze apparently started from sparks from a burner. The company's sawmill and other buildings at the mill site were not endangered by the flames.

Hayden said he was unable to make an estimate of the money damage and that the planer was partially insured.

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C. F. Spaulding Ends Career With Dept. Of Interior

Carl F. Spaulding, who served as acting registrar at the U.S. land office in Roseburg for 11 years, was retired from his duties with the U.S. Department of the Interior May 31. His 43 years of continuous employment is a near record, according to Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator of the Bureau of Land Management.

Spaulding was educated in Vermont, Massachusetts and New York. His first civil service assignment was in the U.S. land office, Phoenix, Ariz., in 1907. Since then, he had been assigned to various offices in Washington, Oregon, California and Utah. His service covered the exciting period of rapid land disposal through homestead entry, reversion of O. and C. railroad grant lands, and speculative filings on mineral lands.

Following transfer of the land office to the Bureau of Land Management, formerly the O. & C. administration Spaulding was moved to the Portland office, where he was often consulted on public land matters by other agencies because of his extensive knowledge of public lands of the Pacific Northwest.

Mr. and Mrs. Spaulding report plans to spend much of their time traveling during the next few months.

Plans may be, said the valedictory speaker, there is one goal which every graduate should have in common—to build a better community in which to live.

She said this might be done in three ways: by applying what the graduates have learned in school to everyday problems, by setting good examples, and by showing interest in what is going on in the community.

Miss Voorhies closed her speech by expressing the hope that the class of 1950 will work to make the world a better place in which to live.

Supt. Paul S. Elliott introduced the commencement speaker, Dr. Henry Gunn, president of Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

Elliott described the fine work that Dr. Gunn has done in the field of education in Oregon. He said that Dr. Gunn's acceptance of a school supervising job in California will be a great loss to Oregon education.

Dr. Gunn opened his address by saying the pageantry of the outdoor graduation exercises was the best he had ever seen. He expressed the hope that the outdoor commencement will be continued in the future.

Dr. Gunn spoke on the topic, "Time, Tension, and Tolerance." He described time as a relative thing. Everybody, said Dr. Gunn, has time and each can do whatever he wants to with his time. He illustrated his point with a few humorous stories.

He said each graduate was under tension, asking, "What do I do now?" He said each will answer this question for himself. But in the future, said Dr. Gunn, there will be even greater tensions that must be relieved. He gave one rule to follow on controlling tensions: don't release tensions through human scapegoats.

On the subject of tolerance, Dr. Gunn said the world is constantly getting smaller, which makes tolerances difficult to define. He urged each graduate to work to define tolerances, and should the class of 1950 define them, they will make a great contribution to human understanding.

Principal George Erickson introduced School Board Chairman A. J. Ellison who presented the diploma. Rev. Kenneth Knox closed the exercises with the benediction.

Ida Mae Murphy, 74, Dies After Illness

Ida Mae Murphy, 74, resident of Myrtle Point, died early today, June 2, after a lingering illness. She had been staying with her daughter, Mrs. Helen Rice, of Oakland, for the last month. She was born Oct. 18, 1875, in Cincinnati, and came to Oregon in 1913, living in Myrtle Point and in Bridge, Ore. She was preceded in death by her husband, Charles Murphy, in 1939. She was a member of the Eastern Star of Myrtle Point.

Surviving, besides her daughter, Mrs. Helen Rice, Oakland, are two brothers, A. J. Hornung, Ludlow, Ky., and E. W. Hornung, Cincinnati.

Funeral services will be held in The Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg Funeral home, Sunday, June 4, at 2 p.m. with Dr. Morris Roach officiating. Cremation will follow in the Portland crematorium.

Woman Detective Guns Man In Dope Den Raid

NEW YORK, June 2.—(P)—A woman detective shot and wounded a man last night as she and a male sleuth raided an upper Manhattan apartment and arrested eight dope suspects.

Brunette Kathryn Barry, five-foot-two, is a member of the city's narcotic squad.

Miss Barry teamed up with Detective Max Renner to shoulder their way into the apartment and confront seven men.

Two other men walked in. One was carrying a gun. The man with the gun fled. The other man fumbled in an inner pocket.

"Keep your hands still or I'll kill you," Miss Barry said.

The man made another grab at his jacket pocket and Miss Barry fired. In a hospital with a leg wound is Douglas Lopez, 26.

The detectives said they seized a quantity of marijuana in the raid. The men were arrested and booked on narcotics violation charges.

Miss Barry, ten years a police woman, said it was the first time she had fired at a prisoner.

Polio Common As Measles, Health Association Told

PORTLAND, Ore.—(P)—Public health officials of the west were told that polio is as common as the measles.

"You've had it and I've had it, but it's only one in a few cases that becomes serious," Dr. Gaylord W. Anderson, Minneapolis, declared.

He spoke at the closing session of the American Public Health association's western branch convention.

The doctor scoffed at public fears over medical reports showing more and more polio. He doubted there are any more cases, explaining improved diagnosis has resulted in more cases reported.

"Poliovirus is about as common as chickenpox or measles," he said.
