Air Force Accepts New Jet Aircraft

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The Air Force has accepted a combination bomber-reconnaissance plane powered by four jets, product of North American Aviation Corp.

Built for day and night reconnaissance, including charting, photographing and mapping, the plane is in the 350-mile-an-hour class, can climb to 40,000 feet and has a range of more than 1,200 miles. She carries a crew of three.

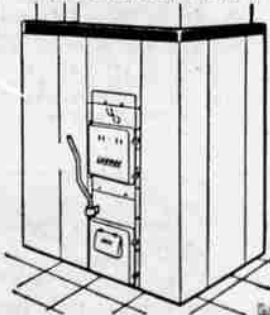
The plane has been designated the RB-45C. Her jets have a thrust of 20,800 pounds. She has a wingspan of 89 feet, is 75 feet long and 25 feet high; carries ejector seats for pilot and co-pilot and an escape hatch for the navigator.

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Jail Sentence Started For Contempt Of Congress

WASHINGTON, June 3 — (AP) — George Marshall, national chairman of the Civil Rights congress, Friday began a three months' federal jail sentence imposed for contempt of the House in 1946.

Marshall was cited four years ago for refusing to turn over to the House Un-American Activities committee a list of contributors to the National Federation for Constitutional Liberty. The organization, of which Marshall was chairman, was a forerunner of the Civil Rights congress. He was convicted and sentenced in 1948.

Government authorities said they also plan to bring others involved in contempt of Congress charges into district court to begin serving jail sentences or dispose of their cases.

Movie writers John Howard Lawson and Dalton Trumbo are due to appear next Friday. Each was given a one-year contempt sen-

tence for refusing to tell the House Un-American Activities committee in 1947 whether they were Communists. Each also was fined \$1,000. They have been out on bond. The supreme court recently turned down their appeals.
