

Panamanian Wins 100-220 Dashes In Oregon AAU

PORTLAND, June 5 — (AP) — Panamanian Olympic team runner Lloyd La Beach, seconds on a fast, dry track here Saturday night to equal the American record for a curved course.

The Loyola university of Los Angeles graduate also won the 100-yard sprint with a 9.6 seconds time to be the only double winner in the 1950 Oregon AAU track and field tournament.

His times in the two events equalled the Oregon records set by Dan Kelly, the Multnomah Athletic club star of the history-making competition of 1906. La Beach's 220 sprint tied the one-curve furlong record set by Ralph Metcalfe of Marquette in 1933, the American record.

Behind the Panama ace in the 220 were Bud White of Lewis and Clark and Mervin Brock of Oregon State college. Trailing him in the century were Bill Fell, the University of Oregon ace and Pacific Coast conference champion for the distance, and Dave Henthorne, Oregon.

The mile was a duel between conference titlist Jim Newcomb of the University of Southern California and northern division champion Jack Hutchins of Oregon. Newcomb won with a record-breaking time of 4:15.8, with Hutchins just a pace behind him. Dean Moore, Lewis and Clark's Northwest conference champion, was eight yards behind Hutchins for third place. All of them broke the old record set by Hutchins at 4:19.4 last year. Hutchins came in at 4:16 and Moore at 4:17.3.

The lead in the mile changed three times with Hutchins going in front 100 yards from the tape, but Newcomb forged ahead 40 yards from the finish and stayed by a slender margin.

A new pole vault record up with the 14 foot, 3 1/4 inch mark set by John Montgomery, former USC star now unattached. George Rasmussen of Oregon, the PCC champion, went to 14 feet even in his bid to retain the title and hold the record he set last year at 13 feet, 10 inches. Don Pickens of Oregon and Lyle Dickey of Oregon state tied for third.

Parry O'Brien, USC freshman, set a new shotput record with a heave of 50 feet, 7 1/2 inches.

Peter Mundie of Oregon turned in a record-breaking two-mile run of 9:44.8. Joe Fisher of Oregon State finished second and Lyall Sunberg, Vancouver Olympia club, third.

Mauna Loa Still Spews Fiery Lava

HONOLULU, June 5 — (AP) — Mighty Mauna Loa, a mountain with a stomach ache, continued its greatest eruption of the century today, spewing a lava flow toward the sea that endangered 35 homes and a lodge area.

Police at Kona, a village on the big island of Hawaii, said all residents of the endangered area had been evacuated. The new flow began about midnight and raced at breakneck speed toward the sea.

The lava's path transcends the southwest slope where the second and third flows of last week tumbled into the Pacific. Police said it endangers Ohia lodge and four or five houses clustered around the lodge, and the village of Ophali, which consists of about 30 houses.

On the other side of the volcano Foreman Ernest Morton of the Kahuku ranch said the flow there seemed to be dying out. (The island of Hawaii is the home of the United States' second largest ranch—the Parker ranch which is slightly smaller than Texas' huge King ranch.)

For the fifth straight day, rivers of red-hot rock curled down the southwest slope, burned black paths through forests and green fields and boiled viciously into the ocean. These fiery streams already have consumed homes of 40 persons along the rich southwest Hawaii Kona coast and forced another 60 persons to flee.

Firemen were quick to extinguish the flames in the sawdust and shavings bin, but the estimated \$30,000 damage forced two divisions of the operation to close for two days.

Engineer Keith Deacock, 40, Vancouver, Wash., was thrown from the building by the blast. He and watchman W. C. Cozad, 64, Portland, were treated for burns.

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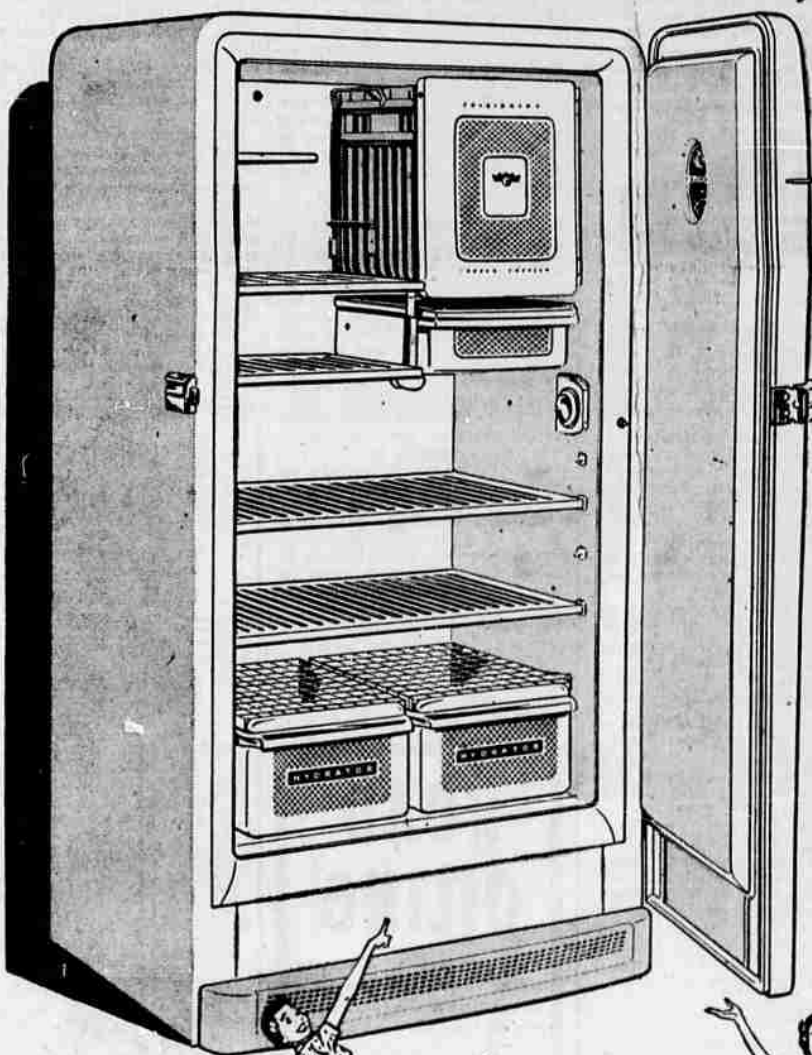
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
