VA May Propose End Of Insurance

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress may be asked by the Veterans administration to let World War II GI term insurance start expiring in 1953.

In that year, veterans who took out their policies in 1940 will have used up the 13-year term covered by the original congressional action plus two extensions voted since 1945. For vets who were first insured in 1945 the terminal date is in 1958.

VA insurance chief Harold W. Breining has told a House expenditures subcommittee that congressional failure to enact a third extension "would be a very desirable thing both from the standpoint of the veterans and of the government."

The second extension voted by Congress raised the premium on the term insurance, and it would be raised still further if extended again.

The alternative to letting the policy lapse at the end of 13 years would be to convert it to one of six permanent forms of insurance. The premium would be higher, but it would remain at the same level for the life of the policy.

More than 3,000,000 veterans still hold the unconverted national service life insurance, while about 2,000,000 have converted it to some other form.

Phone Tapping In Divorce Suit OK'd By Appeals Court

NEW YORK, June 6—(AP)—It's legal for a man to have his telephone tapped to get divorce evidence against his wife, a state appeals court ruled yesterday in throwing out the convictions of three men.

One of those cleared by the appellate division of the state supreme court in Brooklyn was Louis Appelbaum, 49, who used wiretapped records as evidence against his wife.

The court ruled, in a three-to-two decision:

"The subscriber may determine if his line is being used to his detriment by those he permits to use it. To this end he may have his line tapped or checked so that his business may not be damaged, his household situation impaired or his marital status disrupted."

Appelbaum had been given a suspended sentence on a conviction of illegally recording his wife Frieda's conversations on the phone.

The other two men cleared—Robert La Borde, 48, a private detective, and his brother, John A. La Borde, 39—had been sentenced to prison on wiretapping convictions. They remained free during the appeal.

Appelbaum hired the brothers to operate the wiretap, the prosecution charged.

Appelbaum sought a divorce on the ground of adultery, but a jury in the case was unable to agree. During the divorce hearing, recordings of the wife's telephone conversations were introduced.
