

Speeder Killed In Battle With Cops

LEBANON, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—A Lebanon man, halted as a speeder, was shot to death early today as he and a Sweet Home policeman grappled for a gun.

The victim was Theodore James Sylvester, 24.

Coroner Glenn Huston gave this report:

Sweet Home policemen Karl Hyer and Albert Osborn took "ut after a car that was speeding. They chased it, at 70 miles an hour, into Lebanon where the chased car stalled to a halt at Main and Sherman streets in the downtown district.

It halted at 3:10 a.m. beside a Lebanon police car occupied by officers John Richardson and Leon Fuller.

Hyer and Osborn pulled Sylvester from his car when he resisted arrest, the coroner continued, and shoved him in the Sweet Home police car. Sylvester grabbed Hyer's "sap" and shoved him away from the car. Then he slid behind the wheel and started up.

Osborn jumped in and the two men grappled over the policeman's gun. The trigger was pulled three times, "o bullets hit Sylvester in the s' . . . men. The third went wild.

The car rolled to a stop half a block away and Sylvester was taken to Lebanon community hospital where he died.

Sylvester was not married.

Portrait Device Aid In Sending Man To Prison

LOS ANGELES, June 6.—(AP)—Nine years in prison confront Charles Hubler, 29, convicted with the aid of a new mechanical portrait painter.

He was sentenced yesterday to a total penalty of nine years to life on charges of kidnapping, assault with intent to murder, and robbery.

The victim, Marilyn Danson, 23, helped police form a composite picture through images flashed on a screen, in the fashion of old lantern slides. The resulting drawing compared closely with a police file picture of Hubler who had a sex misconduct record. During his trial, she identified him as her assailant.

Fighting Force Increased

Miss Jane Cox, News-Review correspondent at Glendale, said today a dry wind, low humidity and high temperatures aided the spread of the fire Friday. Volunteers were rushed in from neighboring towns and from the Dollar Lumber company and Hayward's mill Friday night to check the fire's advance, aiding fire crews from the protective association.

Fire Chief Cox said the fire was at its worst Saturday and Sunday, spreading in spite of the combined efforts of fire fighters. He said the fire got away again Sunday night and that crews are still working hard today.

Cox also reported an injury to one unidentified fire fighter, thought to have been attached to the forest protective association. He said the exact extent of the man's injury was not known but that he thought the injury was slight.

U. F. McLaughlin, dispatcher for the Forest Protective association, said today's higher temperatures and generally high humidity readings made conditions much more favorable for fire fighters. Scattered showers were reported over much of the county and snow was reported from two lookouts—Silver butte and Mt. Scott. However, he said the general weather report for the immediate future, calling for more dry winds and low humidity, indicates the worst may not be over.

No report was received late this morning from crews engaged in mop up activity on the Elkhead fire east of Yoncalla. But McLaughlin said the Elkhead crews radioed last night the 1,200-acre fire was under control at that time. Thirty crewmen were still engaged in erecting fire trails, aided by loggers from the Woodard Lumber company and the Harold Woolley logging outfit.

NLRB, Denham In Fresh Clash

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—The National Labor Relations board today refused to go along with general counsel Robert N. Denham in waiving union shop elections in the widely scattered building and construction industry.

Denham had asked the board last Dec. 19 to recognize the difficulty in conducting the elections in the industry which employs about 2,000,000 workers.

He suggested waiving the elections despite the Taft-Hartley act provision requiring workers to vote on proposed union shop agreements.

Under a union shop arrangement, all workers must join a union within a short period after they are hired.

The board's special policy statement on the issue was another round in the feud between the five-man panel and Denham. The board said the legal requirement for the union shop elections is clear and must be followed.

Earlier this year the board supported President Truman's unsuccessful effort to have Congress eliminate Denham's job.

The board's statement, in effect, accused Denham of not obeying the law in waiving the elections. This follows repeated contentions by Denham that the board, too, is ignoring plain provisions of the Taft-Hartley act.

Chas. S. Howard, Noted Race Horse Owner, Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—(AP)—Charles S. Howard Sr., millionaire automobile dealer and famed owner of the race horse, Seabiscuit, died today.

Howard had been in failing health the past few years. He was best known, throughout the world, for his racing interests. His Seabiscuit, an often lame horse, became the then world's greatest money winner a decade ago when he won the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap. Howard now owns another hundred grand winner—the Irish-bred Noor which clipped Citation in both that great race and the \$50,000 San Juan Capistrano handicap at Santa Anita in March.

Howard also owned another Santa Anita "cap winner, Kayak II, imported from Australia. He is the only owner ever to win the race thrice.

Missing Child Believed Devoured By Bears

QUEBEC, June 6.—(AP)—Police today said they were convinced three-year-old Nicole Renaud, missing in a suburban forest since Saturday, had been eaten by bears. Authorities called off the search by nearly 1,000 police, soldiers and civilians.

Bear tracks were discovered in the vicinity where the tiny girl disappeared, eight miles north of here. Police said there had been no reports of previous attacks on persons by bears in the area but the police official in charge of the search, Lieut. Martin Healy, said last night:

Street Light Bids, Sewer Estimates Eyed By Council

The city council last night took under advisement bids submitted for extension of the street lights on South Stephens. The council will study the bids today and make their decision at a special meeting called, also, for the purpose of canvassing of the airport election votes Wednesday at 5:15 p. m.

Trowbridge Electric submitted an overall bid of \$10,750, using either General Electric or Westinghouse fixtures. There was slight variation in the figures, but the overall bid was the same. Alternates were listed, reducing the total by \$3,133.31, if the city did the ditching, base excavation and backfill.

A bid for materials only was submitted by Industrial Electric for a total of \$4,906.52, less 2 percent discount. Westinghouse bid on four material items only, including metal standards, luminaire fixtures, transformers and 21,000 lumen lamps.

The city has budgeted for the next fiscal year \$7,900 but has other funds which might be diverted for this purpose, if the council sees fit.

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Sewer Estimates Made

A preliminary survey has been made, at the request of the residents, as to sewers in Millers addition and Sleep; Hollow. The preliminary estimate places the cost of sewers at \$40,672, which is excessive, compared with the assessed valuation of the area of only \$58,373, according to a report by Councilman Frank Ashley.

Since some of the lots are valued at considerably less than the cost of the sewers per lot, the cost could not be borne, unless the owners made up the difference between the valuation and the cost of the sewers. The remainder could then be borne by the council.

The council committee will meet with representatives from the area to determine the procedure to follow.

Books To Be Audited

The council employed Leo F. Young to audit the city's books at a cost of \$40 daily for auditor and \$24 daily for a junior accountant, with the total cost not to exceed \$750, the amount budgeted for this work.

The council approved plans and specifications, as submitted by engineer Ben Irving, for the improvement of South Kane street from its present terminus to Harris street. The work ties in with the improvement of Hawthorne Terrace.

The city manager was authorized to purchase an asphalt spreader, within the limits of the amount provided in the new budget. This amount is \$1,000.

The amount of \$100 from the emergency fund was voted toward a Fourth of July fireworks display, to be sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

A petition was read requesting the grading and graveling of the parking strip in the 1200 block on No. Jackson. The council determined nothing could be done at this time, except that the grass and weeds would be cut.

Request for oiling of Maple Ave., signed by eight residents was presented. The council has no funds budgeted for this. The city manager was instructed to inform the petitioners that the council would be willing to discuss with them means whereby they might get the work done themselves.

Diplomas Given Record Class At Oregon State

CORVALLIS, June 6.—(AP)—Diplomas were presented to Oregon State's record-breaking 1950 class at the college's 81st annual commencement yesterday.

President A. L. Strand said the graduates in the "veteran's class" had a distinctive attitude, maturity and sense of direction.

Many of us believe this is the "number one" class," he said.

There were 1332 World War II veterans in the group.

The ceremony was held in Gill coliseum. A record 1968 degrees were conferred. About 10,000 persons were in the new structure for the first such exercise held there.

'Little' Shelton Again Dodges Gun Death In Ambush

FAIRFIELD, Ill., June 6.—(AP)—Gunmen firing from ambush tried again yesterday to take the life of "Little Earl" Shelton. But bullets apparently intended for him plowed instead into a companion, wounding him critically. The associate, Dellos Wylie, 35, was taken to a hospital. He was shot three times in the back.

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Wylie and Earl, 34, recently bought a building to be used as a garage. It is on highway 45, two miles west of here.

The pair drove up to the building yesterday afternoon and sat for a moment chatting. There was a sudden burst of gunfire and bullets tore into the car.

Earl ducked, shoved Wylie out of the vehicle and followed. They fled into the garage. A second fusillade ripped into the building.

Sheriff Elmer Brown said Wylie "lost his head" and tried to make a run for it, probably to hide behind the building. He was cut down in his tracks.

Earl, who escaped injury, gave the sheriff only meager details of the attack. As in past shootings, he refused to speculate on who the gunmen might be or what their motive was.

The shooting marked another chapter in the bloody history of the Sheltons. Little Earl is a nephew of "Big Earl" Shelton, whose two brothers were shot and killed from ambush — Carl in October 1947, and Bernie in July, 1948.

Numerous attempts have been made on Big Earl's life, the last on May 23. Riding with little Earl, he was shot in the right forearm in a burst of fire that rattled the car.

Big Earl, Carl and Bernie ruled the southern Illinois underworld during the prohibition era. The gang savagely fought the law and rival gangs which tried to muscle

in on their territory. Big Earl now owns a farm near here.

U. S. Lead In Atomic Weapons Can Ban Another War, Military Heads Believe

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Military planners are sticking to the belief that America's apparent lead in atomic weapons can prevent a third world war.

If one does come, they feel such a head start would play a major role—along with the rest of the nation's defense machine—in achieving victory.

But in conversations with a reporter they made clear they do not think atomic superiority will make defense cheap or easy.

They believe that new tactical atomic weapons — weapons usable against troops and their lines of communications—hold the key to a defense setup which the west can achieve without spending beyond its means.

In a radio and television broadcast, Gen. J. Lawton Collins, army chief of staff, said that atomic weapons for use by the army "most assuredly can be developed."

He declared the army is doing a great deal of work toward developing weapons that it can use with atomic materials.

And he added that it is "by no means impossible" to develop an artillery piece that will fire an atomic weapon, or guided missiles which could carry an atomic warhead.

The Associated Press has received authoritative information that such weapons already have been developed.

Russia Believed Lagging

Referring obviously to Russia, but without mentioning that country by name, Collins said:

"We don't believe the enemy would have these weapons because there is a limit to his industrial capacity and his research and development field. We think that we can and are keeping ahead of him."

Apparently, the United States had a lead of slightly more than

four years in production of the first atomic bomb. The first bomb exploded in a New Mexico desert on July 16, 1945. Not until September 23, 1949, did President Truman announce that an atomic explosion had occurred in Russia.

Converting this apparent lead into more effective military strength by the time Russia has a substantial stockpile of atom bombs is the military planners' prime objective. No one knows exactly when Russia will have such stockpile, but it is widely expected to be within two to five years.

Collins mentioned atomic bombs and other new weapons as a means of "making it practicable for western Europe to defend itself, with certain aid from us, within the economic possibilities of European to raise the necessary forces."
