

Employee Ouster On Loyalty Doubt To Be Aired

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The supreme court has agreed to rule on whether the federal government may fire any employee if there is "reasonable doubt" as to the worker's loyalty.

The case was taken to the tribunal by Miss Dorothy Bailey, 39, who was fired from an \$8,000-a-year government job here on disloyalty grounds.

The argument on the case will be heard next October.

Miss Bailey appealed to the high

tribunal from a decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals here. The appeals court said that under the government's loyalty program the President "may remove from government service any person of whose loyalty he is not completely convinced."

Miss Bailey was accused of membership in the Communist party, but she denied this.

The supreme court has also agreed to rule on constitutionality of the loyalty program itself. The issue was raised in appeals filed by the joint Anti-Fascist Refugee committee and the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Inc.

Robeson Accuses Rogge Of Being Tito's Hireling

LONDON, June 6.—(AP)—American singer Paul Robeson has attacked O. John Rogge, former U.S. assistant attorney general, as a paid lobbyist for Marshal Tito's Yugoslavia. Rogge confirmed he held such a job, and defended his activities for the Cominform out-cast.

The clash occurred after Rogge, a vice president of the world peace committee, offered a resolution to the committee's executive committee here asking that the Yugoslav peace committee be readmitted. It was expelled last year, 13 months after Tito broke with Moscow.

The committee rejected the resolution in a stormy session. After the meeting both Rogge and Robeson addressed a news conference.

"I'm a registered lobbyist for Yugoslavia and for a number of organizations," Rogge said. "I'm a lawyer, and my firm represents a number of clients."

Rogge has offices in New York. He was an assistant attorney general from 1943 to 1946. He has visited most of the Communist-dom-

America Letting Russia Win Salesmanship Game, Idaho Seniors Told By Palmer Hoyt

MOSCOW, Idaho, June 6.—(AP)—Americans are blamed by a Colorado newspaper publisher for letting Soviet Russia beat them at their own game—salesmanship.

Palmer Hoyt, publisher of the Denver Post, spoke before a class of graduating University of Idaho seniors at the annual commencement exercises.

He termed the Russians, "the first world power bent on global conquest who have substituted the word for the sword."

"And as the battalions of Russian phrases march in conquest the world around," the speaker continued, "it should be a matter of serious embarrassment to the Americans that the Russians are defeating us at our own game. Namely the matter of salesmanship x x x."

Hoyt proposed a remedy and noted at the same time that "it should be a matter of deep chagrin x x x that the Russians are able to sell slavery more conclusively than we can sell freedom."

For a remedy he proposed—"the propaganda of truth."

"Perhaps the greatest weapon we could contrive or use would be to tell the word story of America just as it is x x x." He added that that story should contain a full

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Tax Bill Far Short Of Meeting Truman's Demands

WASHINGTON, —(AP)—The house ways and means committee still is about \$500,000,000 short of meeting President Truman's demand for a new revenue to offset proposed excise and other tax cuts.

A report prepared by the committee's staff of specialists disclosed that the tax bill writers have found new sources of revenue estimated to bring in about \$695,000,000 a year.

This falls far to offset estimated reductions of \$1,243,000,000 already approved by the committee. Excise reductions it has recommended alone total more than \$1,000,000,000.

Mr. Truman twice has said that he will veto any legislation reaching him which fails to make up for most of the loss resulting from tax cuts, through additional taxes on other sources.

Committee members for the most part agree that corporation taxes must be raised if enough revenue is to be brought in to offset all the reductions that have been approved.

While some Democrats reportedly favor higher corporation taxes, it appeared uncertain whether there are enough of them to control the committee.

Republican committee members oppose any increase in corporation levies. Some favor a cut.

The committee's specialists estimated revenue gains of \$595,000,000 from changes in present tax laws, plus \$100,000,000 in individual income taxes.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—(AP)—Lyle Buwell, 33, an air force sergeant, Monday was sentenced to three life terms in prison.

He was convicted June 1 of the rape-slaying of Mrs. Fairy Decker, 44, sergeant in the women's air force.

Sgt. Decker's body was found March 25 near the women's barracks at Hamilton field.
