Naval Academy Forced To Reduce Appointments

WASHINGTON—AP—The Navy has decided to cut back the training of new officers at the Naval academy, Annapolis, Md. As a result, it will cut from five to four the number of appointments each Congress member may make to the academy.

Vice Adm. J. W. Roper, chief of naval personnel, disclosed the decision in a memorandum to all senators and representatives.

He said living quarters at the academy are designed for 2,750 midshipmen, but that about 3,400 are now "on board" and the total is expected to reach 3,700 by October, 1950.

Rather than ask "in these times of essential retrenchment" for an estimated \$28,000,000 to expand facilities, Roper continued, "a reduction in the size of the brigade of midshipmen is the acceptable alternative."

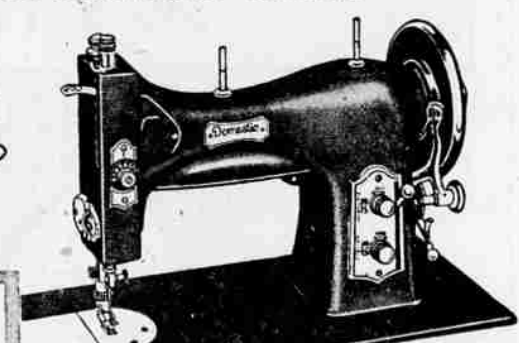
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
