Adjustment On Disability Claim Demanded In Suit

John G. Miller has filed a suit in circuit court against the Oregon Industrial accident commission, demanding an adjustment on a disability claim.

In March of 1950, the plaintiff alleges he sustained an injury to his right great toe while changing a cutter blade on a road grader. Miller charges in his complaint that the accident resulted in the amputation of the injured toe on March 30, 1950.

The plaintiff states after filing a claim with the defendant commission, his claim was rejected on May 1, because "condition requiring treatment was not result of trauma alleged."

Plaintiff demands compensation of 34 days while off work as a result of the alleged injury and permanent partial disability equal to the 100 percent loss of his toe.

MONEY SUITS FILED

The following money actions were filed in circuit court Wednesday:

A. L. Real vs. Lloyal W. Goff and Sadie M. Goff. Plaintiff demands judgment totaling \$7,500 on two promissory notes and mortgage foreclosure on defendants' property to satisfy the judgment. Credit Service Co. vs. Cody Cackler and Virgil Veysey. Plaintiff demands judgment for \$338 on an assigned account allegedly due for unpaid merchandise.

COMPLAINT AMENDED

An amended complaint has been filed in circuit court by the attorney for E. L. Settle, plaintiff, naming Dennis Mathews, doing business as Uniqua Transfer, as defendant in a suit, in which Settle asks \$6,151 damages for alleged injuries sustained in a truck loading accident July 31, 1948.

The original complaint, filed by Settle's attorney, named Mathews and Roseburg Transfer as defendants.

JUDGMENT AWARDED

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly has awarded judgment of \$164.79 for the plaintiff, Fir Manufacturing Co., after ruling the defendants, Lester Reese and Betty Reese, to be in default.

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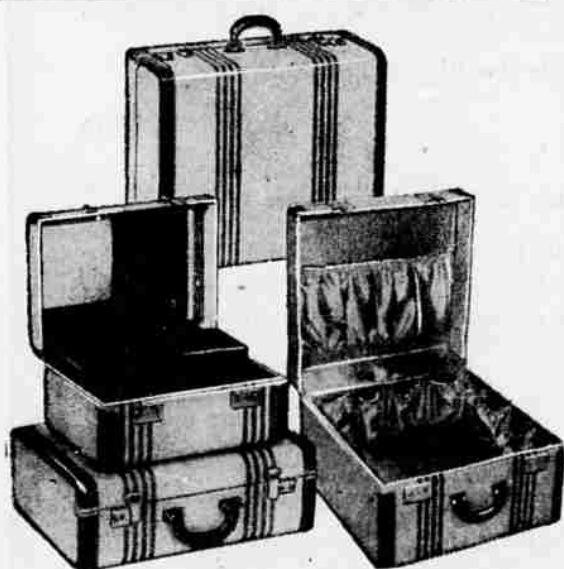
