Famed Gorilla Seriously Ill In Chicago Zoo

CHICAGO, June 10.—(AP)—Bushman, a massive, ugly-faced gorilla who is regarded as the world's prized zoo animal and probably has more fans than a movie star, is gravely ill.

The famed ape, Chicago's biggest single attraction for some 20 years, was reported suffering from the combined effects of arthritis, heart disease and old age.

"He might die in the next five minutes or he may live a year," said Dr. Wesley Young, managing director of the Anti-Cruelty society and for many years head veterinarian at the Lincoln Park zoo.

The veterinarians attending Bushman diagnosed his illness from a distance. They said that even in his weakened condition it would be impossible to enter Bushman's cage to examine him.

No one has entered the huge gorilla's cage since 1936. The ban was ordered after Bushman, then weighing 150 pounds, pulled his 185-pound trainer down a flight of stairs.

Bushman is 22 years old and said to be the oldest gorilla in captivity. He weighs 550 pounds and is 6 feet, two inches tall. The strength of his hands is immense, veterinarians said, and even if he were unconscious his reflexes might seriously injure a man. The veterinarians are giving him digitalis—a heart stimulant—in his food. But he is not getting his normal diet of 20 pounds of food and three quarts of milk. It has been reduced to some fruit and milk. Guards maintained a 24-hour vigil near the big ape's cage.

Truman Speech Stirs Remarks

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—President Truman's indication that the need for aid to western Europe won't end with the Marshall plan in 1952 stirred bipartisan criticism in Congress today.

While the President's assertion in a Columbia, Mo., address that this country can't close out its "vital national interest, in a healthy world economy" found acceptance among many lawmakers, they didn't agree among themselves how to maintain it.

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the GOP floor leader, blasted at Mr. Truman's remarks as an indication that the administration intends to come up with a new European recovery program by another name.

"Paul Hoffman has said there are absolutely no plans to continue the Economic Cooperation Administration beyond 1952 and now the President comes along and contradicts him," Wherry told a reporter.

"I'm convinced we are never going to get those European countries off the American taxpayer's back as long as this administration is in power."

Senator George (D-GA), a member of the senate foreign relations committee, said in a separate interview that he, for one, is going to insist that ECA close up shop in 1952.

"I think we would be doing western Europe a disservice to encourage the hope there that this country can continue Marshall plan aid," George said.

"It will be time enough when we know the circumstances and the conditions to determine whether we will have to give them additional aid."

George agreed with the President, however, that the United States can't pull out and let the rest of the anti-Communist world shift for itself.

Gamblers Know Plates
NEW YORK, June 10.—(AP)—The Brooklyn gambling probe will know the money because the underworld knows the license plate numbers of the investigators' autos, says Brooklyn District Attorney Miles F. McDonald.

McDonald appealed yesterday to the city board of estimate for an additional \$90,000 to continue his investigations for another six months.

The board originally appropriated \$60,250 for the probe. The prosecutor told the board the estimated operating expenses have jumped because the underworld somehow obtained a list of license plate numbers on the investigators' cars. Now the vehicles cannot be used and other cars must be pressed into service.

LITTLE GIRL KILLED
ONTARIO, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Dianne Gwen Naillon, 2, died under the wheels of an oil company truck here yesterday.

Walter Walker, state police sergeant, said the girl was at play, and apparently darted under the wheels just as the truck started up. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer M. Naillon.

Remington Will Try To Prove He's Not Red

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—William W. Remington will quit his \$10,000-a-year Commerce department job Monday so he can devote his time to trying to prove that "I have never been a member of the Communist party."

The 32-year-old wartime naval intelligence lieutenant is to appear in federal court in New York Tuesday to answer an indictment charging he lied when he said he had never been a Communist. It is expected to be months before his trial actually starts.

The department economist notified Secretary of Commerce Sawyer by letter yesterday he had reconsidered an earlier refusal to resign at Sawyer's request, and would quit "at the close of business Monday."

Sawyer, who had gone to his home in Cincinnati earlier in the day, told aides by telephone he would not comment.

But other commerce officials said the resignation will end department proceedings to remove Remington on "maladministration" charges which Sawyer himself has said were "in no wise intended to reflect" on Remington's loyalty.

Similar proceedings have been started against another \$10,000-a-year official of the department office of international trade, Michael E. Lee.

Big Anti-Trust Prosecution Aims At Alaskan Firms

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—The biggest string of anti-trust prosecutions ever undertaken at one time in a single area was aimed today at a sizeable segment of business in Alaska.

Prosecutions were started yesterday in Anchorage against 23 corporations, 138 individuals and two liquor dealer associations, and Attorney General McGrath said last night that more actions are to come.

McGrath announced that the move was directed against what the Justice department described as "collusive arrangements among business groups which have obstructed the development and expansion of the Alaskan economy."

The department, he said, had been investigating the situation for nearly a year.

Based on 10 sealed indictments returned last Monday by a federal grand jury at Anchorage, the actions were directed against several lines of trade, including shipping, fuel supplies, food, the liquor business, taxicabs and dry cleaning services.

According to the Justice department, the "most significant" of the prosecutions was a double-barreled indictment and civil suit against Alaska Steamship company of Seattle and five of its officers, including the president, Gilbert W. Skinner.

The attorney general said that because it is the only line serving the entire territory, Alaska Steamship "virtually controls the economy of Alaska."

Newfoundland Town Threatened By Fire
ST. JOHN'S Newfoundland, June 10.—(AP)—Residents of the northern Newfoundland paper town of Lewisporte today continued preparations for evacuation as a forest fire roared out of control 2½ miles from the town.

Adding to the danger were 2,000,000 gallons of high octane gasoline stored in the town for the huge airfield at Gander.

The blaze was described last night as completely out of control, though dying winds gave some promise of help. Fire fighters said a change of wind was the only weapon that would be effective against the slowly advancing flames.

The steamer Springdale was standing by to take refugees if evacuation was ordered.

Meanwhile 200 volunteers were battling nine other forest blazes at various points in the island province.

Community Hospital Kitchen Bid Accepted
National Restaurant Supply Co., formerly Greene Winkler, of Portland submitted a low bid of \$18,834, for kitchen equipment for the new Douglas community hospital, it was announced by the hospital board of trustees. The bids were opened Thursday night. The low bid was accepted.

The board has also completed negotiations for hospital furnishings selected to harmonize with its modern building and to assure effective and comfortable service to its patients, it was announced.

The furniture has been ordered at this early date to insure delivery in time for installation prior to the opening of the hospital. The furnishings are for all the rooms, other than the lobby and office.

The date set for the completion of the hospital is Oct. 15.

Man Who Grew Beard Not Back On Job

KANSAS CITY, June 10.—(AP)—A man who lost his job because he grew a beard is not entitled to reinstatement.

So ruled an arbitration panel yesterday in a 2-1 decision. Howard Hatfield, 30, grew a beard to help celebrate Kansas City's centennial. His employer, a delivery firm, said the beard violated a company rule—either the beard or Hatfield must go.

That was last February when the mayor was appealing to every male citizen to let his beard sprout.

Hatfield, a driver for the firm and active in the centennial organization, said he couldn't ask others to grow a beard unless he had one. So he refused to shave.

Yesterday's nine-page opinion pointed out that the company wouldn't "lose face by restoring Hatfield to his job" but chided Hatfield for his "wilful, almost childish, desire to grow a beard and be a hero."

But the beard will remain until July 4, end of the celebration, said Hatfield after the arbitration ruling. He's got a new job and his new employer admires his beard.

Eugene Worker Held As Alleged Attacker Of Girl

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 10.—(AP)—A gunman, frustrated in a holdup attempt, abducted an 18-year-old St. Paul girl early Friday and five hours later police arrested a 35-year-old Eugene, Ore., bricklayer. He was seized as he slept in his car alongside a nearby highway.

The victim of the abduction, who told police she was twice raped by the gunman, identified the man as her assailant. Two youthful companions of the man, who had pleaded with him to leave the girl alone, also identified him as the kidnaper-rapist.

Deputy Sheriff Pat McDonald and St. Paul detective John Baum, said the man identified himself as Carl Eugene Stout, of (2515 W. Seventh St.) Eugene, Ore., and said he formerly lived in Ashland, Wis. He told police he was enroute to Duluth, but declined to answer further questions and asked for a lawyer.

The girl was forced to leave the car of Merle Bergloff, 22, as it was parked in a lover's lane area north of St. Paul shortly after midnight. The gunman drove away with her after being told that neither the girl nor her companion had money. Before leaving, he shot through a fender and tire of the car and forced Bergloff to let the air out of the tires.

Hysterical, the girl appeared at her home about three hours later, however, she accompanied the officers to the area and immediately identified Stout.

The two young companions of the gunman said they knew him only as "Johnnie" and that he had suggested they hold up couples parked in the lover's lane area. They said they met him in a tavern last night, and had several drinks with him.

Hospitals, Orphanages Get Milk Deliveries
PITTSBURGH, June 10.—(AP)—Hospitals, orphanages and homes for the aged are about the only places where milk is being delivered today in Pittsburgh and nearby communities.

A strike of 3,250 milk and dairy workers has cut off other deliveries to some 2,500,000 western Pennsylvanians.

After the walk-out at midnight Thursday the Allegheny County Medical association made a special arrangement with the striking AFL Milk and Ice Cream Driver Salesmen and Dairy employees, local 205, to provide milk on an emergency basis for babies' formulas, invalids and others.

Main issues in the strike are wages, commissions and vacation improvement, an industry spokesman said.

TEXAS LEADS IN TV
WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—Texas still leads the nation in radio and television broadcasting outlets, with California a close second.

The Federal Communications Commission released a mid-year breakdown today showing Texas has 222 standard radio, frequency modulation and television stations. California is next with 219. These two states showed up in the same order in the breakdown a year ago.

New York state's 13 television stations top the TV list. Ohio is next with 12 and California third with 11.

Shelton Clan Holds Burial

FAIRFIELD, Ill., June 10.—(AP)—Another of the vanishing Sheltons—a clan once feared in the southern Illinois district—will be laid to rest today.

Roy Shelton, 65, third of the Shelton brothers to die in violence, will be buried alongside Carl Shelton, the first of the Shelton brothers to be cut down by assassins.

The funeral won't match the gaudy standard set by the fast-living and faster dying underworld in the prohibition era, but it will be sumptuous at least by Fairfield measures.

Three Sheltons—brother Earl and his nephews, Little Carl and Little Earl—have places in the funeral cortege. Big Earl and Little Earl both have twice been targets of gunmen. They plan to ride unguarded to the funeral plot in Maple Hill cemetery at the edge of town.

Roy Shelton, never connected with the activities of the Shelton gang, died Wednesday at the hands of a hidden gunman.

Life ended suddenly for Big Carl Shelton in 1947 in an ambush. And in July, 1948, Bernie Shelton died in the same manner.

Their slayers never have been apprehended.

The two Shelton brothers still living are Earl and Delta—Delta is a farmer who never has been publicly linked with the Shelton gang's prohibition era rule of southern Illinois.

The idea that these repeated attacks on the Sheltons would drive them from Wayne county was dismissed by Mrs. Agnes Shelton, 88, mother of the five brothers.

"My boys wouldn't move away and leave their mother," she said. "Anyway they have no place to go."

Korean Unification Object Of Mission
SEOUL, Korea, June 10.—(AP)—John Gaillard of the United Nations commission to Korea left the border today in the hope of meeting Communist North Koreans for a unification talk.

The trip grew out of an exchange of broadcasts. The North Korean radio invited a spokesman for the South Korean government to talk about a combined national election in August for the two halves of the country.

South Korea's government ignored this offer; its leaders including President Syngman Rhee were called war criminals and excluded. The U.N. was also excluded, but the agency broadcast an offer to talk about unification.

Midwest Gets Showers
CHICAGO, June 10.—(AP)—Cool air and thundershowers ended a hot and humid spell for much of the Midwest today but the sticky weather continued in some areas.

The hot and humid air extended from central lower Michigan to northern Texas. The showers and thundershowers were over a area from lower Michigan through parts of Illinois and Indiana southwestward into northern Texas.

The Gulf and Atlantic Coast states had mostly fair and warm weather. It also was fair over the northern plains and western parts of the country with readings near normal.

A tornado hit in the eastern outskirts of Blackwell, Okla., last night, but no one was hurt.

Last Scottsboro Negro Departs

MONTGOMERY, Ala.—(AP)—The last of the "Scottsboro boys" to leave prison took his wife and child and headed away from the South Saturday.

Mild-mannered Andy Wright was one of nine negroes accused of raping two white women on a freight train in 1931. Their trial at Scottsboro was a sensation of the 30's.

The tall, 38-year-old Negro left prison yesterday with \$13.45 "go free" money in his pocket, and forgiveness in his heart. He said he was going to Albany, N. Y., to take a job as a hospital porter.

"I've got no hard feelings toward anyone," he told newspapermen who gave him a ride to the railroad station.

"I'm not mad because the white girl lied about me. If she's still living, I feel sorry for her because I don't guess she sleeps much at night."

Insisted Innocent
The Negro steadfastly insisted on his innocence during a six-year court battle. He was sentenced to 99 years in prison.

Wright said Dr. Allan Knight Chalmers of the Boston University school of theology had sent him additional money to help pay his travel expenses to New York.

He said he would like to go to his home at Chattanooga, Tenn., to see his seriously ill mother, but probably would meet his wife and child in Atlanta and go to New York.

Wright and eight other Negroes were arrested at Paint Rock, Ala., March 25, 1931. They were charged with the rape of Mrs. Victoria Price and Ruby Bates.

Testimony Repeated
The Bates girl repudiated her testimony that she had been raped. The rape story was a "frame up," she said. Eight of the nine were convicted and sentenced to death at the first trial, but the verdict was reversed.

Mrs. Price was the only complaining witness in later trials, which eventually resulted in the conviction of four of the Negroes. A fifth, Ozie Powell, was sentenced to 20 years for attacking a deputy sheriff.

Wright was given a parole in 1944 after serving seven years. It was revoked three years later when he was convicted of reckless driving and driving without a license.

Besides Wright, three Scottsboro defendants are on parole now. Clarence Norris, whose death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment, is among them. He has been declared delinquent, but
