

Oregon State Rapped Most At PCC Meet—Fined \$2,500

VICTORIA, B. C., June 14.—(P)—A trip for an athlete and failure to follow orders on abating an alumnus cost Oregon State college \$2,500 last night and earned it the Pacific Coast conference fines championship.

Washington, which headed the 1949 parade and set the all-time record of \$5,350, tied for second with UCLA this year. They were fined \$1,800 each for violations of the conference code.

Stanford must pay \$1,750, Southern California \$1,600, Idaho \$1,500, California \$750, Montana \$400 and Oregon and Washington State \$200 each. Last year Idaho paid \$4,010 and Washington State ranked third with \$3,720. Oregon State was on the bottom in 1948, paying \$120.

Six schools were ordered to abate 11 alumni. The conference may issue such orders when an alumnus has been adjudged guilty of making "persistent, repeated or offensive efforts" to recruit athletes. When abated, the alumnus can make the school liable to fines if he persists in the recruiting.

Three Each
Oregon State and UCLA were told to abate three each. California had two on the abatement list and Idaho, USC and Stanford one each. Completion of the annual "police court" session overshadowed such items as Rose Bowl policy and the television question. The latter occupied conference athletic directors all day yesterday and they were still arguing late last night on what to do about televising games.

There was no official report on Rose Bowl policy but lobby talk among the delegates indicated the coast conference is ready to compromise with the Big Ten on selection of the annual representatives.

The coast is expected to suggest that each conference limit its schools to one appearance in two years at the Rose Bowl. The Big Ten has had a three-year limit while the coast has permitted a team to make the bowl trip as often as it could win the conference title.

To End Today
The conference summer meeting breaks up today with delegates returning to Seattle by boat this evening. Little remained to be decided and it was indicated that athletic directors failed to agree on the television problem they might schedule a special meeting in about a month.

The total charged member school in fines this year—\$12,500—is just

over half last year's \$21,105. The conference charged Oregon State \$1,500 for "entertainment and transportation of a junior college athlete from Los Angeles to Corvallis and return." Failure to abate the alumnus cost the school \$1,000. Stanford also drew a \$1,000 penalty for failure to abate an alumnus and an off-campus interview with a high school athlete by two coaches cost Idaho the same sum. UCLA must pay \$1,500 because its boxing team was matched with non-collegiate opponents. Washington was fined \$1,500 for making promises of financial and other aid to two athletes.

Most of the other fines stemmed from bookkeeping errors in the employment records of athletes, uncorrected by the office of conference commission Victor Schmidt.

Methodists Win Twilight Game

Methodist church defeated Pierce Freight 10-8 in a YMCA Twilight league encounter on Vets field Tuesday evening.

The freight club outdid the church team, 12-4, but untimely errors and sharp fielding by the Methodist squad cost Pierce the ballgame.

The Methodist team opened its scoring in the second frame with three runs on, no hits, one error, a fielders' choice and five walks. They scored again in the third frame when two runs crossed the plate on no hits, one error, two sacrifices and two walks.

Hit In 4th
The winners received their first hit of the ballgame in the fourth inning when Robert Witten singled to score John Todd. The church team added three more runs in the fifth on two hits, two errors and two walks. The club cinched the ballgame in the sixth with one run on, one hit and one error.

Pierce took an early one run advantage in the first frame. The outfit scored four runs in the third frame to tie up the ballgame at 5-5. They were held scoreless in the fourth as the church team went out in front, 6-5. The freight team scored its last tallies in the fifth with three runs crossing the plate on four hits, one error and a fielders' choice.

Gives Up 12 Hits
Wesley Johnson, the winning pitcher, gave up 12 hits, walked six and struck out two. Blade, the losing pitcher, allowed the church team four hits, walked 10 and struck out two.

Taylor of Pierce Freight, paced the hitters with two for two. Tonight, the Jaycees will face the Lions in their second league encounter.

Detroit Tigers Down Athletics With Evers' Hit

Hoot Evers last night hammered a 10th inning home run to give the Detroit Tigers a 6-5 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics. It was his ninth of the campaign. He also walloped a triple and single to run his hitting streak through 18 consecutive games. He added 10 points to his batting average to place him at the top in both leagues with a .378 figure.

Evers' bat boosted the league leading Tigers to a half game edge over the New York Yankees, who bowed to the White Sox in Chicago, 6-5. It was the first Yankee defeat in the west. They had made a sweep of the previous tour.

Art Houtteman survived three home run pitches to post his seventh victory for Detroit. A pair of homers by Elmer Valo, each with one on, and another by Sam Chapman accounted for all Philadelphia's runs. Houtteman now has thrown 10 home run balls. It was Detroit's fifth straight victory and the seventh in a row over the A's.

Catcher Phil Masi's ninth inning single off Joe Page scored Chico Carrasquel with the winning run for the White Sox. Bob Cain, who earlier had blanked the Yanks 15-0, pitched seven-hit ball for his third triumph. Page, relieving starter Tommy Byrne in the ninth, dropped his fourth decision.

Boston's Red Sox whipped the Cleveland Indians, 8-1, to remain five and a half games behind the Tigers. The St. Louis Browns, fresh from a successful eastern trip, walloped the Washington Senators twice, 8-3 and 6-1 to move into seventh place, only a half length behind the sixth-place White Sox.

The St. Louis Cardinals increased their National league lead to three full games, whipping the third place Phils in Philadelphia, 6-3, while the runner-up Dodgers were losing to the Chicago Cubs in Brooklyn, also by a 6-3 score. New York's Giants whipped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-0, and Boston's Braves trounced the Cincinnati Reds, 5-3.

Bobby Doerr, who can hit Bobby Feller blindfolded, cracked a pair of home runs, a triple and a single off the former strikeout king to lead the Red Sox to an easy win in one inning in their western invasion.

The Cards tallied all their runs in one inning — the sixth — when they chased starter Curt Simmons with a five-hit blast. A bases loaded single by Marty Marion and a two-run double by Red Schoendienst did most of the damage.

A two-run homer by Roy Smalley off Clarence Podbielan sparked a three-run 11th inning to give the Cubs their sixth victory over the Dodgers in 10 meetings.

SCOUTS ACTIVE
MASON CITY, Ia. — (P)—Scouts for at least six major league teams are camping on the doorstep of young Jim VerHelst, pitcher for St. Joseph's high school here. VerHelst graduated recently after an amazing senior season in which he hurled four no-hitters in 10 games and lost but one start, that by 1-0.

The youngster gave up only one unearned run all season. He pitched 72 2-3 innings, allowed 10 runs, 14 hits and struck out 142 batters. The only game he dropped came in the state finals when his teammates made three consecutive errors with two out to allow a run. The pitcher gave up but one hit, that in another inning. VerHelst stands six-three and weighs 190 pounds.

Babe Ruth Sportsmanship Award Goes To Two Glide High Students

Glide High school has honored two students, Jean Messing and Jack Harvey, with the Babe Ruth sportsmanship award. A special awards committee, composed of both faculty members and students of the school, recently selected the two Glide high school students for the sportsmanship honor.

The basis of the awards, according to John Orr, high school superintendent, was sportsmanship and not mere competitive excellence, popularity or winning the most letters, holding the most offices and the like, except as these were indications of achievement in the broader realm of fair play.

Receive Medallions
The two Glide students will have their names engraved on the Babe Ruth sportsmanship plaque at the high school and each was awarded an individual gold medallion to signify the fair play award honor.

One thousand high schools in 29 states, including Glide high school, are cooperating in the new sportsmanship program named in honor of Babe Ruth. The program is designed to de-emphasize the glamour of mere athletic ability and

to improve incentive, for boys and girls alike, for the development of good sportsmanship and fair play in all the students in each school.

For Good Sportsmanship
Lloyd S. Michael, principal of Evanston township high school, Evanston, Ill., and chairman of the national Babe Ruth Sportsmanship Awards committee, said the purpose of the program is to "disseminate information on and enlist enthusiasm for, good sportsmanship and fair play throughout the schools and to the general public."

23 other high schools in the state of Oregon are enrolled in the sportsmanship program.

4,137 Angler Days Needed For 241 Fish

An estimated total of 4,137 angler days were devoted to the capture of approximately 241 mature spring chinook salmon during the six-week season in the Umpqua river, April 15-May 31, Ross Newcomb, game department fisheries biologist, told members of the Roseburg Rod and Gun club at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

Fish Per Angler Low
In the area below Tyee, he said, 1,573 angler days were required to land 89 salmon at a rate of .957 fish per angler or 17.7 days per fish. In the upper river, above Tyee, 2,564 angler days were spent in the capture of 152 chinook salmon at a rate of .059 fish per angler or 16.8 days per fish. The catch rate for the whole sport fishery was .058 fish per angler or 17.16 days per fish.

Fish Well Distributed
The uniformity of catch rate between both sections of the stream is interesting and indicative of similarity of census technique. Newcomb said. It probably also means that the fish are well distributed throughout the open area of the river during the open season. The uniformity of catch rate, he said, has been apparent in each of the five years a spring salmon creel census has been conducted, which serves to indicate accuracy of the study.

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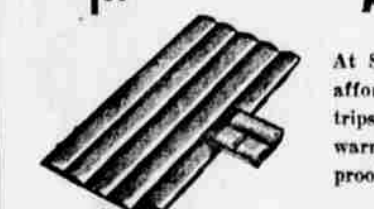
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
