Water Rates Increase Planned By Eugene Board

EUGENE—(AP)—The Eugene Water and Electric board is studying the possibility of increasing its water rates—for the first time in more than 20 years.

The engineers at the water board have assessed the capital improvements needs of the water utility for the next five years and established the overall need at approximately \$1,285,000. Earnings at the 1949 rate would not be sufficient to finance the needs of the immediate future, they report.

After depreciation allowances, the water system would have about \$50,000 a year to set aside for expansion work.

Gary Davis Now Faces Bankruptcy Suit Also

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Gary Davis, who faces trial on grand theft charges in connection with his plans to make a three-wheeled car, now faces a bankruptcy suit.

H. B. Goldman and Donald and Raymond Malby have filed an involuntary petition in bankruptcy against Davis in federal court accusing him of transferring or concealing personal property in the form of money.

The trio asserted they are his creditors. The court gave Davis 10 days to submit his accounts. He is at liberty on \$10,000 bail and awaiting trial June 23 on 25 counts of grand theft involving \$46,300 in dealer franchise money.

Army Of Caterpillars Fought By Ohio Farmers

BEDFORD, Pa., June 16.—(AP)—Farmers in Pennsylvania's Bedford county tightened their belts today to battle an invading army—an army of caterpillars.

Thousands of the pests—identified by county farm agent L. R. Mollenauer as army worms—have been moving across a Bedford farm area leaving devastation in their wake.

Mollenauer said yesterday that several different types of insect sprays were being tried in an effort to halt the crop destruction. Corn in some fields was cut off at ground level. Hundreds of the caterpillars were ground to death by passing cars as they crossed highway Route 56.

New Ohio Intercollegiate Contest—Having Babies

COLUMBUS, O.—(AP)—Now we have a new intercollegiate competition in Ohio—having babies.

The population reference bureau of Washington, after conducting a survey of Ohio college classes of 1925 and 1940 last year, came up with the winners:

In the 1940 graduating class for men, Hiram college with 1.96 children for each member. For the women, Western College for Women with 1.41 babies each.

In the 1925 class, for men the first spot went to John Carroll university, whose men members average 3.05 children each. The women of Ashland college's graduating class of 1925 reported 1.65 babies each to win the distaff title.

The bureau said Ohio college graduates of 1940 were well ahead of the 1925 class schedule in the matter of reproduction, showing that college graduates now are having more children.
