Sutherland Votes Today On City Budget Amount

Grant Wilson Backs Brothers Courts Scores

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 17.—(AP)—The first degree murder trial of the Wilson brothers for the kidnapping of Jo Ann Dewey resumed today, after a long defense from another brother.

Grant Wilson, who spent most of yesterday on the witness stand, said that his brothers had been harassed by police ever since 1948, because of their past records.

Utah Wilson, 29, and Turman Wilson, 24, are charged with abducting 18-year-old Jo Ann Dewey last March 19.

Grant Wilson told the court that his brothers fled the state after Jo Ann's abduction, not because they were connected with that affair, but because of their general fear of police.

Grant said the boys saw police cars parked at their home, and decided to go away. Utah Wilson, Grant said, had taken a power saw, and was afraid police would charge him with theft and revoke his parole.

Grant's testimony was frequently interrupted by legal objections, because of the odd fact that both sides are using him for a witness.

Listed as a defense witness, he was first connected with that affair, but because of his knowledge of Utah and Turman's flight. It was Grant who told police where the boys had gone, after Jo Ann's body was found.

Jig-Saw Pattern Of Soviet Spying Seen In Arrests

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—With three American citizens under arrest, additional pieces are falling into place in the jig-saw pattern of Soviet wartime spying in the United States.

By all indications, further arrests are in the offing, but when and where they will come, no one will say.

However, it is known that scores of FBI agents have spent many months putting together bits of information from all sorts of sources in an effort to complete the picture.

What was perhaps the key piece of the spy puzzle fell into place with the arrest in London last February of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, a top British atomic scientist.

After top G-men had interviewed Fuchs in prison last month, the bureau closed in on Harry Gold, 39-year-old Philadelphia chemist, who had long been under FBI watch. Gold admitted acting as a courier between Fuchs and Soviet agents in this country during the war.

With the pattern taking shape, the FBI this week picked up Alfred Dean Slack, 44, chemist employed by a plant manufacturing concern at Syracuse, N. Y., and David Greenglass, 28, former U. S. army sergeant, of New York city.

Each of the three Americans is charged with wartime espionage, which carries a possible death penalty. Each is held on \$100,000 bond.

Mayor Dislikes Flight Planned Next Saturday

BALTIMORE, June 17.—(AP)—All his life flying has been "strictly for the birds" in Mayor Omas D. Alessandro's book.

He's avoided it as hard as he's worked for election first as congressman then mayor of Baltimore. But today he confessed he'll have to go up for the first time next Saturday.

The President of the United States has asked him to fly with him from Washington to dedication of the Friendship International Airport south of Baltimore. It's a trip of only 26 miles.

"The time I got to go," wailed the round mayor. "The President invited me. It's a challenge. I got to go."

Mayor D'Alessandro really is sweating it out.

"Maybe I'd better make a record of my speech in case I can't talk when I get off the plane. I'll be glad when it's over. I've got a big family."

He recalled how several times he had avoided flying.

When Truman was vice-president he invited congressman D'Alessandro to ride to Baltimore in a plane. "I substituted Fallon," another Maryland congressman.

He was supposed to fly to Europe with a congressional committee investigating UNRRA. He took his immunization shots and got his passport. He had a farewell party. He said goodbye to his family and went to Washington to meet the other congressmen.

"I bought a paper and the headline said: 'Plane hits the Empire State Building.' The other congressmen and I got on the train to go to New York and catch the plane for Europe. I stepped off in Baltimore and told them I was too busy to make the trip."

Plenty Churches, But Not In Right Places

NEW CONCORD, Conn., June 17.—(AP)—"There are plenty of churches in America, but they are not in the right places," Dr. A. K. Stewart of Pittsburgh told the general assembly of the United Presbyterian church yesterday.

The executive secretary of the Board of American Missions told the assembly the "American people are on the move and we must follow them."

His remarks came as he announced the United Presbyterian church established 16 new churches in the last year.

Earlier, the general assembly agreed to change its church year in 1952 to conform with the calendar year. The church year now runs from April 1 to March 31.

The action, delegates said, will enable the church to participate with other denominations in the United Church Canvass in the fall of 1952.

84 Persons Died In Persian Crashes

PARIS, June 17.—(AP)—Air France, in an official statement today, said 84 persons were lost in two crashes of company planes in the Persian gulf this week.

The airline said 66 bodies have been recovered. Eighteen other persons are missing. No hope is held that any of the missing will be found alive.

Six persons survived the crash of a four-engine Saigon-to-Paris plane which crashed near Bahrain island Monday night. Forty were killed and five still are missing from the flight, which carried 43 passengers and a crew of eight.

Another crash of an identical plane at almost the same spot two nights later left 26 dead and 13 missing, according to Air France.

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Hoover Criticizes Deficit Spending

CHICAGO, June 17.—(AP)—Financing government deficits by borrowing, if continued long enough, has only one end—inflation—says Herbert Hoover.

The former Republican president spoke last night before some 4,000 members of the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce at a banquet at navy pier. His speech was one of the highlights of the group's 30th annual convention here this week.

Hoover addressed the Jaycees on a subject they requested—the relation of government expenditures, deficits and taxes, to jobs and to national life.

"Today we are blessed with some kind of prosperity," he said. "Whatever kind it is, we all want stability without inflation. We want a system that finds jobs for 1,000,000 new workers each year."

But, Hoover said, "a new round of inflation is now appearing in direct or indirect wage and salary increases and rising commodity prices."

"If we keep on this road," he added, "we are certain to reach the President's ideal of \$4,000 a year to every family. But it will not have \$4,000 purchasing power."

"To this question of further government borrowing to meet deficits, my answer is that it is the road to disaster for every citizen in the land."

Winston's New Theater Has Successful Opening

Winston's new theater, the Benetta, had a successful opening last night. A near-capacity crowd was on hand for the opening performance. The business is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bender.

The theater is constructed in quonset style with laminated siding supported by wide arching timber ribs. The capacity is 450 persons.

The name, Benetta, was suggested by Mrs. Mary Moore of Roseburg, and combines a twist of the family name, using the first syllable of the Bender's last name and the last part of Mrs. Bender's name, Loretta.

Little Hope Remains For Buried Miners

CADOMIN, Alta., June 17.—(CP)—Two mechanical mud muckers and sweating crews of rescue workers today continued a battle against time to open up the coal-mine tomb of five trapped miners.

But little hope was held that the men, imprisoned more than two days, would be found alive. Discovery yesterday of a broken head lamp and the severed leg of a man seemed to indicate that the diggers were coming close.

The mud muckers, pressed into service yesterday, speeded up the job of moving tons of debris from a tunnel 270 feet below the surface.

President's Veto Of Basing Point Bill Draws Fire

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—President Truman's veto of the hard-fought basing point bill set off sharp repercussions today which well may echo during the November congressional elections.

The 1,600-word veto message Mr. Truman sent to Congress yesterday was viewed in some quarters as a sharp setback for assistant Senate Democratic Leader Myers of Pennsylvania and a pat on the back for two administration-minded southerners, Senators Long (D-La.) and Hill (D-La.).

Myers, who wanted the bill approved, faces a tough fight for reelection in his highly industrialized state. Long and Hill, also up for reelection, had opposed the bill, which would have allowed businessmen to absorb freight costs in quoting delivered prices on their products.

The veto also was viewed as another victory for Senator Douglas (D-Ill.), who fought the bill as hard as he did the Kerr natural gas bill, which the President also vetoed.

Douglas claimed both measures were "monopolistic."

There was general agreement among proponents of basing point that they lack sufficient votes to override the veto.

DP Commission Plans New Offices

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—The displaced persons commission is planning several additional branch offices abroad to take care of a new influx of European war refugees.

President Truman yesterday signed legislation raising by 136,000 the number of DPs who may enter the United States.

Included are 18,000 World War II Polish soldiers who went to Britain rather than return to their Communist homeland, 10,000 Greeks and 2,000 refugees from former Italian territory ceded to Yugoslavia.

Commission officials said these additions will require new offices at least in Britain, Greece and probably Trieste.

Shriners 'Take' L. A.

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—(AP)—The Shriners took over Los Angeles today.

The 76th Imperial Council session begins officially tomorrow, with 200,000 red-tipped nobles and families making this the capital of Shrinedom for a week, but half that number already is on hand.

Cleveland, San Francisco, Montreal, Miami and Madison delegations pulled in today, although Cleveland's Al Koran temple was split, with the second contingent due Monday.

Because of the heavy influx, registration was started yesterday, 48 hours ahead of schedule. First to sign his name at headquarters tent in Pershing square was J. G. Johnson of Atlanta, Ga.

Defense Chiefs Set Japan Talks

TOKYO, June 17.—(AP)—Two top U. S. defense chiefs arrived tonight for talks with General MacArthur which may break the logjam holding up a peace treaty with Japan.

Secretary of Defense Johnson and Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, flew in from Manila, where they had discussed defense problems with U. S. military chiefs.

The talks with MacArthur, beginning next week, may decide on what basis the United States may hold military bases in Japan as protection against the march of Communism.

Visiting Hour

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—(AP)—Love triumphed over law when Mrs. Jean Beverly Steffy, 23, "borrowed" her husband Henry, 27, for an hour from a road camp where he was serving time for automobile theft.

A municipal judge dismissed charges against her for aiding a fugitive. Steffy, however, faces trial on escape charges.

Mrs. Steffy, saying she was "just lonesome," parked May 28 near the camp and Steffy left the place for an hour with her in the car, until a deputy sheriff spotted them.
