

Liberty Bell To Be Exhibited In Weekend Parade

The Oregon Liberty Bell, and 52 others now touring other states and U.S. possessions, represents the cooperation of a good many American firms, according to George W. Minnaugh, state director of the Liberty Savings Bonds drive.

The bell, replica of the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia, will be on display in Roseburg this weekend. Its second visit was timed to coincide with the parade. The bell will enter into the weekend's festivities as part of the parade Saturday. The bell will arrive Friday night and leave Monday.

The group of bells was donated by six of America's copper companies: Kennecott Copper company, Phelps-Dodge Corp., American Smelting and Refining company, American Metal company, Ltd., Miami Copper company and the Anaconda Copper Mining company. Other companies which provided materials and labor for the undertaking were the Ford Motor Co., Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, American Bridge company and the Rudie Wilhelm Warehouse Co., Inc., Portland, which furnished Oregon's driver, Lucas F. Weiler.

The bells were cast outside this country because of the war in the U.S. was able to fill the contract. A foundry at Anancy, France, a small city near the Swiss border, called enough of its craftsmen back to work to undertake the job, at a cost of \$120,000. Not only are 53 bells the exact size of the original Liberty Bell, but they have approximately the tone as heard in Philadelphia that July day in 1776 when liberty was proclaimed throughout the land.

The bell display heralds the savings bonds drive now underway. It will be taken to Corvallis after the Roseburg appearance.

They were married March 2 and separated March 28. Glass sued her for divorce, charged cruel and inhuman treatment. She countered with a demand for \$2,000 monthly pending trial of the suit.

Woman Winner In Maine Primary For Congress Job

PORTLAND, Me., June 20.—(AP)—To her own pleasant surprise Miss Lucia M. Cormier, 38, is a Democratic congressional nominee today.

The plump, attractive Rumford book store owner won the stoutest victory in yesterday's Maine primaries. Her opponent was Kansas-born Dr. Adrian H. Scolten of Portland.

Miss Cormier's victory margin was better than two to one. She is the Democratic national committeewoman. A newcomer to politics, she said happily:

"Five years ago if anyone had told me I would ever run for Congress I'd have quickly told them they were crazy."

Dr. Scolten commented that "perhaps Miss Cormier is the second Margaret Chase Smith she aspires to be and perhaps Maine does prefer women as their representatives in Washington."

Rep. Robert Hale (R) will be Miss Cormier's September election foe. He was nominated for a fifth term with a four-to-one margin over Ray W. Stetson. Both are Portlanders.

Earl S. Grant, president of a Portland business college, will contest Republican Governor Frederick G. Payne's reelection. Grant had a margin of almost two to one over Leland B. Currier of Litchfield, former Democratic state senator.

Payne was unopposed as were Republican representatives Charles P. Nelson and Frank Fellows, and John W. Keenan, Mars Hill Democrat, who will compete with Fellows in the third district.

Nelson's election opponent will be John J. Maloney Jr., 38, of Lewiston, who won a three-way Democratic fight in the second congressional district.

Maine Democrats haven't sent a candidate to Congress since they filled two of the state's three House seats in 1934.

Stalin Continued In Job Of Russian Premier

MOSCOW, June 20.—(AP)—A cheering, applauding supreme Soviet (parliament) voted unanimously last night to continue Premier Joseph Stalin's government in office.

Eleven Communist party politburo members were present as the voted support of resolutions demanding prohibition of atomic weapons and branding as war criminals officials of the first government to use atom weapons.

The parliament also went on record to express a "conviction that the Soviet government will continue to pursue its constant policy of peace and friendship among the nations within the United Nations and elsewhere defend international peace and security."

Speakers attacked United States and British government policies as "imperialist and aggressive" and said that Russia has mastered atomic energy for creative uses.

After reaching a peak of 47 billion passenger miles in 1930, U. S. railroad passenger mileage declined, but rose again in World War II to a peak of 98 billion passenger miles.

Red Cross Names Board Members; Activities Told

Twenty-seven board members and guests, representing various groups and divisions of community interest, attended the annual meeting of the Douglas County chapter, American Red Cross, Monday night in the armory.

New members of the board elected were Dr. E. J. Wainwright, Claude F. Reeder, Mrs. Cecelia Day, Mrs. Harold E. Schmeier, Rev. Clark Robb, Dr. Webster and Col. Medore Crawford of Roseburg; Mrs. Russell Seymour, Sutherland; Frank L. Taylor and Mrs. Helen Lewis, Reedsport, and Mrs. Grace Thiele, Yoncalla.

Miss Ruth Swinney, Junior Red Cross chairman, stated nearly 7,000 school children are enrolled in this group. These children, in addition to their many other functions, have provided more than 4,000 decorative items for use at the Veterans hospital, Roseburg, county home and Mercy hospital; have sent 338 gift boxes to children in schools in foreign countries, and have submitted 12 pictures from their art classes to the international art project. Two of these have been selected for showing overseas.

Other Activities
Ray Brown and Bill Chatham, water safety chairman and vice-chairman, reported that more than 874 children received swimming instruction last year. They predicted that swim programs at Roseburg and Drain would be even more successful this year.

Mrs. Watson, field director at the Veterans hospital, reported that Red Cross volunteers at the hospital have carried on a well-integrated and constructive program of assistance and instruction at the hospital and have given over 2,400 hours of volunteer time.

Mrs. S. E. Wilhemy, production chairman, reported her group, comprised of 14 volunteer workers, had made or altered more than 2,000 items of clothing and equipment for use by hospital patients.

George Smith, first aid chairman, submitted a report stating that first aid training had been given to more than 273 persons in the county. Four emergency highway first aid stations have been maintained and first aid booths were maintained at the rodeo and during the racing season.

John Zenor indicated that a first aid booth will be in operation during the rodeo season beginning June 24.

Mrs. Eugene Kent, home service chairman, reported that the home service department had serviced 763 calls and had made 69 home visits in addition to supplying health and welfare reports, guardianship investigations, claims service, and financial assistance to 207 persons and their families, mostly veterans and active servicemen.

Grants were made to 25 civilian families. Total assistance approximated \$2,718.

Local disasters involved the expenditure of a little over \$100 and the distribution of over 1,000 pounds of new and used clothing and bedding. National disasters occurring in the county were confined to the epidemic of Glide and drugs were distributed from the facilities of the national blood bank through the county health service to the value of \$4,380.

Disaster Plans Talked
Dr. John L. Haskins, Veterans hospital manager, spoke on disaster preparedness plan in operation at the hospital. Mrs. Baker pointed out the existing agreements for cooperation in time of disaster between government bodies, American Red Cross, the American Legion and other groups.

Mrs. Ralph Herman was appointed to make a survey of the local chapter's resources in connection with disaster planning and will report at the next meeting.

Mrs. Vera McClintock Jones, chapter vice-chairman, presided at the meeting in the absence of Chairman William T. Evans Jr.

Election of officers to the new board of directors will be held Monday, June 26, at 7:30 p.m. in the armory.

Members expressed the opinion this was one of the most successful annual meetings of recent years. Those attending indicated their appreciation of the scope and activity of the Red Cross program in the county.

Chief Of Police Ousted For Visits To Mayor's Wife

CLEVELAND, June 20.—(AP)—Highland Heights' 58-year-old police chief, who described himself as "an errand boy for a bunch of women," won't have to run those errands any more. He was fired today by the village council for "consorting" with the mayor's wife.

Solons of the suburban village of nearly 500 voted the dismissal 6-2 after listening 5½ hours to the case of Fay & Faye.

Fay Dairymple, the chief, was accused by Mayor Clem (Bud) Ley, 40, of consorting with Ley's wife, Faye, 29.

Ley testified he suspended the chief May 9 when he found him with Faye in the kitchen of the mayor's home. In the six weeks since then, the villagers have been choosing up sides. About 200 of them attended the hearing last night.

But the chief said his visits to the Ley home, "maybe four or five a week," were either on official business or errands for the village women.

In ousting the chief, council decided he was guilty of "malfeasance and misfeasance of duty," in that he parked the police car at the mayor's house while he "consorted" with the mayor's wife and by thus using the car on village time deprived the village residents of proper law protection.

Ley said he was unable to produce any evidence of actual "illicit relations" between his wife and the chief.

Things Looked Funny
But, he declared, it "looked—funny" that the police car was reported in his driveway every morning after he went to work at a downtown auto body shop he operates.

Mrs. Ley said she left the mayor May 9 and went to live with a sister after he accused her of "not acting like a wife" when he found the chief in his home.

Ley's charges against the chief were first aired in a cross petition to his wife's divorce suit. The Leys have three children aged 18, 16 and 10.

Chief Dairymple said his trips to the mayor's home often concerned building inspection, one of his other village duties. He said Mrs. Ley kept his records of building permits and other official matters.

Other times, he claimed, he conferred with her on such community functions as a fireman's dance, Red Cross drive, and various women's club activities.

"We had a lot in common," Dairymple admitted of his relations with Mrs. Ley. "But what the mayor said about us is a big surprise to me."

by transient aircraft and aircraft of third persons; from the repair of aircraft and from the sale of accessories, parts and oil to aircraft to third persons; and four percent of the gross sums received by the lessee from all types of flight operations conducted by the lessee from the airport and all other types of income received by the lessee from the business.

The proposed lease, which sets up regulations and controls for the airport, would terminate June 30, 1951.

The council deferred for further study a proposed contract with the Civil Aeronautics authority.
