WASHINGTON-(NEA)-When Postmaster General Jesse Donaldson ordered his drastic cuts in postal services he cut a Gordian knot. During the long years of a growing postal deficit not one of the thousands of suggestions to put the P.O. in the black offered this startlingly

simple solution. If the taxpayer doesn't want to pay for fancy postal services, don give them to him. At least the problem is out in the open now.

Donaldson's cuts in service are in anticipation of proposed Congressional budget cuts for ne xt year. They won't wipe out the deficit entirely. But they show the way. Here they are, summarized:


