Income Tax Proposal Revived in Portland

PORTLAND, June 22 — (AP) — The city income tax proposal, killed at the polls in May, will rise again to appear on the November ballot here.

The city council voted yesterday to submit the measure again. It may not be a duplicate, though. The council said it has not determined how much tax to ask for. The amount will be inserted sometime after attorneys draw up the measure.

The council also approved an \$11,775,000 budget for the coming year. Of this \$2,498,000 will come from gross revenue license fees, recently increased. More than 150 businessmen were on hand to protest the fees at the council meeting.

White Man's Marriage To Negro Singer Revealed

PARIS, June 22 — (AP) — Negro singer Lena Horne and MGM musical director Lennie Hayton, who is white, were secretly married in Paris in 1947, Miss Horne's manager, Ralph Harris, announced today.

Harris said the couple kept the wedding secret for professional reasons, and now have decided "it is time that everybody knew."

Hayton won an academy award last year for direction of the movie version of the musical "On the Town."

Dams Threatening Salmon Supply

WASHINGTON, June 22 — (AP) — Alvin Anderson, director of the Washington state department of fisheries, said here today that the nation stands to lose its salmon supply in the Pacific Northwest unless a new policy is adopted in planning dams in that area.

The end of the salmon fisheries may be 200 years in the future, he said, but it is coming unless plans are made for permitting salmon to reach their spawning grounds on the upper reaches of the Columbia river and its tributaries.

"The present system of constructing dams and then trying to get fish over them on their upstream migration," he said, "is ruining the salmon fisheries of our state."

"All we ask is that before a dam is planned we have a full scale conference between the power and fish interests to adjust the dams so that they will do the least injury to the fish."

"We can have both, all the power we want and our fish, if the problem is approached intelligently."

Nation's Rail Lines Face 3 Strike Threats

jurious report" by the emergency board since enactment of the railway labor law.

F. H. Nemitz, chief of the conductors, and W. P. Kennedy, head of the trainmen, said their unions were "ready to use economic strength, if necessary, to force a fair settlement of the issues."

The presidential board April 19 recommended to President Truman that the switchmen be awarded a 40-hour week and an 18 cents an hour wage hike. The switchmen want a 40-hour week with the pay they now get for a 49-hour week.

The fact-finders on June 15 specifically did not recommend a boost for the trainmen and conductors when they recommended a 40-hour week and 18 cents an hour to 75,000 yard employees.

The 125,000 members of the Trainmen's and Conductors' union also wanted sliding scales of pay rates depending on weight of locomotives and a reduction of the basic day from the present 150 miles or 7 1/2 hours to 100 miles or five hours.

The trainmen and conductors did not actually set a strike date. They will meet in Chicago July 10. Future action will be mapped then.

Arthur J. Glover, president of the switchmen, said his group represents 25,000 workers. The carriers said that the trainmen and conductors' union represented 85 percent of the nation's railroad switchmen.

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Japanese Racket In Dead House Flies Is Halted

OKAYAMA, Japan — (AP) — Dead house flies were at a premium—worth a 10 sen (about a 30th of a cent) bounty at city hall.

Sanitation officials paid freely until a fish peddler showed up with 18,000 dead flies, worth 1,800 yen (about \$75) bounty.

They cut the bounty in half and another fishmonger showed up with 35,000 dead flies. He, too, collected about a \$5 bounty.

Then sanitation officials investigated. They found the fishmongers were hatching flies in rotting, unsold fish in their back yards. Each made more from flies than fish.

In the latest last night he cracked a bottle over the knuckles of a gunman. His unexpected reaction knocked a pistol from the hand of the holdup man who fled without funds.

Once before Bloom bounced a bottle off the head of a gunman and on two occasions he exchanged gunfire with holdup men. Contents of the cash register remained intact each time.

Fire Sweeps Plant Of Williams Lumber Co.

WILLAMINA, Ore., June 22 — (AP) — Two firemen were hurt in a fire that swept through the Williams Lumber company plant north of here today.

The main mill, the lath mill, half of the green chain and sawdust conveyor system were destroyed, with loss estimated by Jerry Wade, company auditor, at between \$200,000 and \$300,000. Between 150 and 200 men were thrown out of work.

Two Williams volunteer firemen were hurt when a conveyor rig collapsed on them. They were Jeff Myers, who had multiple bruises, and Dick Hofrichter, injuries undetermined.
