

Larks Win Again In Far West Loop

Heavy hitters' night was celebrated in the Far West baseball league last night as the Pittsburgh Diamonds turned back the Redding Browns, 12-5. Eugene trimmed Marysville, 10-7, and Klamath Falls and Reno split a doubleheader by a score of 14-2 and 17-9.

The Medford Rogues and the Willows Cardinals played the only tight game of the evening, with the Rogues finally winning 5-2 on a three-run rally in the bottom of the eighth. Eight walks by Marysville pitchers helped Eugene to a 9-run seventh inning in the win over the Peaches.

The Diamonds put on two big innings to check the league leading Browns. Pittsburgh moved ahead with four counters in the seventh and then finished it off with five more in the ninth.

Five homers featured the Reno-Klamath Falls series. Reno took the first game 14 to 2 and the Gems

Lady Amateurs Vie In Golfing Quarter-Finals

DENVER, June 22 — (AP) — Flexing their muscles after yesterday's uprising, sharp-shooting amateurs charged into today's quarter finals of the women's western open golf tournament with high hopes of cracking the pros' monopoly of this coveted title.

Ever since 1944, this western open plum has been plucked either by Louise Suggs of Carrollton, Ga., Patty Berg of Minneapolis or Mrs. Babe Didrikson Zaharias now of Chicago.

There were only six pros in the field of 109 that started chasing this championship Monday.

All six started yesterday. But just three of them survived the day's firing over the rugged Cherry Hills layout.

The major casualty was Miss Suggs who was eliminated by Betty Mackinnon of Dallas, 1-up, by a 25 foot putt for a birdie four on the super tough 18th hole.

Today Miss Mackinnon is matched with the redoubtable Babe Zaharias. It doesn't stack up as a walkaway for the Babe.

Mrs. Zaharias yesterday eliminated Marjorie Lindsay of Decatur, Ill., by 4 and 3.

Another relative newcomer who eliminated a favored pro was Mrs. Betty Bush of Hammond, Ind., who upset Marilyn Smith of Wichita, Kans., 2 and 1. Her task today seems a bit tougher. She is pitted against Miss Berg who beat a fellow pro, Helen Dettweiler of Indio, Calif., 3 and 2.

Betty Jameson, veteran pro from San Antonio, gained an easy 5 and 4 verdict from Betsy Rawls of Austin, Tex., but was likely to have her hands full today with amateur Peggy Kirk of Findlay, O., who trounced Barbara Dawson of Orinda, Calif., by the same wide margin.

The fourth of today's 18 hole matches sends Clarie Doran of Cleveland against Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Portland, Ore., in an all-amateur pairing. Mrs. Bowman was very steady and showed a fine competitive edge in coming from behind a two hole deficit to eliminate the medalist, blond Grace DeMoss of Corvallis, 2 and 1.

House Committee Okays Fishing Opportunity Bill

WASHINGTON, June 22 — (AP) — The House fisheries committee yesterday approved a bill to authorize a cooperative state and federal program designed to improve fishing opportunities.

The Fish and Wildlife Service, cooperating with state conservation authorities, would undertake to place more fish in public waters in cooperating states. It also would foster programs to correct fish losses from water pollution and other causes.

The measure sets up machinery under which the government would back the program with funds equal to revenues derived in participating states from federal taxes on the sale of fishing tackle.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Compton had as dinner guests Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. Tom McNeil of Roseville,

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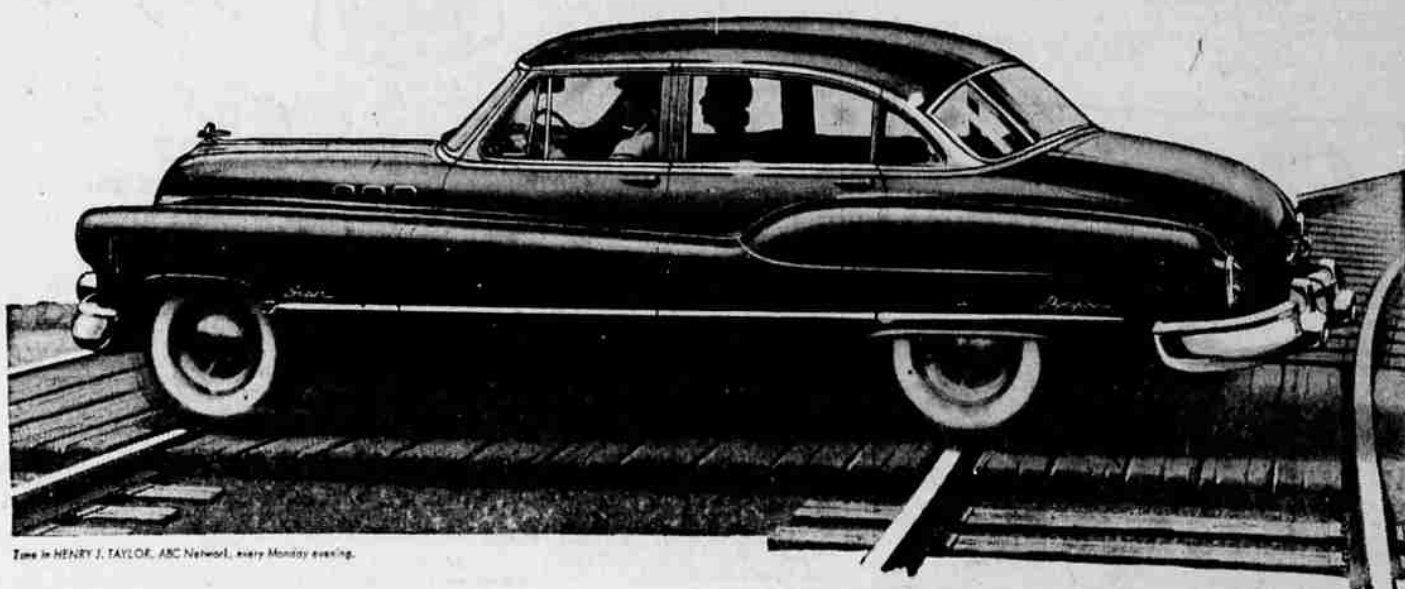

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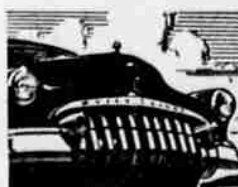
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
